SALEM. Or. Aug. 8 .- (Special )-Fruit-growers of this section of the valley, who have made close observations of conditions in their orchards, have made the discovery that great damage was done to the apple crop by the hot wave which swept over state last week, but the full extent of the damage is not yet known, nor is it likely to be for some weeks.

On the north side of the trees, where the fruit was exposed to the hot blasts of wind, the meat is scorched to the very core and is beginning to turn black. On the south side of the trees, the fruit is badly sunburnt, and both conditions will render it practically unfit for the market.

Reports of this character have only been received from one or two districts of this section, but it is thought the apple crop, and possibly pears, will be seriously damaged and greatly reduced from the effects of the of that one day.

## Butter Firm and in Lighter Supply.

The butter market is very firm and stocks are being steadily reduced, but the future course of prices will depend largely on conditions in other markets. All the city creameries are now at 3235 cents, and most of the Front street butter is being sold at this price.
