Phil-brook last night at 11 o'clock and booked him at police headquarters on a charge him at police headquarters on a charge of attempting to extort \$100 from Mrs. M. L. Crawford and Helen Nebethau, who conduct a massage establishment in the Raieigh building. J. C. Ferguson was ar-rested earlier in the night by Detective Tichenor and is held in the City Jail on a charge of impersonating an officer. A detective's star, the property of the city, was taken from him, and is held as

star Ferguson had, once was worn by Andrew G. Vaughn, a city detective who was removed from the force by order of Mayor Lane a year ago. The arrest of Ferguson brings to light gross careless ness on the part of Chief Gritzmacher, who failed to take from the discharged detective this property of the city. who falled to the from the than got detective this property of the city. Vaughn, it is said, also retains possession of a bunch of keys, belonging to the city and to which he has no legal title, as he himself admits. He kept the star and keys as he says, simply because he was not asked to surrender them.

Back of the arrest of Philbrook and
Ferguson iles a plan, it is said, to implicate Vaughn in the alleged extortion plicate vaughn in the aleged exterior, case in which the two women named in a complaint filed yesterday are concerned. The police are of the belief, and are acting upon the theory, that both Philiprook and Ferguson are in the employ of Vaughn's Detective Agency, which is conducted by the ex-city detective.

Vaughn Ridicules Theory.

Vaughn, when questioned last night, ridiculed the effort of the police to connect him with the attempted crime and said he had no fears for himself. The star found in possession of Ferguson, he declared, was stolen from his offices in the Raleigh building Wednesday night, and he naturally suspects Ferguson the theft. Ferguson did some work for Vaughn during the lumberhandlers' strike but according to Vaughn, has not been in the latter's employ for a long time. Vaughn also deales that Philbrook is one of his agents, although admitting that the latter, too, did some special stenog-raphic work for him on a Southern Oregon case some weeks ago.

Philbrook, according to the police and as alleged in the complaint filed by the women, held himself out to be a city detective one night recently and after drinking a bottle of wine with the two women in their rooms, de-clared they were liable to arrest and threatened to take them to fall unless they gave him \$100. The women did not have the money at the time, but said they would pay it later if he would not arrest them. Philbrook was to return later and get the coin, but

Philbrook was caught at Seventh and Washington streets last night. He was unable to give \$1300 ball and was locked up pending the hearing of the case in the Municipal Court this morning. Philibrook has lived in Port-land a long time and is well known. He worked for Hartman & Thompson at one time in the real estate business.

Astonishing Feature of Case.

The most astonishing feature of the case, as it developed last night, is that all the city detectives who were dis-charged by order of Mayor Lane a year ago, still retain without the slightest right their stars and keys, all of which are the property of the city. The police believe that the same city star that was taken from Ferguson was used by Philbrook on the night that he is alleged to have attempted to story the money from the two to extort the money from the two women who are prosecuting him. SHIP SIAM ARRIVES IN.

Overdue German Vessel Reaches the Columbia River.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug 9 .- (Special.)-The overdue German ship Siam, on which re-insurance had been quoted at 8 per cent, arrived this afternoon, 189 days from London with a cargo of 14,224 casks of ce-ment, consigned to Meyer, Wilson & Co. of Portland. While the vessel arrived in good order, she reports an exceptionally rough trip, especially off the Horn, where she was battered about for over two months and Captain Dirks, her master, says he never encountered so many gales on any other single passage since he has

been going to sea.

The Slam sailed from London February 1 and passed the Lizard four days later. She made an excellent run with fair winds across the Atlantic and 55 days after leaving port sighted Falkland Island passing St. John, Staten Island, on March 30. It was then the trouble com-menced and for two months the ship battled with the elements, her crew worn out and tired from incessant work and her decks awash almost continually, in her attempts to round the Horn into the Pacific. Storm succeeded storm in

apid succession and thrice the ship was riven back almost to Staten Island only o again be at her way against the ter-ible head winds and raging seas. It was not until May 19 that the worst

Injuries were not of a serious nature. Better weather was then encountered and the Siam reached 50 degrees south in the Pacific just 65 days after crossing the same latitude in the Atlantic. From that point a quick run of 25 days was made to the line. Then light winds and calms were encountered in the North Pacific except, that in 20 degrees north, 138 degrees west, a hurricane was struck that continued for eight hours. A very high and confusing sea was running and the wind shifted from north to east,

southeast before it died away.

No damage was done the ship and she No damage was done the ship and she arrived off the mouth of the Columbia late yesterday affernoon, 4i days from the line. While off the Horn, Captain Dirks sighted a number of vessels and was in company with one for nearly two weeks, but did not learn her identity. The only vessels he spoke were an English steamer on March 5, and five days later the German Lloyd steamer Wittenberg which he Lloyd steamer Wittenberg, which asked to report him "all well."

NICOMEDIA CLEARS FOREIGN

German Steamship Carries Wheat and Flower for the Orient.

The steamship Nicomedia, of the Portland and Asiatic Steamship Company's line, cleared yesterday for the Orient. The Nicomedia carried 5910 barrels of flour, valued at \$21,276; 50,000 bushels of wheat, valued at \$37,500, and a general cargo, consisting of lumber, bicycle sup-plies, electrical machinery and groceries, valued at \$18,474.

The Nicomedia is the second grain ves-The Micomedia is the second grain vessel to clear during the month, and is carrying a larger amount of grain than is usual for this season of the year. The steamer Henrik Ibsen was the first of the grain ships to clear for August. She carried a mixed cargo for ports in Japan and North China.


