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BAPTIST ASSOCIATION MEETS.

The industrial school will have an important part in the evangelization and education of the natives of the Philippine Islands is the opinion of A. E. Bligow, of Foreign Mission Union, San Francisco. Gilman Parker as alternate. Rev. John M. Lindan will preach the introductory sermon, with Rev. C. L. Owens as alternate. Rev. E. A. Smith will preach the doctrinal sermon. There will be a session this morning and the association will adjourn at 12 o'clock.

JOINT MISSION MEETING.

The annual rally of the Woman's Home Missionary Union and the Woman's Board of the Christian Church of Oregon was held yesterday at the First Congregational Church. The devotional services of the morning were led by Mrs. Walter Hoge, and reports of the home and foreign work were made. That of Mrs. B. D. Sigler on the foreign field was especially interesting. It told of the flourishing condition of missions in Turkey since the government has given them official recognition, and allowed them to hold property. In the afternoon Mrs. M. F. H. told of the wide-spread scope of mission work, showing the strides of progress made in all lands. Other papers were "Our Opportunity in the Foreign Field," by Mrs. J. L. Hendricks, and "How to Stimulate Missionary Interest in the Church," by Mrs. R. J. Hendricks. Mrs. A. H. Dodd gave some glimpses of the Holy Land. During the noon hour luncheon was served.

PREPARED BUDGET FOR MAYOR.

Aggregating about \$500,000 voted at recent city election, the budget in the same status as the day after election. No steps will be taken to issue the bonds until their legality has been satisfactorily determined. The question will in all probability be determined in the courts. At the request of Mayor Lane, Judge Seneca Smith is preparing a brief which will be submitted tomorrow. Judge Smith contends that all of the bonds voted at the election this month are void. He holds the manner in which the issue was proposed is in direct conflict with provisions in the city charter covering the subject. He further questions the legality of the bonds for the reason that the Council exceeded its jurisdiction in submitting the proposed issue to a vote of the electors of the city. This, he claims, should have been done only on the initiative petition of the voters.

LIBRARY COMMISSION TO CHAIRMAN.

The executive committee of the East Side branch library appointed at the last meeting of the East Side Improvement Association, will be organized next week. O. M. Scott, Joseph Buchtel and H. H. Prouty, the original committee, will be increased to 10 and this committee will lay out plans for the campaign for raising money for the library building. It is not expected to do much until the schools reopen and the churches have resumed their vacation season. Most of the push clubs have already taken a vacation and the others will soon adjourn for the summer. The committee will organize so as to be in position for aggressive action early in the fall.

FINAL AGREEMENT IS MADE.

The final agreement of 30 per cent of the capital stock of the club of the Portland Association has been called, which will bring the full amount available up to \$350,000. From present indications and the assurance of the contractors the building will be ready to occupy by the first of the year. It is thought by the officers of the club that the upper stories, which are to be used for club purposes, will be rushed to completion before the rest of the building is finished, so that the club may be settled in its new quarters at as early a date as possible.

DEATH OF FORMER POLICEMAN.

Moses Waller, an old-time Portland policeman, died yesterday morning at his home, 466 Eastlake street, of cancer. He was a policeman in 1880, and afterward was out of the service part of the time. He finally resigned in 1900. He was 60 years old, and leaves a wife and six children—Mrs. Sam Scheuer, Mrs. Frank Rummell, Miss Etta Waller, Joseph Waller, Frank Waller and Sam Waller. The funeral will be held today and the Jewish Cemetery will be the place of interment.

CARS ENOUGH TO HANDLE TRAFFIC

Harriman System Promises to Take Care of Freight This Year.

ROLLING STOCK INCREASED

Repetition of Delays That Caused So Much Trouble in 1906 Will Be Prevented—Figures Show the Growth of Traffic.

Pacific Coast industries promise to benefit largely by the increase in traffic promised by the Harriman lines for the handling of traffic in 1907. So far as possible, the managers of the various units of the Harriman system will prevent repetition of delays experienced last year in the movement of freight.

Information given out by officials of the Harriman lines indicates that the increase of traffic on the Western lines, and especially on the Oregon roads, has been used to gauge the demands of the system during the coming year, and preparations have been made accordingly.

From a tonnage of 32,000,000 in July, 1905, the southbound movement alone on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon to points outside the state jumped to 73,400,000 tons in June, 1906, an increase of \$35 carloads, or 125 per cent. The eastbound tonnage at the same time jumped from 13,000,000 tons to nearly 32,000,000 tons. This unprecedented gain of more than 50,000,000 tons in a single commodity was responsible for delays that have occurred in spite of arrangements made in advance to handle an expected increase of the lumber business.

New freight-car equipment on the associated lines of the Union and Southern Pacific and the Oregon lines, delivered since June and ordered for delivery by the end of this month, amounts to:

The increase in car capacity on the Harriman lines on June 30 will be 535,150 tons. This, with existing equipment, gives these lines a total freight car capacity of 2,720,776 tons. New trackage and motive power, it is said, have kept pace with this increase in rolling stock.

The pooling arrangement on the Harriman lines is said by practical railroad men to be the best arrangement possible for making these lines more efficient. The plan was discovered and applied to allied lines. Cars are at home anywhere on the Harriman rails and equipment can be diverted from one line to another, wherever it is most needed. Last year the San Francisco disaster complicated the transportation problem on the Pacific Coast and it was made more difficult to handle by the fact that Eastern lines were unable to furnish their quota of equipment for business originating in this territory.

Service to Crater Lake.

Two trains daily will be operated over the Pacific & Eastern Railroad commencing today, from Medford to Eagle Point, a distance of 12 miles. A stage service will be run from Eagle Point to Crater Lake. The intention is to extend the road eventually to Crater Lake. It is not yet known whether the service

TRIES TO SHOOT FORGER

Revolver of Bank Teller Falls to Work, and Man Takes to Heels.

A young man who entered the Bank of California, in the Chamber of Commerce building, at 2:35 o'clock yesterday afternoon and attempted to pass a forged check, nearly lost his life and at the least probably escaped serious injury only because a revolver in the hands of Thomas N. M. Paterson, the paying teller, failed to work when he pulled the trigger. The nervy cashier was determined to capture the forger, who ran when he saw his work was discovered. He was overtaken by a crowd, led by Mr. Paterson, and was returned to the bank, where he was questioned by Manager W. A. MacRae and was later released.

The young man entered the bank just five minutes before closing time and presented a check, which was signed by Thomas Uhlman, and was for \$150. It was a poor excuse for a check, and that it was a forgery was quickly discovered by Mr. Paterson. He asked the stranger to wait a moment, saying he would see about the check. Mr. Paterson started to go outside and call the police, but being to capture the man. The latter, however, took to his heels, when Mr. Paterson leveled a revolver at him and pulled the trigger. The cartridge snapped. The chase for the clumsy forger was then taken up, and he was caught on Third street. The case was not reported to the police.
