

OPEN AT SARATOGA

First Day Has but One Favorite in Front.

M'CARTER TAKES \$10,000

Only Fair Attendance Greets Ponies at Eastern Fashionable Track and Books Reap Big Money in the Day's Results.

SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 5.—A fairly good attendance greeted the runners at the first day's race, the Saratoga Racing Association's meeting today. But one favorite won, El Cuchillo, in the jumping race. McCarter and Running Water, running in the colors of the New-castle stable, won respectively first and second place in the \$10,000 Saratoga handicap. The books laid 9 to 5 against the stable, Dandelion, the favorite, at 11 to 30, made the running to the stretch where both McCarter and Running Water passed him and finished heads apart, with Dandelion four lengths back. RUGBY FOOTBALL THE GAME

Lanagan Converted After Seeing Australians Play It.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Palo Alto, Cal., Aug. 3.—James Lanagan, Stanford's coach, is coming home from Australia converted to an enthusiastic admirer of the game of Rugby football. It is played by the college teams of the Antipodes. At least Dr. David Starr Jordan says so. Dr. Jordan, who arrived Tuesday on the liner Mongolia, says that Lanagan changed his views completely after seeing a few games in Australia and has now come to the conclusion that the Rugby game is the only form of football that college teams can expect the public to tolerate. Dr. Jordan said:

"The game as we have been playing it is nothing more or less than a battle, and is doomed to extinction. The Australian team that came here did not play the game as it is played in the Antipodes. It made certain modifications in its play, and what I thought was wanted in this country. But the game as it is played in Australia, the game that the young Australian begins to play when he is a small boy, is the game that we must come if we wish to keep football as one of our college sports."

Lanagan was sent to Australia by Stanford University to make a study of the Rugby game. From now on, says Dr. Jordan, Lanagan will advocate Rugby unadulterated. A number of Australian college teams are anxious to come to this country, and they want the American college teams to visit the Antipodes, but Lanagan, says Dr. Jordan, thinks that it would be better for the Australians to come here first and give some exhibitions of the game that has won him from his allegiance to the open air murder fest at which young America loves to cripple himself. Lanagan will be here to speak for himself on the next steamer.

WILL ROW FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Three-Cornered Sculling Contest Between Pape, Gloss and Laing.

Alex Pape, the champion single-scul oarsman of the Coast; Ed Gloss, the crack man of the Portland Rowing Club, and F. H. Laing, the Vancouver (B. C.) sculler who defeated Gloss at the Seattle regatta the Fourth of July, will row a three-cornered race on the Willamette on Labor Day. The race will be a part of the regatta given by the Portland Rowing Club in honor of the opening of its new clubhouse.

The three men will probably row at the Astoria regatta, then come on to Portland and row here. The race should be very important, as it will settle once for all the claim for the Coast championship in the single scull. Gloss, the local man, has met Pape twice, but has been defeated both times. In one of the races, which was held on the river, the men were obliged to row to a certain point and turn back and finish at the start. Laing is considered one of the best single-scul men on the Coast. He defeated Gloss at the Seattle regatta and has made a name for himself in the past two seasons.

ENGINE BREAKS ON OCEAN

R. P. Rithet Suffers Accident at Sea. Other News.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 5.—The stern-wheel steamer R. P. Rithet, oldest of the Canadian Pacific Railroad, local fleet, has been towed to port with her starboard engine destroyed. While at the Pender Island wharf the starboard crank-pin broke and the long connecting-rod, cross-head piston and cylinder blew out through the woodwork at the stern. Second Engineer Beatty, standing near the stern wheel, had a narrow escape, the debris flying close to him. He and Chief Engineer Stephen rushed to the engine-room, then full of smoke, and at the risk of being scalded in a cloud of steam shut off the power, and the Rithet was towed to port by the steamer Otter. The steamer is a quarter of a century old, but is outdated by her engine, which was taken from the stern of the Fraser in 1875, to run before the Canadian Pacific Railroad was built.

The British ship Holt, 205 days from Green Rock, overdue and reimported at 8 per cent, arrived tonight in Royal Roads, with cargo, and reported her master, Captain Parker, died at sea on May 24.

was buried at sea. Captain Parker was 50 years of age and the oldest shipmaster in service in the British merchant service, sail or steam, to the time of his death.

The steamer Earl of Douglas, which left here tonight for Clayquot Sound to get a lumber cargo for New York, is the first vessel to load lumber on the west coast of Vancouver Island, where several mills have been recently built.

Seattle Steamer News.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 5.—Transport Dix sails at noon tomorrow for the Philippines and Hawaii. The Dix will carry about 800 tons of provender and supplies. Included in the cargo are 500 Army rifles. The Dix has 75,000 feet of lumber for a new Army barracks at Honolulu.

The overdue British ship Holt Hill is reported towing up the Straits tonight for Tacoma.

The steamship Montana sailed for St. Michael's and Nome tonight with the largest single cargo of general merchandise sent to Nome this year.

Steamship Northwestern arrived today from Namsam and is ready for cargo. The Northwestern has not been in port for five months since she went on the rocks at Beaton's Inlet, Latouche Island.

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WHEAT-MEN SAY IT FAVORS

WAREHOUSE TRUST.

Claim It Was Held Back Till Too Late for Independent Warehousemen to Be Erected.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—The new warehouse ticket which wheat men of the state must do business by has just been sprung on them by the alleged Warehouse Trust, and a great protest is being made. It is claimed that this ticket is so worded as to throttle the independent buyer.

It was not until a week or two ago that the news gradually leaked out that there would be a 50 per cent increase in storage charges. This was kept quiet, local managers claiming they didn't know, as they had not received their tickets. Farmers must waive all claims for loss by fire, and it is said this will raise insurance rates. The man who gets the grain must pay for all storing, handling, re-sacking, twine and other expenses. It is claimed that in this last part the joker lies.

An independent buyer could be assessed enough to make the business prohibitive. Farmers say this thing was held back until too late to have any independent houses erected. This form of ticket calls for a waiver of damages both against the railroad and warehouse, which the growers claim, shows that both of these interests got together on making out the form.

With the increase in prices and the restrictions placed on trade, the growers say they are absolutely at the mercy of the combination.

CLAIMS SHERIFF DID WRONG

Atlas Alleges Eastern Candy Works Was Unlawfully Closed.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Late Saturday evening the Eastern Candy Works' store and factory in this city and its store at Seaside were closed by Sheriff Pomeroy on an attachment suit brought in Multnomah County by the Northrup & Sturge Company, of Portland, to recover about \$800. This morning a suit was filed in the Circuit Court of Multnomah County against the Eastern Candy Works and under a writ of attachment issued in that case, Sheriff Pomeroy wrongfully property and closed and locked the stores. The plaintiff asks to be given possession of the property, or, if that is impossible, he be paid \$500.
