

SOBBED AS THEY GAVE OVER GUNS

Coreans Wept Like Children When Surrendering to Japanese.

HEAVY LOSSES AT SEOUL

Attacking Party Forced to Use Machine Guns—Small Bands Still Harass Isolated Forces. Censorship on News.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 19.—Advices from Seoul give fuller details of the mutiny following the disbandment of the Korean army by the Japanese and the fighting at Seoul in which many lives were lost. The Seoul Press says that on the morning of August 1, following the issuance of the receipt disbanding the army, a Japanese officer, accompanied by two cavalrymen approached the main gate of the barracks of the Shiwu regiment to notify that force to be present at the parade ground for the disbandment. The Korean troops had been ordered to assemble near the east gate and gratuities offered to each man who turned in his arms. As the Japanese entered the barracks they were fired upon by the Korean troops assembled in the barracks yard. The Japanese officer at once turned his horse's head and galloped off followed by his men. The officers of the artillery posted at the west gate alarmed by the firing sent scouts to investigate and these were fired upon from the gate of the Shiwu regimental barracks.

Two companies of the Third Battalion of the Fifty-first Regiment, under Major Sakai, were ordered to attack the barracks, the numerous Korean troops having meanwhile broken open the magazines of the barracks and armed themselves with rifles and supplies of ammunition. The Japanese mounted machine guns on the city wall at the tower of the Great South Gate and from there began a bombardment of the barracks.

Troops Face Heavy Fire. Meanwhile the Japanese infantry advanced by way of an alley to the rear gate of the barracks and tried to rush the gate. The Koreans fought desperately, but the gate was taken and the Japanese entered and in half an hour it was carried. There was much fighting in the gateway, which Captain Koga carried with a bayonet charge. Meanwhile the Korean troops stationed themselves at windows of the barracks and poured a heavy fire on the Japanese as they came into the yard. Reinforcements were sent for by the Japanese commander and two companies were added to his force. Aided by these, the Japanese troops pressed toward the building. The Koreans held them back with a heavy fire, and Captain Kadowa, a company commander, was killed. Lieutenant Fujii, and several other officers and many men were killed.

Vanquished Koreans Sob Loudly. Eyewitnesses of the disbandment of the Korean troops, who were ordered to parade ground, say the scene was tragic. A large force of Japanese troops was assembled and the Koreans on arrival were ordered to hand over their rifles, bayonets, belts and overcoats, which they did. The Koreans cried loudly while they were disarmed. While the company commanders were reading the receipt ordering the disbandment the sound of sobbing was so loud that it drowned the officer's voice.

Only a portion of the Korean forces assembled for disbandment. The rest took flight, or held out in various parts of the city. Detachments of Japanese troops searched the city and all the exits were guarded and wholesale arrests were made. Rifles were found hidden in various places, some being taken from coffins. Scouts were sent galloping over the various roads and as little detachments of fugitive Korean troops were reported small squads of cavalry were sent to bring them in. Japanese troops entered the house of Mr. Colleran, an American and searched it, nine Koreans being found.

Harassing the Japanese. Many attacks upon small parties of Japanese are reported from various parts of Korea, one of the most tragic being the struggle of a small party of nine civil officials and five policemen at Chongju. The Japanese took refuge in a hill temple, which they were holding against 200 Koreans when a Japanese expeditionary force of two infantry companies and 14 engineers, with four machine guns, arrived on August 6. One of the Japanese policemen had been captured and murdered.

YEAR BEGINS AT BERKELEY

California high schools have almost unanimously rejected Rugby football and will play the old game, Stanford and California both having to interest them in the game last year, but without avail.

MOORS IN ATTACK

French Repulse Tribesmen After Sharp Conflict.

BATTLE OF FOUR HOURS

First Advance Algerian Horsemen Is Repulsed and Army Officer Wounded—Reinforcements Come and Moors Recoil.

CASA BLANCA, Aug. 19.—A large force of Moors descended upon the French camp Sunday morning but were repulsed after a sharp conflict. The Tribesmen advanced within 800 yards of the city. Fifty Algerian horsemen who were sent against them were permitted to advance half a mile when the Moors charged, wounded several Algerians and the French officer commanding them, and severing one Algerian's head. The French officer rallied his men who retired slowly until reinforced when the Moors recoiled. The fighting eventually covered a front of about 16 miles and lasted from 7 o'clock to 11. The French used machine guns with deadly effect. The cruiser Gloire also shelled the enemy. One Algerian sharpshooter was killed and several wounded. A dozen horses were killed.

WARNS CHINA AGAINST JAPAN

Diplomats Point Out Danger of Further Incursions.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 19.—Advices from Peking state that Japan is warning the Chinese government of the menace of Japan. The interview with Viscount Hayashi, Minister of Foreign Affairs for Japan, at Seoul in which he pointed out that China should take warning by Korea's fate lest some strong nation be moved to imitate events at Seoul and put her hand in the China created a sensation among Chinese officials. Chinese look with suspicion on the Franco-Japanese agreement as intended to cover aggression in China, and officials have pointed out in memorials to the government that while Japan's penetration into Manchuria is irreversible, any further incursion should be prevented, even if foreign assistance were invited to exclude Japan.

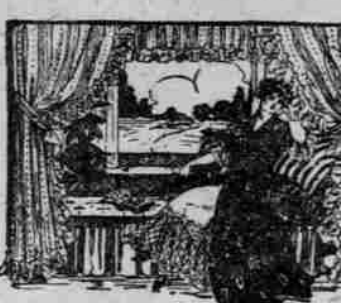

EMPLOYER BEATS WORKMAN

SEIZES HIM BY THROAT AND CHOKES HIM CRUELLY.

Fellow-Workmen Quit in Sympathy. Warrant Out for Brutal Contractor's Arrest—Mistreated Horses.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—With his neck bleeding from the marks of fingers that choked him with brutal force, his clothes torn and begrimed with mud, Clarence Hanson appeared before Prosecuting Attorney Rowland today and had a warrant issued for the arrest of his employer, Contractor P. J. Concanon. Hanson said Concanon came up to him and charged him with being to blame for several men leaving work. Hanson denied the charge and says the contractor grasped him by the throat, choking him savagely.

"I have heard of this man Concanon," said Prosecutor Rowland. "We are thinking of arresting him for cruelty to his horses."

Union Pacific to Induce Immigrants to Dig Coal.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Declaring that the coal mines of Wyoming and Utah are in actual need today of a thousand men to avert a coal famine next winter, the Union Pacific is planning a systematic campaign to induce a large part of the hordes of immigrants daily arriving in New York, Philadelphia and Boston to come West. In the Western mines now, labor is so scarce across the Pacific and also buying coal in Illinois and paying a dollar a ton for the coal and \$7 for freight to Utah, the problem of the laborer, the miners are being sent to the big Eastern centers to meet incoming immigrants
