

BARNEY JOY HAS IT HIS OWN WAY

Hawaiian Twirls San Francisco to Victory, Shutting Out the Beavers.

CALIFF WILD FROM START

Passes and Loose Fielding Give Visitors Lead, While McCredie's Doubles Offer Chances Which Portland Falls to Improve.

Barney Joy was the whole show at yesterday's matinee at the Vaughn street inclosure, and the way he thwarted the ambitions of the home team was shameful. The big Hawaiian had everything in the pitching line and it was no exertion for him to plaster on a nice coating of whitewash as the Portland portion of the run-getting. The score was: San Francisco, 4; Portland, 0.

Califf, the Oregon City wonder, was brought forth by McCredie as the Sunday attraction, and on account of his previous good luck against the Seals, the locals were confident of victory. Califf lacked control, however, and when two runs were scored as the result of his liberality in the second and third innings, it became evident that San Francisco was to have somewhat the better of the argument. Big Barney Joy had excellent control, and was as stingy with his hits as John Manning is in giving permission to the thirty ones to partake of their favorite beverages on a Sunday afternoon.

Irwin started the second chapter by securing a ticket. He took second on Williams' drive to center, and was advanced to third on Spencer's out. Street belted a long fly to Seasey, and Irwin registered. Kid Mohler emulated Irwin's example in the third and was sacrificed to second by Wheeler. Hildebrand beat out an infield tap which sent Mohler to third, from which he scored on Irwin's flyout to Lovett.

Seals Got One Earned Run.

The Seals' third run came in the seventh. Shaughnessy, the first man up, worked Califf as hard as he could. He was sacrificed to second by Wheeler. "K.D." Wheeler's out put the long Irishman on third, and Hildebrand's second infield hit brought him over the register. The fourth tally came in the ninth. Shaughnessy laced one of Califf's benders for two bases, and scored when Kid Mohler's hit one past Mott.

Portland's only look in at the scoring occurred in the second and ninth innings, when Walter McCredie was guilty of finding Joy for a couple of doubles. On each occasion the Seals were left as those following were unable to make any impression on Joy, although Passey managed to beat his hit to Williams in the ninth, which seemed to create a little work all for Donohue wound things up by popping a fly to Mohler.

Califf was not hit hard in any inning until the ninth, but his passes aided by slow fielding was enough to allow the tourists of the visitors to make the circuit a few times. In the ninth they found him for hard drives.

Angels to Play Next.

The other extra base swipe of the engagement was made by big Mike Shaughnessy, who Notre Dame College player, who holds down the right garden for the Seals.

Shaughnessy, or "Shag" as his teammates and friends call him, attended Notre Dame at the same time as Frank J. Lonergan, the well-known local athlete and football player. "Shag" and "Lonny" were members of the varsity at the same time, and were rated as two of the star members of the most famous eleven that institution ever produced.

Wheeler, San Francisco's all-around

player, seems to improve with age. George was a member of the Los Angeles team when the Pacific Coast League was organized five years ago, and at that time it was said that he had played ball longer than either Van Halten or Pete Lohman, and today is playing as good a game as when he was in his prime.

GAME STARTS ROW

Woodburn Angered at Umpire, Breaks Up Contest.

FRANKS DECLARED WINNER

Visitors Had Big Lead and Locals Were Outclassed—Other Decisions of Cheyenne Were Considered Fair Without Question.

WOODBURN, Or., July 21.—(Special.)—The Woodburn baseball team, top notchers on the percentage ladder of the Tri-City League, forfeited the game to the Frakes today, after five and a half innings of play. The game was the scene of a great deal of trouble. In the first of the sixth inning, Umpire Cheyenne called Johnson, the fast outfielder of the Frakes, safe on a steal of third base. This angered the Woodburn players and rooters, and they rushed on the field in a body. Umpire Cheyenne called for the players to clear the field, but before he could do so, the Woodburn captain declared that they would forfeit the game. Cheyenne then declared the game won by the Frakes, 9 to 0. After the decision, when the Frakes backers went back to Woodburn, and tried to collect their bets, the Woodburn sports declared they would not pay
