FILL BY DREDGE COMPLETED.—The fill of the Port of Portland dredge has been making for private parties between East Washington, East Stark, East First and East Second streets has been completed, and the dredge has been taken down the river. In all 10 blocks were filled in by the dredge between Belmont and East Stark, although but one block was filled north of East Washington street. The movement to fill was started as an experiment, but proved an entire success, so much so that a contract to fill about 20 blocks with the intervening streets was let to the Pacific Bridge Company south of Belmont street.

BOAT ON TRACKS GOOD WORK.—J. B. Labor, secretary of the Portland Board of Trade, said yesterday that during the month of July his office received more inquiries and sent out more literature than during any month since the establishment. Between 1500 and 2000 letters have been received from all sections of the country asking for information regarding farm lands, lumber lands and the opportunities for mercantile establishments and other enterprises in this state. The majority of the inquiries are from Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska and Indian Territory.

BERT PILKINGTON MARRIED.—Bert Pilkington, a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College and chemist in the office of J. W. Bailey, of Portland, Pure Food Commissioner, was married last night to Miss Anna Bleege, at the home of her father in South Portland, in the presence of a few invited guests. Mr. Pilkington was a famous football player of the O. A. C. and holds several athletic records. His bride also attended the Agricultural College, where the romance began that ended so happily last night. Mr. and Mrs. Pilkington will live in Portland.

FIRE CHIMNELS TELEPHONE SYSTEM.—Fire which partly destroyed the factory of the Sanitarium Food Company at East Twenty-seventh and Belmont streets yesterday afternoon burned an entire block of the 150-pair cable that the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company installed last Spring, immediately after the silver thaw. About 400 telephones were put out of use by the burning of the cable. The cable will be repaired and the telephones in service again some time today.

WING LEE FINED \$75.—Wing Lee was before Judge Cameron yesterday for practicing medicine without a license. Oscar Johnson was troubled with rheumatism and Wing Lee attempted to relieve the patient by applying some inflammable liquid to his knee and then setting fire to it. The Chinese "doctor" pleaded guilty and was fined \$75.

FEW EXCELSIORS ARRIVE.—Only a few delegates from the Christian Endeavor Convention at Seattle passed through the city yesterday, and these were on regular trains. They were informally entertained at the depot by the reception committee. More visitors on special trains are expected today.

NEW ASSISTANT PASTOR COMES.—Rev. F. E. A. Smith, formerly assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spokane, will arrive in Portland today to take up his duties as assistant pastor of the White Temple. An informal reception will be given him at the prayer meeting tonight. Rev. Mr. Smith began his career in Y. M. C. A. work with H. W. Stone in Texas. He was with the Cleveland (O.) Y. M. C. A. for five years. He will take complete charge of the financial work of the White Temple, and general oversight of the work for men.

THE FIRST UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.—The First United Presbyterian Church will soon begin the erection of what practically amounts to a new church building. The old building is to be transformed into a Sunday-school department, and a new auditorium added. A committee appointed to solicit funds and secure plans has completed its work, and a congregational meeting is to be held this evening to complete the details necessary to letting the contracts. When completed, this congregation will have a property worth \$100,000.

PROTECT LIVES OF PUBLIC

REPUBLICAN CIVIC LEAGUE OUT FOR REFORM.

State Organization Urges City Council to Prohibit Doors That Form Firetraps.

On behalf of the Oregon Republican Civic League Robert G. Morrow appeared before the Council to urge that a law be passed to require the closing of public buildings of doors that open outward. He declared that in a great many hotels, rooming-houses, stores and office buildings the doors open inward only, and would probably cause a blockage and loss of life in case of fire. Besides submitting a communication, Mr. Morrow spoke in favor of an ordinance to remedy this condition. The matter was referred to the committee on health and police.

Mr. Morrow cited the Iroquois fire in Chicago as an example of the way which doors that cannot be opened outward menace life. He said that he had found that churches and saloons have the proper kind of doors and, upon suggestion of Baker, admitted that most of the Portland theaters can be placed in this category. It is equally as important, however, he declared, that other public and semi-public buildings provide in this way for the safety of their tenants.

That doors should open outward in all cases, Mr. Morrow said was desirable, but he was ready to go further than that and require swinging doors. In case of fire, swinging doors, he said, are desirable so that the people can pass from the building and the firemen enter with equal facility. His communication followed:

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Council of the City of Portland, Or.:
 On behalf of the Oregon Republican Civic League I have the honor to invite your attention to the condition of public buildings in this city, which is a continual menace to the safety of the occupants of such buildings and the safety and life of those who have occasion to visit them. Many of our public churches, some of our theaters, substantially all the large stores and practically all the commercial and family hotels can be entered only by doors that open inward. In case of excitement or panic from any cause persons coming to these doors will be obliged to open the doors inward before being able to leave the building. It will not be necessary to invite your attention to the fact that in times of excitement it will be impossible to open even one of these doors and it shall be open it is almost certain to be closed again through the entanglement of the clothing with the door fastenings.

In the case of hotels and particularly theaters and halls an alarm of fire or any panic is practically certain to cause an appalling loss of life to the persons in the building. This condition of affairs extends as well to our restaurants and lodging-houses.

On behalf of the Civic League I have the honor to suggest that some steps be taken in the interest of public safety to remedy the present conditions.

The Civic League will be glad to cooperate with the public authorities in any way to remedy the existing conditions, and it is suggested that the proprietors of places where persons go in numbers be obliged to provide swinging doors in place of those now used.
