

PEARL READY TO TRY ONCE MORE

Sails in a Few Days on Renewed Search for North Pole.

MAY CAMP THERE A YEAR

Takes Steamer Roosevelt, Greatly Strengthened and Practically the Same Crew—More Delay With Boilers Than With Funds.

WELLMAN'S BALLOON INFLATED.
SPITZBERGEN, Aug. 5.—The balloon of the Wellman-Chicago Record-Herald Polar expedition was successfully inflated today and the party will start for the pole about the middle of August.

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 5.—Commander Robert E. Peary left today for New York, whence he will sail in a few days on an expedition to the North Pole. Commander Peary said today:

"From New York I shall go direct to Sidney, C. B., where I shall call, and there will be no stop on the way, as I have no time to lose.

"My crew this time will be practically the same as on my last trip. Captain Robert Bartlett is to command the Roosevelt. I am going prepared to make every effort to reach the pole. If I do succeed next summer, I shall stay over a year. If I do not succeed, I shall stay one year later. I am taking along everything for a three years' trip."

Commander Peary, giving some details of his plans, said:

"John Murphy, my old boatswain, is to be with me again. I am to have Wardwell, my old chief engineer, Ross G. Martin, of Bucksport, is to be my assistant, and he will be the only Maine member of the party. I am to have a new surgeon. There are several applications for the position, but as yet no one has been chosen. I will settle that when I get to New York."

Asked if he expected to reach the pole this time, Commander Peary said:

"A man who has had an experience in the North knows that to say he will do a certain thing up there is madness. I have learned many lessons from my other trips and I shall profit by all my experience. What I shall find at the pole is a question that cannot be answered until I have reached it."

Asked if he had ample funds for carrying out the expedition, Commander Peary replied:

"I will say one thing, and that is that the delays in repairs on the boilers of the Roosevelt have been and are now worrying me a great deal more than the money with which to finance the expedition."

Commander Peary appeared today to be in rugged health and was full of enthusiasm for the trip.

STRONGER FOR ICE-BATTLE
Steamer Roosevelt Put in Good Repair for Arctic Voyage.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Stronger than ever in her hull, better equipped generally for her battle with the Arctic ice, Commander Peary's steamer Roosevelt lies at Shooters' Island ready to start in a few days on her second trip in search of the North pole.

Since she returned from her last voyage, the Roosevelt has undergone extensive repairs. New plans have been adopted where needed, the hull caulked throughout and a new main topmast sent aloft. A new rudder and rudder post have replaced those crushed by the ice. On deck a new house has been built to furnish better living quarters for the crew of 20 men, all of whom have been shipped for the next expedition. The engines have received a general overhauling and two new Scotch boilers have been installed.

STRIKERS USE THREATS
Miners Arrested Charged With Intention to Blow Up House.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 5.—Twenty-three strikers were arrested at Hibbing tonight, charged with threatening to blow up an Austrian boarding-house. There was a clash between the deputies and the men, but all were landed in jail.

Practically all of the mines upon the Mesaba range were in active operation today.

BOTH CLAIM THE ADVANTAGE
Strikebreakers on Colorado Road. Neill Calls for Facts.

DENVER, Aug. 5.—Both sides were claiming advantage at the end of the second day of the strike of trainmen on the Colorado & Southern Railway. The company announced that it had received applications from men to fill the positions vacated by the strikers, and that it has more men than it needs to take out the passengers.

P. H. Morrisey, grand master of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, who is in charge of the strike, says he is satisfied with the way the strike is going. He says the company is not moving many cars and that there have been no desertions from the ranks of the strikers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Commissioner Neill, of the Bureau of Labor, acting for himself and Chairman Knapp of the Interstate Commerce Commission, today telegraphed to Denver for all of the facts concerning the dispute between the Colorado & Southern Railroad officials and the men. Until this information arrives Mr. Neill is not certain what action will be taken. Under the law, the Commissioner of Labor and the chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission are compelled to give their services for the settlement of a railroad strike when requested by either of the parties to the dispute.

CARMAN IS FATALLY SHOT
Culmination of Attacks by Strikers in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—D. L. Keefer, an employee of the United Railroads Company, was shot and fatally wounded last night at 1020 o'clock at Twenty-ninth and Dolores streets while on his way home. This was the culmination of a number of attacks that were made on cars and carmen during the day. Twenty-nine shots were fired, a number of missiles thrown

and a streetcar nearly demolished during a melee that took place last night between a gang of strike sympathizers and the crew of car 1140. Keefer had turned in his car and was on his way home when the attack was made on him. The identity of his assailants is unknown, as his condition when found was such that he could give no account of the attack. The bullet had penetrated the left shoulder and passing through his body, entered his right wrist. Keefer was removed to St. Luke's Hospital where his condition was said to be critical.

HAYWOOD HOLDS RECEPTION
Hast Lost Weight in Prison—Will Soon Resume Reins.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 5.—William D. Haywood, secretary-treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, was at his desk in the headquarters of the federation this morning. A constant stream of visitors poured through the room, offering greetings and congratulations on his acquittal of the charge of complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho.

Mr. Haywood expressed his pleasure at his reception in this city on his arrival last night, and spoke enthusiastically of the demonstration at Colorado Springs and other points along the road. He looks well, although he says he is 20 pounds lighter than he was when arrested. He expects to remain in Denver for some time, and as soon as possible will take up the thread of his work where he dropped it.

PHONE GIRLS STRIKE AGAIN
Helping Linemen in Montana—Injunction Against Boycott.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 5.—Twenty telephone operators went on strike today in compliance with the request of the Montana Federation of Labor. The strike was ordered as a sympathetic movement for the linemen. Butte and several other cities are without telephone service for a similar reason.

The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Company has applied for a temporary injunction restraining a boycott of the company, and argument thereon will be had before United States Judge Hunt tomorrow.

Teamsters' Union Growing.
BOSTON, Aug. 5.—The fourth annual convention of the Teamsters' International Union, which opened here today, had more delegates in attendance than at any previous gathering. The annual report of the secretary-treasurer, Thomas L. Hughes, of Chicago, showed that despite the sessions of a year ago the union had increased its membership materially; also that greater gains were made toward the betterment of wages and conditions during the past 12 months than in the five years preceding. The chief interest among the delegates centered in the fight for re-election of President Cornelius P. Shea, who was opposed by John F. Tobin, president of the Boston council.

Lithographers Admit Defeat.
NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The struggle of the Lithographic Artists, Engravers & Designers' League with the National Association of Employing Lithographers, which began in August, 1906, has ended as a result of the abandonment of the fight by the union. The trouble had its origin in posting of open shop notices by the employers. The men refused to quit the union and were locked out in St. Louis and other cities. The workers are now seeking their old positions.

Coal Conference Postponed.
PITTSBURGH, Aug. 5.—Because of the illness of President F. W. Clegg, president of District No. 5 of the United Mineworkers of America, the conference between the miners' organization officials and the Pittsburgh Coal Company was postponed until tomorrow.

MRS. FISH SNUBS ENEMIES
VANDERBILT AND GOELETS LEFT OUT IN COLD.

Visit of Swedish Prince to Newport Gives Society Leader Her Opportunity for Revenge.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish has administered a blow to Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt and her friends. The Swedish prince, who will have no part in entertaining Crown Prince William, of Sweden, who is to make a five days' visit here.

Society and financial circles see in this retaliation for the overthrow of Stuyvesant Fish by the Harriman faction. Cornelius Vanderbilt stood with Harriman, hence Mrs. Vanderbilt is left out. Mrs. Goelet is her sister, and her son, Robert W. Goelet, also supported Harriman, so she is cut out of the plans.

It is a notable victory for Mrs. Fish, for it will be the first time in history that a titled foreigner has come to Newport to find the Vanderbilts and Goellets dark.

SALT LAKE MAYOR RESIGNS
Internal Trouble in American Party Given as Reason.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 5.—The resignation of Ezra Thompson as Mayor of Salt Lake was sent to the City Council this evening. Mayor Thompson was elected in November, 1906, by the American, or Inter-Mormon party. His retirement, following close on the resignation of Chief of Police Shreve, is taken as an indication of internal differences in the American party. Mr. Thompson's term would have expired on January 1. Ill-health is given as the reason for the Mayor's resignation. His decision that it has any political significance.

WHOLE TRAIN IS DITCHED
North Coast Limited Hits Open Switch—No Person Injured.

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 5.—A Miner special from Billings, Mont., states that the entire train of the North Coast Limited of the Northern Pacific was ditched at Grey Cliff, about 60 miles west of Billings, this morning, the train dashing through an open switch. No one was injured, though the passengers were badly shaken up.

STUDY DESCHUTES LAND PROJECT

State and Federal Officials to Make Trip to the Deschutes Country.

DEFENDS THE CONTRACT

Governor Chamberlain Says Only Mistake Possible Is in Amount of Lien Granted Company for Reclaiming Land.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—The exact status of the Deschutes Irrigation project will be determined by representatives of the state and the United States, for on Saturday Thomas B. Neuhausen, John T. Whistler, in charge of the United States Reclamation Service in Oregon, Governor Chamberlain, State Engineer Lewis and ex-State Land Agent Oswald West will leave for the Deschutes country on a special tour of investigation. Just what the particular purpose of the trip is, has not been announced, but it is evident that these officials intend to find out from an investigation of water supply and character of canals already constructed, whether the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company has a feasible project and is carrying it out in good faith.

Mr. Neuhausen is the head of the party, and is accompanied by Mr. Whistler as an expert hydrographer. Governor Chamberlain and State Engineer Lewis will go as guests of the Federal officials.

Project Differs From Wagon Roads.
"I cannot see that this reclamation project has any similarity to the wagon-road grants," said Governor Chamberlain this evening, in discussing the project that has been made against the new contract the State Land Board has entered into with the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company. "In the case of the wagon-road grants the land was given to the wagon-road companies and they were permitted to withhold it from settlement. The lands to be reclaimed are not given to the reclamation company, but under the contracts we have made they must be sold to settlers. Under no circumstances can the reclamation companies acquire title to the land. Neither can the land be withheld from settlement, for our contracts expressly provide for sale to applicants in the order of application."

Possible Mistake in Amount of Lien.
"The only possible mistake we may have made was in the amount of the lien we allowed the reclamation company for reclaiming the land. I do not believe there was a mistake there, but if there was, it is the only one."

"We were confronted by a serious situation. Under a contract made several years ago, the reclamation company had begun the construction of a canal system and was to have a lien of \$10 an acre. Part of the system had been completed and the company had made sales to intending settlers aggregating 40,000 acres. The company had taken part payments. Much of the land for the sale of which it had made contracts was 20 miles or more from a ditch. With matters in that condition the company became financially embarrassed and could not proceed with its work. There is no doubt whatever that the first reclamation contract was taken at too low a figure. The irrigation system could not have been completed for the amount specified, \$10 an acre."

Project Could Not Be Given Up.
The question presented before the State Land Board was, therefore, whether to raise the lien so that the company could proceed with the work, or let the project be abandoned and the settlers lose what they have already paid. We chose the former course, and in doing so gained a number of advantages."

"The old contract gave the board no control of the sale of land, made no provision as to the plans and specifications for the canals, and gave the company a perpetual right to charge a toll of \$1 per acre per year for water. The new contract we have made gives the board the power to say when and where land may be sold and when it shall be deemed to be reclaimed. The company has been selling land without water within 20 miles of it. There will be no more of that."

"The new contracts make the settlers owners of the reclamation at the end of ten years, and reduces the annual charge to 80 cents an acre in the meantime. The new contract provides for the deposit of \$1 an acre, amounting

in all to about \$100,000, as a guarantee that the system will be turned over to the settlers in good condition. As we have the power to say when they can sell land, and can insist upon the building the canal before they sell the land, it seems to me that the deposit is sufficient security."

Cannot Keep Land Themselves.
"The only way the reclamation company can get any money out of the project is by selling to settlers. If the new price is too high, settlers will not buy and they will be compelled to sell for less. They cannot refuse to sell to any settler who tenders them the purchase price, and they could have no object in refusing, for they cannot possibly get title to the land themselves."

"Of course it is possible that we placed the price too high, but after a careful and prolonged investigation we concluded that an average of 25c, or \$150 for waste land and \$40 for irrigable land, was reasonable. The raise, of course, affects only the lands not yet sold."

"Since the protest has been made I have gone over the new contract carefully and can see nothing that I would do differently if I were doing it again. Thus far I have not heard one word of protest from a settler or an intending settler."

NOT ALL JOY FOR ELOPERS

MISS MILLER SWEARS LONG TREATS HER CRUELLY.
Deserted Wife in Portland Traces Recreant Husband to Colorado Springs and Goes After Him.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—J. M. Long, Jr., claiming to be a son of Senator J. M. Long, of Portland, Or., was today arrested on a warrant sworn out by Lucille Miller, charging him with cruelty. Long admits deserting his wife and child and eloping with Miss Miller, alias Miss Mabel Hinchman. Mrs. Long has traced the pair and is expected to arrive tomorrow.

The J. M. Long referred to would appear to be Joel M. Long, Jr., secretary of the Chambers Shingle Company and son of a former City Attorney, Joel M. Long, Sr.

tion, Mrs. Nenadal is constantly watched lest she renew an attempt at suicide which she made some time ago. On that occasion she took her little daughter by her arms and was about to plunge into a stream, when he husband found and restrained her.

MURDERER CAPTURED BY MOB
Shoots Bosom Friend Dead and Narrowly Escapes Lynching.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 5.—After shooting down his chum in cold blood and then attempting to chop the body to pieces with a hatchet in the street at Blair Station, 24 miles from this city, Adam Lacach, a foreigner, was rescued from a mob that tried to lynch him and was landed in jail at Blairton tonight.

The shooting occurred in the main street of Blairton and was the result of a complaint of a misdemeanor made to the police by Joseph Warech against his friend, Lacach. The latter met Warech tonight and asked him why he made the information. Before Warech could reply Lacach shot him twice with a 38-caliber revolver. Mortally wounded Warech fell and Lacach drew from his clothing a hatchet.

The shots attracted a crowd from a neighboring house and as it rushed to the scene of the tragedy Lacach threw away his hatchet, with which he was about to strike his victim, and ran for the hills. He way lay through the town. The crowd grew with every minute. He finally took refuge in a pile of brush and was surrounded by the mob, and upon a demand that he give himself up he replied by drawing a revolver and threatening to shoot.

In the meantime some of the crowd had gone through the pile of brush and before Lacach could shoot the pistol was knocked from his hand with a club. The man was immediately taken in charge by the mob, but A. L. Critchfield, summoned police from Blairton tonight, and a crowd headed by the mob, the police spirited Lacach away to the jail. Warech was taken to a hospital, where he died in a few minutes.

Warech and Lacach had been close friends for several years, but a few days ago, it is said, they had trouble over a woman.

ONE OUT OF FIVE ARRESTED
Outbreak of Homicide in Chicago Arouses Police to Action.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—On information given by Mrs. Mary Dubois tonight, the police arrested Joseph Glasbrook in connection with the murder of Policeman Edward Smith, who was shot and killed

near his home early today. Glasbrook is suspected of having killed Smith in a quarrel over a woman. No charge has been placed against Glasbrook, but he will be held to await the action of the Coroner's jury.

The killing of Smith was one of five mysterious assaults early today, in which four men were killed and one fatally wounded. The other victims besides Smith were:

John L. Barbour, found dead upon the Illinois Central tracks. The head had been cut off by a train and was found 100 feet down the track. It is believed that Barbour committed suicide, but there are circumstances that make this doubtful.

John Naughton died after being assaulted by three strangers at Thirty-seventh street and Lowe avenue. William Donovan, dying of a bullet wound in the abdomen. He was found in a basement at 448 Hermitage avenue and said he had been mobbed by three men, one of whom shot him when he attempted to resist.

ASSESSES THE FRANCHISES
Tacoma Assessor Hits Corporations and Raises Values \$7,000,000.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—County Assessor Rallsback has raised the assessment valuations of personal property holdings \$7,000,000.

While nearly all the companies in this city have always said they could not be assessed for a franchise, the assessor has accomplished the difficult task, basing his authority on the charter and ordinance book revised by the City Council in the year 1898. The companies owning franchises are all assessed for the year 1907. Many of the corporations refused point blank to give assistance to the experts. The street railway company is valued from \$567,348 to \$1,922,349 and the Seattle-Tacoma Power Company from \$63,000 to \$251,000.

The general increase runs from 100 to 300 per cent.

FINES COAL-LAND THIEVES
Judge Riner Sentences Holbrook, Lonebaugh and Philamy.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 5.—In the Federal Court Judge J. A. Riner this afternoon overruled the motion for a new trial in the cases of E. M. Holbrook, E. E. Lonebaugh and Robert McPhlamy, recently convicted here of conspiracy to defraud the Government in the acquisition of coal land at Monarch, Wyo. The Judge imposed a fine of \$10,000 each on Holbrook and Lonebaugh and a \$20,000 fine on McPhlamy, whom he designated as the tool of the coal miners. Each must pay one-third of the costs and stand committed to the county jail until the fines and costs are paid.

The cases will be appealed to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.

VOLIVA DESERTS ZION CITY

INTENDS TO ESTABLISH NEW COLONY ELSEWHERE.

Refused Co-Receivership With Hately by Federal Court, Successor of Dowie Fights Back.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Refused the petition that he be appointed by Judge Landis, of the United States District Court, a co-receiver with John C. Hately, now in charge of the Zion City property, and unheeded in his protests against the sale of the lace industries, Overseer William Glenn Voliva, who usurped the leadership of John Alexander Dowie, today asserted his defiance of his would-be receiver.

"I shall abandon the old hulk, and the cank for all of me," declared Voliva, as he was leaving the court after his petition had been denied and the sale of the Zion City lace factory for \$380,000.
