 TION SCENE OF BATTLE.**

Pistols and Knives Are Brandished
 and Delegates Felled With Chairs.
 Marshall Restores Order.

MUSKOGEE, I. T., July 18.—An at-
 tempt by Henry Asp, a railroad attorney
 of Guthrie, to address the Republican
 county convention here today converted
 the meeting into a howling, fighting mob.
 Pistols were brandished, knives flashed
 and chairs were wielded right and left,
 resulting in bruises and minor injuries to
 several persons. Officers with drawn
 pistols, who threatened to shoot into the
 crowd if the fighting did not stop, failed
 to quell the disturbance.
 Deputy Marshal Bud Ledbetter ap-
 peared on the scene and practically took
 charge of the meeting. Ledbetter, who
 is a Democrat, saved Asp from being
 mobbed, and prevented bloodshed. Asp,
 pale and trembling, was taken from the
 meeting.

MAGILL'S OTHER VICTIM

Former Sweetheart Takes Strychnine
 in Cemetery.

CHICAGO, July 18.—A dispatch to the
 Record-Herald from Clinton, Ill., says:
 Mrs. Mabel Parrett, said to be an old
 sweetheart of Fred H. Magill, who, with
 his bride, is a prisoner at San Diego,
 Cal., on a murder charge, was found un-
 conscious last night on the grave of Mrs.
 Magill, his alleged victim. She had
 taken strychnine, and, despite the efforts
 of physicians, who are working over her,
 her attempt at suicide may be successful.
 The young woman was sometimes known
 under the name of Lillian Ryan.
 The woman has not been living with her
 husband for several months. It is alleged
 that the cause of the separation was Fred
 Magill's attentions to her.
 Mrs. Parrett is 22 years of age and hand-
 some. Late in the night it was announced
 by the attending physician that she has
 a chance to recover.
 The body of Mrs. Magill was exhumed
 last night. Over two hours were con-

**sumed in the task, which was performed
 by two professional grave diggers. They
 were watched over by eight doctors
 among whom were two specialists from
 Chicago.**

The two Chicago specialists carried back
 with them in large jars all the vital or-
 gans of the body of Pet Magill.
 It will be at least ten days, possibly
 15 days before it will be possible to an-
 nounce the result of the analysis.
Canada at Irrigation Fair.
 SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 18.—Canada

 tries by the management of the exposi-
 tion.

ECLIPSE CAUSES TROUBLE**IGORROTES THINK DARKENED
 MOON PORTENDS STRIFE.**

Surround American Teacher's House
 in Freney—Pedagogue Asks for
 Transfer From the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—(Special)—J.
 C. Early, an American school teacher, has
 requested the insular bureau of the War
 Department to change his assignment
 and take him out of the Igorrotes coun-
 try, before there are any more eclipses.
 According to advice received here the
 natives became alarmed over an eclipse.
 As the darkness deepened the Igorrotes
 spread the news that the "maestro Ameri-
 cano" had used his mysterious powers
 to pull a veil over the moon that had
 shone on the land of the Igorrotes for
 eternity, as a punishment for some fan-
 ciful offense.
 As this news is spread by the chiefs,
 all the people in the vicinity gather in
 front of the house of the teacher looking
 for trouble. They demand that the Ameri-
 can be laid low. It was a test of endur-
 ance between the anger of the natives

**and the eclipse of the moon. The former
 finished strong, but lost.**

READY TO FIGHT PACKERS

Livestock Exchange Convention to
 Consider Post Mortem.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 18.—Livestock
 commission firms in the 15 principal mar-
 kets of the country, that do an annual
 business estimated at \$80,000,000, were rep-
 resented here today at the opening of the
 19th annual meeting of the National Livestock
 Exchange Association. The live-
 stock centers represented included nearly
 every city of importance from Buffalo to
 Denver and from St. Paul to Fort Worth.
 Twenty delegates came from Chicago.
 The National Exchange is practically
 the clearing-house for the various local
 exchanges. James C. Swift, of Kansas
 City, the president, said this morning that
 the morning question, among other things,
 will be discussed and said of it in his
 annual address:
 "While we regret the passing of
 the 7-cent hog, we rejoice that his
 memory bears no taint of post mor-
 tem, and that he left with us the ever-
 welcome 7-cent steer and the lowly
 sheep, with his high-priced fleece and
 strong-smelling mutton."
 Mr. Swift said that livestock exchanges

**for years had been the butt for shafts
 of cheap ridicule and the basis for criti-
 cism born either of malice or igno-
 rance. But now he said there was a
 better understanding of the proposi-
 tion that these organizations are
 formed primarily to preserve and main-
 tain the absolute integrity of contract
 and to guarantee to every man who
 patronizes our markets an absolute,
 open and unquestionable square deal.**

"We wish to be understood as fully
 appreciating the great savings and ben-
 efits accruing from modern packing
 methods," said Mr. Swift.

MULFORD GOES TO PRISON

Ex-Army Officer Who Wrecked Bank
 at Manila.

MANILA, July 18.—P. O. Mulford,
 former cashier of the defunct American
 Bank at Manila, was today sentenced
 to imprisonment for eight years and
 ten months on conviction of having falsi-
 fied notes purporting to be part of
 the assets of the bank.
 WASHINGTON, July 18.—The Mul-
 ford referred to in the above dispatch
 appears in the official records here to
 be H. E. Mulford, who went to Manila
 in 1898 as a major in the Volunteer
 Nebraska regiment. After being mustered
 out he was engaged in various

**enterprises, among others founding
 the American Bank at Manila, of which
 he was manager. He was charged
 with embezzlement and gross misman-
 agement in making loans of the bank's
 funds to Chinamen and irresponsible
 characters without sufficient security.
 His embezzlement was fixed at \$40-
 000, and on December 17, 1905, he was
 sentenced to six years' imprisonment.
 He appealed from that sentence and it
 is understood that the action today is
 taken by the court upon his appeal.
 Meanwhile, he has been conducting a
 newspaper in Manila.**
