

MOYER WITNESS IN HAYWOOD CASE

Haywood Will Testify in His Own Defense on Saturday.

NO "SQUEAL" FROM MOYER

Defense Expects to Demolish Bradley Bomb Story, but State Has Strong Rebuttal Evidence at Its Command.

BOISE, Idaho, July 4.—(Special.)—It has been announced by the attorneys for the defense in the Haywood case that they will put Charles H. Moyer on the stand. There have been persistent rumors that Moyer was likely to "squeal." These have been denied by the attorneys for the prosecution that they have knowledge of any such desire on Moyer's part, while Haywood's lawyers laugh at the suggestion. The announced purpose of the latter to put him on the stand shows their confidence in his loyalty to their cause. Haywood is also to go on.

Moyer will take the stand as soon as a number of minor witnesses shall have testified and the affidavits in the Bradley matter are introduced. These minor witnesses may finish up tomorrow. The Bradley affidavits will then come on Saturday and Moyer may reach the stand before the week ends.

Did Bomb or Gas Hit Bradley?

It is maintained by the defense that the Bradley affidavits and others secured in San Francisco will demolish the story told by Orchard of having blown the mining man up with a bomb. These affidavits showing the explosion was caused by gas. The state, on the other hand, does not fear that showing. It also has affidavits and will have other rebuttal testimony on that matter.

It is the general impression that the defense will get through Tuesday, but that will be governed by the extent of the cross-examination of Haywood and Moyer. If these go at length into all the features of the case on their direct examination, the cross-examination may be extended, but it is intimated that the state will not pay much attention to them. After the defense rests, the state will make motion to strike out much of the testimony introduced in behalf of Haywood unless in the meantime it is connected with the case. The state will come some time, but the judge may be prepared to rule on it without a long argument.

Strong Rebuttal Evidence.

The rebuttal by the state is likely to prove very strong. It is stated that it will have several good witnesses from the Cour d'Alene to the destruction of the Bunker Hill & Sullivan mill, demolishing the testimony offered by Dr. McGee and the two Mormon men on that point. Other features of the testimony for the defense as to Cour d'Alene matters will also be attacked, and it is said, there will be a general exposure of some of the witnesses.

It is supposed the rebuttal will occupy about a week, so there is hope that the case will get to the jury about July 30. The last witness on the stand will be Harry Orchard. He will be put on in rebuttal to contradict certain statements made by witnesses for the defense. James McFarland will also be on, as will George W. Riddell, the detective who was so long in the councils of the union at Telluride, Colo., and Eureka, Utah.

Bake in Flooded Wheat Field.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 4.—This morning the flood waters in the rich reclaimed wheat lands in the lower part of Kern County, caused yesterday by the breaking of the Buena Vista Lake levee, continued to spread and rise unabated, and all resistance against their progress is impossible until the auxiliary levees being constructed at the San Emmedeo road is complete and the waters reach that point. The break in the levee has widened continually, and it is reported that the entire levee is doomed. Coincidentally with the break in the levee yesterday was the breaking out of two large fires in the grain fields of Miller & Lux, nearly 20 miles distant from the lake.

After burning all day the fires were

finally extinguished last night shortly before midnight. About two whole sections of grain were destroyed, aggregating between 15,000 and 20,000 sacks. Intelligence of these two fires and the remarkable coincidence was suppressed by the officers of both corporations because of the suspicion naturally aroused by the two catastrophes occurring at precisely the same time. The officials of neither corporation will commit themselves.

FLOCKING OVER BORDER

Japanese Violate Immigration Law by Coming Through Mexico.

MEXICO CITY, July 4.—Two hundred and seventy-five Japanese landed at Santa Cruz yesterday. The Japanese, like most of the others that land in this country, are headed for the coal mines in the district of Las Esperanza. Joseph Z. Strand, a Chinese immigration inspector stationed at El Paso, who arrived in this city today, stated that Japanese are flocking to the border in great numbers and buying tickets from Juarez through to Canada, in violation of the recent provisions of the immigration law, which closed the border to these immigrants. Instead of going to Canada, it is stated, many stop at convenient points in the United States.

ITO CALLS DOWN EMPEROR

Holds Him Responsible for Korean Delegation to The Hague.

SEOUL, July 4.—Marquis Ito, at the palace yesterday, interrogated the Emperor regarding the presence at The Hague of a delegation seeking recognition of the claim that Japan has broken its pledge to maintain Korean independence. The Emperor denied having any knowledge of the delegation or its action, whereupon Marquis Ito remarked: "It is not necessary to inquire who is responsible for the delegation, as its actions are self-explanatory and the whole world is in possession of the facts."

In an interview with a correspondent of the Associated Press, Marquis Ito said that the attempt being made at The Hague to connect Korean affairs with the San Francisco question would mislead no one. The intrigues of the Korean court, he added, were continuous. The reported facts that the peace conference had not recognized the delegation and that no one had requested to see its credentials showed the ignorance of the outside world regarding this latest move of the Korean court, but the Emperor's persistence in the intrigues constituted a hostile action against the Japanese which must be stopped.

DAMAGE NOT DONE BY MOB

San Francisco Will Say Individuals Wrecked Restaurant.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—Referring to the suit brought yesterday against the city in behalf of the proprietors of the Japanese restaurant and bath-house alleged to have been wrecked upon a mob, May 29, Assistant City Attorney Baggett said:

"The defense of the city will be that whatever injury was done to the property of the Japanese was done by two or three persons before a mob, in the sense of the law, had formed. The city will also claim that there was no riot, but that the mob was formed by a few persons before it was possible for a mob to have collected."

United States Attorney Devin has received a letter from Attorney-General Bonaparte asking him to make an investigation and report immediately on the action of the San Francisco officials in refusing to grant licenses to employment agencies conducted by Japanese.

He at once began the investigation and will make his report as soon as possible.

Still Carries Chip on Shoulder.

TOKIO, July 4.—The representation made by the Japanese Consul at San Francisco to the municipal authorities of that city in regard to the action of the latter in refusing to renew the licenses of Japanese employment agencies has not yet been replied to. This affair is considered here as being of far greater character than the attacks upon Japanese restaurants and similar anti-Japanese incidents in San Francisco, as it is held that it concerns the lasting personal rights of Japan. The reply of the San Francisco authorities to the Consul's representation is being awaited with considerable impatience. Pending this reply no official action has yet been taken by the Tokyo government.

\$75,000 Worth of Toast.

RATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 4.—The main building of the Toasted Corn Flakes Company's plant was destroyed by fire today. Loss, \$75,000. Three firemen were severely injured and a Grand Trunk Railway fireman was killed by being struck by a live wire while working among the debris.

HOW TO GET PEACE

Nelidoff Tells Americans Arbitration Is Way.

DECLARES CZAR'S POLICY

General Arbitration Treaty Will Advance Limitation of Armaments. Agreement Near on the Restriction of Mines.

THE HAGUE, July 4.—President Nelidoff, of the peace conference, today received Miss Anna Eckstein, of Boston, Mass., who presented a petition signed by over 2,000,000 Americans in favor of a general arbitration treaty.

M. Nelidoff congratulated her on the number of signatures and said the petition was in the right direction, for, if any limitation of armaments was possible it would have to be done through arbitration. Russia, he continued, had not renounced her original program, but to carry it out it was necessary to have recourse to arbitration. The development of international law and international courts must be dictated by a full understanding between the states and people, the furtherance of mutual good will and love of Christ.

The conference, M. Nelidoff said, would discuss whether it should meet periodically, but he did not believe that the present conference would arrive at a decision on the subject.

Robert Treat Palin, president of the American Peace Society, who was present at the interview between M. Nelidoff and Miss Eckstein, said that it assumed great importance owing to the fact that it occurred on the Fourth of July, which he considered to be a good omen.

The subcommittee on the bombardment of harbors, laying of mines, etc., met this afternoon. Dr. Hagerup (Norway) presiding. He summarized the propositions presented and proposed that the committee take up the British proposition prohibiting the laying of floating mines as a basis for discussion. After statements from several of the delegates, Count Nigra, of R. M. Great Britain, declared that the British government would accept the Italian and Japanese amendments, permitting the laying of floating mines, on condition that they are provided with some apparatus which would render them inoffensive after the expiration of a certain period. Italy proposes that the same rule be applied to fixed mines, so as to render them useless if they break adrift.

DEMANDS MACLEAN'S LIBERTY

Britain Urges Sultan to Act—General's Valorous Deeds.

LONDON, July 4.—The British government has demanded of the Moroccan government that prompt steps be taken to secure the release of General Sir Harry MacLean, commander-in-chief of the Sultan's bodyguard, who was captured by Raisul, the bandit chief.

No uneasiness is felt here about the safety of General MacLean, but it is believed that with so powerful a personage as a hostage Raisul will drive a hard bargain with the Sultan.

MacLean's handsome daughter is credited with having great influence with the Sultan. In fact, she is styled "the Empress of Morocco."

INSULT TO FRENCH ENVOY

Nigra Gives Emperor's Version of Franco-German War.

ROME, July 4.—Much interest has been aroused in this city by the publication of extracts from the unpublished memoirs of Constantino Nigra, dean of the Italian diplomats, whose death was announced two days ago. Count Nigra records a conversation he had with Emperor William I at Ems in 1870.

The Emperor related to Count Nigra the events which were the direct cause of the Franco-Prussian war. The French Ambassador, he said, after the withdrawal of the Hohenzollern candidature to the throne of Spain, demanded William's assurance that this candidature would not be again proposed. This the Emperor refused and notified the Ambassador that he could not receive him again. The same day Bismarck sent a dispatch to all the Prussian Ambassadors relating the incidents.

"The French government," the Emperor continued to Count Nigra, "considered the manner in which this dispatch announced the refusal of a second audience to constitute an insult to France and without awaiting other explanation the Emperor Napoleon declared war against me."

Croatian Deputies on Strike.

BUDAPEST, July 4.—After a final protest against the provision in the government's railroad bill requiring the exclusive use of the Hungarian language in the railroad service, 40 Croatian Deputies today left the lower house of Parliament in a body and refused to further participate in its work.

The Croats claim that the language provision is a violation of the Hungarian-Croatian compromise, and they obstructed the measure for weeks until finally the Hungarian government proposed the bill by decree, causing a further embitterment of the relations between Croats and Hungarians.

Sentence on Premier's Murderers.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, July 4.—A court-martial this morning sentenced Petroff, the murderer of Premier Petkoff, to death. His two accessories were condemned respectively to life imprisonment and 15 years' penal servitude. The Premier was assassinated at Sofia, March 11, while walking in Boras Garden with other Ministers. The assassin fired three bullets into the Premier's body and he died instantly. The murderer was a dismissed employe of the Agricultural Bank.

Color Line in British Army.

LONDON, July 4.—The British Admiralty and War Office have both drawn the color line against a youth born in London of a negro father and English mother. On the death of his parents the appointed guardians took charge of the boy.

PORTLAND EASILY FIRST

SENIOR FOURS LEAD ALL OTHERS IN OAR CONTEST.

Oregon Team in Class by Itself, the Other Contestants Dragging Ten Lengths Behind.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—Portland won the senior fours today so easily that it looked as if the Portland club was in a class by itself, and the four other teams entered in the North Pacific Association of amateur oarsmen races ought to practice by themselves. The Portland team was 16 lengths ahead of Vancouver, which finished second. Nelson, Seattle, and James Bay of Victoria were grouped right behind Vancouver in the order named. The Portland crew was E. E. Loomis, stroke; A. C. McMicken, 2; J. A. Dillabough, 3; A. A. Allen, bow. Time, 9:37.

Portland has taken one first and three seconds in the two days' racing, and goes home with the best record made on the Lake Washington course.

James Bay club, of Victoria, won the junior doubles in 10:43.5. With Nelson second, Vancouver lost an oarlock near the finish, but was hopelessly beaten, and the accident did not change the result. After leading nearly all the way, Des Brissey, of Nelson, was passed, in the senior singles, by C. G. Laing, of Vancouver, and Gloss, of Portland, who finished first and second, respectively.

Laing yesterday won the junior singles, then today pulled an oar in Vancouver's senior four and topped off by winning the senior singles on pure gameness, for he collapsed after crossing the line.

James Bay, of Victoria, took the first and second, Portland second and Vancouver third.

Have Lofty Ideas.

ST. LOUIS, July 4.—The balloon St. Louis, recently purchased by Russell E. Gardner for entry in the Aero Club balloon tournament in October, was used in a test trip today by H. E. Honeywell, a professional aeronaut, accompanied by H. E. Cartwright, secretary to Mr. Gardner. The balloon shot straight up and drifted slowly east. It was the intention of the aeronauts to remain up all day and endeavor to reach an altitude of 10,000 feet.



PROVES HIMSELF A HERO

RISKS OWN LIFE TO SAVE BOAT AND PASSENGERS.

Fireman Benson Plunges Through Blazing Oil and Puts Out Fire—He Will Die.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—Charles Benson, a fireman on the excursion steamer *Vashon*, plunged headlong into a blazing stream of oil tonight and turned off a stopcock, preventing a further flow of oil and saving both the boat and the passengers.

Benson was so badly burned that he will die. The excursion steamer was crowded with passengers, and a panic was narrowly averted after the danger had passed. The feed pipe leading from the oil tank to the burners burst, and the oil began blazing immediately. Benson heroically sacrificed himself to prevent disaster.
