## ECLIPSE OF MOON TONIGHT

Shadow Will First Be Visible at 6:54 and Will Vanish at 9:31 o'clock.

The second partial eclipse of the moon for the year 1907, visible from Portland, will take place between 6:54 and 9:31 o'clock tonight. Although the hour is early the strange phenomenon can be witnessed by the people of this city between the hours indicated. The first eclipse of the year, visible only on the Pacific Coast, occurred January 29.

Tonight's partial eclipse will be visible only in the United States. The hour when the moon will be partially obscured from the vision in different cities in the United States will be as follows, the first hour indicating the time when the moon enters the shadow and the second hour the time it leaves the shadow:

## Mining Company Bankrupt.

With liabilities aggregating \$6175.08 and assets consisting of real estate of the estimated value of \$30,000, the Quartz Gold Mining Company, of this city, yesterday filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States Circuit Court. The officers of the company who filed the petition were: A. E. Van Ormon and George Park, of Portland, and E. J. Huxford, of St. John.

## TRUST COMPANY ELECTION.

At their annual meeting yesterday afternoon the stockholders of the Title, Guarantee & Trust Company re-elected the old officers and in addition elected Charles H. Kopf to the newly-created position of assistant treasurer. The firm was established April 18, 1887, and is therefore celebrating its twenty-first year. The officers are: J. Thorburn Ross, president; George H. Hill, vice president; T. T. Burkhardt, treasurer, and John E. Aitchison, secretary.

**PORTLAND NEAR TOP.**—Contributions to the Edward MacDowell fund have reached the sum of \$35,000. Portland is now eighth in order on the list of contributing cities—New York, Brooklyn, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, Cleveland and Detroit only having larger donations to their credit. It is proposed to raise the total to \$100,000. The fund is being raised for the benefit of the famous American composer, who has been seriously ill for a long time.

**PUBLIC BATHS CLOSED.**—Owing to a leak discovered in one of the pontoons of the Portland Free Swimming Baths' float, the place will be closed for several days. The leaky pontoon has been hauled out on the ways at Supple's boatyard and will be recaked. In all probability the float will be launched tomorrow and the baths reopened to the public.

**BASE LINE PROPERTY SOLD.**—Buchtel & Kern yesterday sold part of the Henry Batten property on the Base Line Road, near East Portland street to J. Reed for \$10,000. The land lies on the south side of the road. This is the largest sale of the sort in that neighborhood for some time.

## PLAN PICNIC CELEBRATION

**STREET RAILWAY EMPLOYEES TO MEET AT THE OAKS.**  
 Brotherhood Will Use Proceeds From Sale of Tickets for the Sick Benefit Fund.

At a full meeting of the Brotherhood of Electric Street Railway Employees last night arrangements were announced as completed for a grand picnic celebration for August 8, the proceeds from the sale of tickets and other revenues to be applied to the treasury of the sick benefit fund of the organization. The committee in charge of the plans are as follows: Oscar Stanley, chairman general committee; A. C. Burns, O. W. P.; James Morgan, East Ankeny; A. M. Singleton, Saylor; C. J. Anderson, Piedmont. Also others of the soliciting committee as follows: Chester Curry, Theo. Shankland, Henry Hewitt, John Siles, Goolb, Patience, James Thomas, George Huston, George Marshall, N. E. Tyrrell, Frank Alger, C. J. Anderson and W. V. Horton.

The electric street railway employees of Portland have for some time been looking after their sick and disabled brothers, doing a great deal of benefit work of which the public hears little. This organization has been very successful and performs an ideal mission of co-operation. Within recent months a number of accidents have occurred which, while not very serious, have incapacitated members of the society from performing their duties, and the benefit fund of the society has been heavily drawn upon to meet the needs of families of members during their time of stress.

Many prominent men of Portland and numerous merchants strongly approve of and support the work of the association because it applies very properly the principle of help for the working street car brood that is needed.

The annual picnic will be carried out on an elaborate scale and will be made an annual event. The general committee has obtained thus far about \$5 very handsome and useful presents, which will be hung up for winning contestants in athletic games and sports. Among the platform boys of the street cars are many who are devoted to fencing, boxing, wrestling, tug-of-war contests and other feats of skill and strength. The boys expect to have athletic clubhouses divided into the car company soon, and clubs are now being formed in the different divisions. Thursday, August 8, every member of every family connected with the employees will be invited to the picnic, which will be held at the Oaks, and the fun will be for the public as well. It is to be a day for the carmen's organization and a big programme of events will be pulled off, the prizes for which will very shortly be announced. Several trophies, consisting of handsomely engraved medals, besides useful presents, will be hung up, for which there are several eager aspirants.

There will be a lively series of fencing matches, wrestling between more or less well-known local champions, boxing, foot races, swimming races, tug-of-war contests, exhibition drills by and between the Maccabees and the Woodmen of the World, and as a finale a baby show, taking place on the Oaks lawn during the afternoon. D. C. Freeman, manager of the Oaks, has begun assembling a number of prizes for the baby show, and in order that there be as few disappointments as possible where there are so many contestants there will be a great many classes under which entries may be made, with reward suitable for each.

There will be a bicycle race between opposing forces of messengers of the city, and one of the features of the afternoon is promised the committee because a challenge has been issued by the vivacious William DeVeny, a Montaville citizen, to Dan McAllen, the official booster of Portland, for a foot race, and Dan has accepted. A grand ball will be held in the evening and cash prizes will be put up for three champion teams of cakewalkers.

All the proceeds from the sale of tickets and the entries in addition to those put up by the management of the park will go to the committee for the benefit of the sick fund.
