SURGEON HIMSELF UNDER KNIFE—There is at least one medical man in Oregon who believes in putting into effect the Scriptural injunction, "Physician, heal thyself." Dr. H. E. Clay, of Salem, who finished up some surgical work on the afflicted citizens of the Capital City in the way of separating them from that annoying little useless part of their anatomy known as the vermiform appendix, discovered last week that while he looked engaged in relieving patients of pain and distress he himself had an aggravated case of appendicitis. Forthwith the medical man hired Dr. H. E. Clay, of Salem, to operate on him. The operation was performed at the institution minus one inch and a little over of the "Latin part of his inards." Dr. Clay has for some years been practicing his profession in the city and is surgeon for the new electric line, and in the hop-picking season makes two visits a week to the big Krebs yards at Independence, where he looks after the men, women and children in camp.

WARNED AGAINST IMPOSTER—The Associated Charities has issued a warning to the public against a woman calling herself Mrs. Carrie M. Koshland, of Portland. She alleges herself to be a Polish Catholic, but in reality is a Jewish woman and, according to advices from Seattle authorities, is a well-known impostor. She says her husband was killed in the San Francisco earthquake, but in fact he is in Seattle, where he is a rug peddler. The woman has a child about a month old which has been cared for in the Day Nursery pending the investigation. The mother was provided with board and lodging by the Associated Charities until she could help herself and until her story could be investigated.

REPAIRS TO WESTMINSTER CHURCH—Repairs to Westminster Presbyterian Church, on East 12th, between 6th and 7th streets, will be completed by September, and when Rev. Henry Marcotte, the pastor, returns from his vacation the congregation will meet in the new auditorium. A gallery has been built around three sides of the auditorium, increasing its seating capacity by more than 150. The gallery greatly improved the appearance of the interior of the church. All the walls have been tinted. A water motor has been installed to furnish power for the organ. The improvements will cost about \$300. Money for the work was raised some time ago.

DEATH OF MRS. M. KOHLAND—A message was received in Portland yesterday announcing the death in San Francisco of Mrs. M. Kohlband, a former resident of Portland. Mr. and Mrs. Kohlband lived in Portland for over 30 years. Mr. Kohlband being extensively engaged in the wool business. The family moved to San Francisco about five years ago. Besides the husband, a son, Fred Kohlband survives. Mrs. Theodore Bernheim, sister and Dan Marx, brother of the deceased, besides several nephews and nieces, reside in Portland. The body probably will be brought here for burial.

LEAVE FOR CENTRAL OREGON—Governor Chamberlain, Railroad Commissioner West, Special Inspector Neuhausen, State Engineer Lewis, Reclamation Engineer Whistler and Special Agent Meyendorf leave Portland this morning for the investigation project of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company. PORTLAND BANK CLEARINGS—There were four cities in the country that showed increased percentage in bank clearings to the extent Portland did in the week ending Thursday, according to the report compiled by Bradstreet's. Those cities are Spokane, Denver, Wilmington and Chattanooga. The week's total for the whole country shows a decrease of over 8 per cent as compared with the total of last year, whereas Portland has the same increase of 40.1 per cent to indicate to the world that its business is growing steadily and surely. From some of the cities of the country there appear in the weekly reports evidences of erratic fluctuations in the bank clearings due to unusual or temporary transfers of funds; for the past year such changes are rarely to be found in the case of Portland's financial barometer. The percentage of increase has been almost uniformly considerably above the average, and while Seattle shows for the week an increase of 5.2 per cent and Tacoma pushing ahead to 25.5 increase this city with its increase of 40 per cent carries its own lesson. With a bumper harvest crop this year will be marketed in the next few weeks, estimated in some quarters at near \$50,000,000, there is every indication that Portland will not only hold well up to the past months' percentages but may show even greater prosperity.

FEAST OF ST. LAWRENCE TODAY—The feast of St. Lawrence, which occurs today, will be solemnly observed at St. Lawrence Church on Sunday, when solemn high mass will be offered up at 10:30 A. M. The panegyric of the saint will be preached by Very Rev. J. J. Gallagher, president of Columbia University. An elaborate programme of sacred music has been prepared under the direction of the organist of the church, Miss Mattie Kelly. The choir will be composed of the following: Messrs. Gianelli, Sauvalin, Montag, Bannon, Purcell, Underwood, Cain, Flynn, Walker, Kern, Kasper, Grimm, Fleming, Malley, Sauvalin and the Misses E. and L. Harwas, Barrett, Lahala, Smith, McGee, Beale, Twiss, Miss Elizabeth Harwas, who leaves Wednesday for Milan, will sing the solos in the mass Sunday morning.

IMPROVING ALBINA STREETS—Hard surface pavement is being laid on McMillan street, between Williams avenue and Crosby street. The triangular intersection of Williams avenue, Cherry and McMillan streets is being paved with the same material. This improvement will provide a direct street, well improved, between Upper Albina and the railroad bridge. The improvement of Russell street between Williams and Union avenue with hard-surface pavement also has been completed. The Pacific Bridge Company has the contract for paving Killingsworth avenue, between Union avenue and the Williams boulevard, over a mile. This too is a hard-surface improvement. The contract price was \$73,000.

WANTS HOUSES RENUMBERED—At the last meeting of the Montavilla Improvement Association, C. A. Kish, president, it was decided to ask the Council to renumber the houses according to the Portland system. The houses were numbered before that suburb was annexed to Portland and much confusion prevails. At this meeting the committee on the opening of Pearl street reported that the commencement of the work now dependent on the part of the city is the same report was made on the widening of Villa avenue between Meridian street and West avenue. The next meeting of the council will be held Monday night, August 12.

FINED \$5 FOR SCORCHING—Speed is expensive, whether applied to personal habits or automobile driving. S. H. Gulle was fined \$5 for scorching the pavement on the west side of the city. The same report was made on the widening of Villa avenue between Meridian street and West avenue. The next meeting of the council will be held Monday night, August 12.

ALBINA EMBANKMENT COMPLETED—The permanent embankment in Lower Albina across Montgomery Slough has been completed. It is now being paved with crushed rock and sidewalks are being built. This all is one of the most extensive yet undertaken on the East Side. It is more than 400 feet long and 50 feet high in the center. More than 75,000 cubic yards of material was dumped into the slough. About 30,000 cubic yards were taken from the Foster block. The completion opens up Lower Albina once more.

POSTMASTER SURRENDS JANITOR—Tom Campbell, head janitor of the Portland Postoffice building has been suspended by Postmaster Minto on a charge of incompetency. Postmaster Minto says that during the past year Campbell's management of the building has been unsatisfactory in every way and a change is deemed desirable.

TRAIN NO. 12 A MYSTERY

Southern Pacific Train Attendants
 Employees by Arriving on Time.

There was no improvement yesterday in the situation regarding the arrival of Southern Pacific and O. R. & N. trains. Southern Pacific Overland No. 18, which has succeeded in arriving on time just once in the past 30 days, was again late yesterday, entering the Union Station at 9:25 A. M., two hours behind its schedule. Train No. 18, known as the Clatsop Grove passenger, was 20 minutes late, arriving at 11:30 A. M. Train No. 14, from San Francisco, which has been more or less irregular in the time of arrival, yesterday came into the Portland Station on time. Train No. 13 which is also an overland train, for some reason unknown to the depot employees here, continues to arrive on time.

O. R. & N. train No. 3, from Spokane, arrived yesterday morning on time. Train No. 4, from Chicago, which is usually late anywhere from 20 minutes to three hours, yesterday was behind time 40 minutes. Train No. 1 known as the Chicago-Portland Special, due at 8:30 P. M., was behind time five hours, arriving at 1:10 A. M. Train No. 7, from Bliga, due to arrive at 5:45 P. M., lost 20 minutes in its run from that point to Portland.

NET VALUE \$200,027

Appraisement of Henry W. Goode's Estate Is Filed.

LEAVES A SNUG FORTUNE

Assets Have Gross Value of \$406,800, From Which Appraisers Deduct Secured Indebtedness of \$189,000.

The appraisement of the estate of Henry W. Goode shows an excess of \$200,027 over and above all claims and liabilities. According to the appraisers' report, which was filed with the County Court yesterday by S. G. Reed, the administrator, the gross value of the estate is \$406,800 and the indebtedness is \$189,000, fully secured.

The cash on hand is \$40,224. This cash is itemized as follows: On deposit with First National Bank, \$700; on deposit with the United States National Bank, \$168,26; interest collected since death of Mr. Goode, \$4670; dividends since death, \$947.25; from other sources, received by executor, \$32,555.60.

Automobile Among Assets.
 The personal property is found to consist of a Pope-Tolson touring car worth \$1500, wines valued at \$250 and two insurance policies in the Northwestern Mutual Life for \$10,000 each. These are pledged to secure a loan of about \$7000.

Secured promissory notes for \$35,000 are appraised at \$16,600, and unsecured notes with a face value of \$533.89 are rated at \$100.

Stocks owned by Mr. Goode have an aggregate appraised value of \$60,400, allowing deductions for amounts placed as a mortgage to secure loans. Stock in the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company with a face value of about \$100,000 secures a loan of \$75,000 with the United States National Bank of Portland. This stock is appraised at \$20,000, leaving a net sum of \$5000 in excess of the amount of collateral. Much of the stock in small mining companies is not appraised, although some of it eventually may be realized upon.

Portland Railway, Light & Power Company bonds with a face value of \$30,000 are pledged to Ladd & Titton to secure a loan of \$15,000. Rating the bonds at 80, this gives to the estate a surplus of \$1000 in the report. Bonds of the same company with a face value of \$10,000 are similarly rated at 80 per cent of their value. These bonds secure a loan from Charles Pratt & Co. of \$30,000, leaving the estate a net surplus of \$14,000.

STEEL BRIDGE TOO SMALL

L. T. Peery Suggests That Carlines Cross Burnside Structure.

L. T. Peery, the Albina member of the City Executive Board, is of the opinion that something will have to be done at once to relieve the congestion of travel on the upper deck of the Steel bridge.

He says that when the draw is opened streetcars and vehicles collect at both ends in great numbers and that when the draw closes a long time is required to clear the bridge of the procession moving in both directions across the bridge.

Progress is measured by the slow moving draw. Streetcars and teams must keep in line. There is no room for passing on the railroad bridge. It takes from 15 to 20 minutes for the travel over the bridge to become normal after the draw is closed.

Mr. Peery says this condition operates to the great disadvantage of Upper Albina and all of the suburbs to the north which are reached by cars crossing the railroad bridge. He suggests that the streetcars on Williams avenue, which include the St. Johns cars, use the Burnside bridge. This, he says, can be brought about by building an elevated trestle or roadway over the Southern Pacific railroad on East First street to the east of the approach of the Burnside bridge.

This would take two-thirds of the streetcars of the railroad bridge. Mr. Peery some time ago advocated the erection of this elevated roadway on East First street to connect with Burnside bridge, and he still believes that this would relieve the situation materially. He points out that there is a constant loss of time to the streetcar company and to individuals. This roadway, he says, would also give a large territory direct access to the Burnside bridge. Mr. Peery says that something of the kind will soon have to be done, or a new wide bridge built to take the place of the present narrow structure.

BONAPARTE MUST DECIDE

Land-Fraud Trials Will Be Deferred Pending His Instructions.

United States District Attorney Bristol, returned yesterday morning from San Francisco and Los Angeles, where he went to confer with Secretary Garfield of the Interior Department and Francis J. Heney over the course to be pursued in the land fraud trials in this state which are likely to soon be resumed.

As a result of these conferences the entire Oregon land fraud situation has been passed up to the Attorney-General and no further proceedings will be had until Mr. Bonaparte makes known the Government's policy in the conduct of the land fraud cases.

Secretary Garfield, Mr. Bristol and Mr. Heney were in conference August 3, 4 and 5 in San Francisco on the train en route to Los Angeles, and in the latter city, but the land fraud trials in this state which are likely to soon be resumed.
