SPECIAL MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

Rev. E. M. Shapard, stated clerk of the Portland Presbytery, announced that a special meeting of the presbytery has been called for July 9, at 2 P. M. in Hawthorne Park Presbyterian Church. The meeting is to consider the call extended by Hawthorne Park Presbyterian Church to Rev. E. Nelson Allen, D. D., and to arrange for his installation. Dr. Allen has been the pastor of this church for several years under the Cumberland Presbyterian authority, and he will now be duly installed as pastor under the forms of the mother Presbytery. At this meeting the presbytery will hear the report of the special committee on the Zion German Church property.

MAYOR FILES NEW CHARGES.—At the meeting of the executive board yesterday afternoon a communication from Mayor Lane was read again charging the four deposed city detectives with inefficiency and incompetency. The communication, which was a routine matter, was referred to the committee on police upon motion of Fleischman, who had introduced the matter to report to the executive board its findings in the matter. SUNDAY SCHOOL LEADER TO LECTURE.—"Echoes of the State Sunday School Convention at Eugene," will be the subject of a lecture by Professor E. C. Galt, of Hartford, Conn., next Tuesday evening at Taylor Street Church at 8 o'clock. GRAND AVENUE TO BE PAVED.—Delivery of grooved steel rails along Grand avenue, between Belmont and East Stark streets indicates that at last the avenue is to be paved. What will be done from East Oak to Everett street is not known, but the property-owners will insist on the same kind of rails. A contract was let for hard pavement on Union avenue between East Burnside street and Sullivan gulch some time ago, but nothing has yet been done to replace the old rails with grooved ones.

CLUB OBJECTS TO SALE.—At the recent meeting of the University Park Improvement Club, W. J. Peddicord, reading a decided stand was taken against the sale of any property belonging to the school district. Special reference was had to the Williams house, which the Board of Education is offering for sale. To this action the club makes a vigorous protest on the ground that the district should sell none of its property at this time, as it will be needed in the future, and also will increase in value. The club appointed a special committee to take up the matter of first protection University Park and Portsmouth. There is now no fire protection in this district, in which there are two schoolhouses. This committee will urge the need of fire hydrants as a beginning.

ROSEMEER CHANGES HANDS.—Rosemeier, an addition recently opened by the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, was sold yesterday to the Jacobsen Company for \$250,000. It is a slightly tract of more than 500 lots lying on the Sandy Road between Holladay Park and Rose City Park. The addition is being improved with cement walks and graded streets and will be sold by the new owners. It is reported that the Trust Company, which has recently closed several important leases in Portland, has added the quarter block on Alder street, owned by Miss Helen F. Spalding, to the properties already owned by it. The new addition, improved with a frame rooming-house which will be torn down and replaced by a modern brick structure.

THE EXHIBIT GRANTED.—The Marquam Grand Theatre was yesterday granted an extension of 45 days in the limit of its license by the city executive board. It is now held by Chief Campbell to be the safest public building in the city, but there are a few requirements of the Fire Department with which the management must comply before the building can be formally accepted as in proper condition, and it was for this reason that the extension of time for improvements was asked.

COMMANDER NAMES ADJUTANT-GENERAL.—S. P. Rhye, of Hood River, the newly elected Commander of the Oregon department, G. A. R., has appointed C. A. Williams, of Sumner Post, No. 12, Adjutant-General of the state G. A. R. for the coming year. Headquarters will be maintained in Portland. Adjutant-General Williams has been prominent in the Grand Army circles in this state, having filled a number of positions in that organization. He was Commander of the 2nd Post, No. 2, at one time, and has since been a member of the council of administration for several terms.

BOY ROBS CHURCH GIRLS.—The police were called upon yesterday afternoon to investigate a mysterious robbery at the Marquam Theatre. Miss Ruby Norton, a member of the chorus of the San Francisco Opera Company, now playing "When Johnny Comes Marching Home," had suffered the loss of her purse, containing \$20. Detective Sergeant Baty and Detective Alden solved the case by taking the purse from a young man into custody. He declared for an hour that he was not guilty of the theft, but finally confessed. He was turned over to the Juvenile Court authorities.

SALT LAKE MAN TO PREACH.—Rev. Elmer J. Goshen, of the First Congregational Church of Salt Lake City, will preach next Sunday morning at the First Congregational Church. He arrived in Portland yesterday morning, and is the guest of R. M. Gray. Mr. Goshen is considered one of the most eloquent speakers in the West. When he went to Salt Lake City a few years ago his flock numbered between 300 and 500 members, but he soon had 1,000 people coming to his Sunday night services.

GAIN IN BANK CLEARINGS.—Portland's bank clearings for the week ending last Wednesday show a gain of \$5.3, over the corresponding week of last year, according to Bradstreet's report. The week's clearings amounted to \$7,093,000. Spokane, with \$6,127,000 of clearings, was the only city in the country that showed a greater percentage of gain. All the Pacific Coast cities, however, showed good increase. The gain in Tacoma was 49.4 per cent; in Seattle 25.1 per cent, and in Los Angeles, 16.4 per cent.

FIRE AT WOODLAWN.—Fire of unknown origin last night destroyed a five-room cottage at Oregon and Dayton streets, Woodlawn. The house was the property of D. W. Owens, of St. Johns, and was worth about \$1200. It is not known what the building was insured. The house was not occupied, having been without a tenant for several weeks. Chemical engine No. 4, reported at the fire quickly extinguished the flames. The fire was caused by a gas leak from a stove.

WOMAN SUPPLIES MEETING.—The Oregon Equal Suffrage Association will hold a meeting at the residence of its president, Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, 222 Clay street, at 2 P. M. today. The petition secured for the re-submission of the suffrage amendment, having proved illegal, a hall was called in their circulation after over half the signatures were secured, and the work will be done over again. Arrangements for this will be made at the meeting.
