

REPORT THAT HILL NO LONGER HAS CONTROL.

Begins to Lose Control in Great Shrinkage in Values Year Ago. Morgan Is Also Loser.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 12.—(Special.)— Control which J. J. Hill and Great Northern stockholders have held over the Northern Pacific Railway for some years has been lost, according to current rall-road gossip. While it has been reported for several weeks that control of the road had been lost, at first little credence was given to gossip. Reports have been so persistent and so convincing, however, that they are now believed by nearly all railroad men in the city.

Mr. Hill and his friends first began to lose control when the great shrinkage in market values began, about a year ago. Great Northern was then selling beyond the 300 mark, and Northern Pacific near it. In a few weeks they sagged, and now both stocks are quoted around 120. It is said Mr. Hill borrowed much money on his stocks, and in that way kept his conrolling interests. When market values sagged so heavily, however, it was necessary to cover, and a great amount of money was used in paying collateral on loans.
