

FAIR COALITION IN SAN FRANCISCO

Ryan, Who Led Reform Element to Victory, Mentioned for the Mayoralty.

WANT NONPARTISAN BOARD

Schmitz to Be Candidate Again if Released by Supreme Court, if Not Will Name Candidate of Union Labor Party.

REFORM SLATE.
Daniel A. Ryan for Mayor.
William H. Langdon for District Attorney.
A non-partisan Board of Supervisors, including nearly all of the men named by Mayor Taylor.
A platform devoted solely to municipal issues and affairs.
Candidates pledged not to party, but to the interests of the people.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 21.—A plan of action that is meeting with much favor with supporters of the reform league, is to have Daniel A. Ryan for Mayor and W. H. Langdon for District Attorney, head a union of forces with Democrats.

It is pointed out that Ryan knows three-fourths of the delegates to the Democratic convention, that he went to school with many of them, and that he will be easy for them to obtain the Democratic nomination after he has been nominated by the Republicans. The omission of reference to national politics in the platform and the substitution of a pledge to the public weal instead of one of party fealty is expected to add great strength to the Republican ticket.

Coalition Is Favored.

"As far as I am concerned," said Perry Newberry, secretary of the league, yesterday, "I am in favor of going ahead and nominating our candidates without regard to party affiliations or to what any other party may do. Two years ago the Democrats fused with us, but the people didn't. This time the people have already fused, and all we have to do is to carry out their wishes."

Ralph L. Hathorn, for many years prominent in Republican politics in the thirty-fifth district, but now living in the Fortieth, spoke his mind freely. "It will be a coalition, not a fusion," he said. "This by reason of a spontaneous movement of the people, and not by the Republicans, Democrats and many members of the Union Labor Party. Looking at conditions as they exist and setting aside personal feeling, I regard Daniel A. Ryan as the man who can make success certain."

Mayor Making Good Record.
"While Mayor Taylor is an ideal official and is making a splendid record, we must not forget that the man who will sit in the Mayor's chair next January must first be elected by the people in November. Ryan could reach a large class of voters whom Taylor could not attract to his support. Taylor would not inspire the enthusiasm that would be aroused by a younger and more popular candidate like Ryan. The younger voters would rally to Ryan, irrespective of party affiliation."

"Ryan's success and elevation to the Mayor's chair would be a further triumph of the forces of good government in their long conflict to overcome the corrupt influence of the Southern Pacific Company. His success would have a beneficial effect on political affairs not only in the city, but throughout the state. Further, it would prove to the people of the East in general and to the capitalists of that and other sections who have money to invest here that San Francisco had at last entered upon a peaceful course and that labor troubles would be reduced to a minimum."

Democrats Are Lying Low.

Meanwhile the Democrats are lying low. Many members of that party naturally prefer a Democrat at the head of the proposed coalition ticket, but the movement in favor of Ryan is growing steadily and may reach such proportions that when the convention meets no effort will be made to combat it. James D. Phelan is still being mentioned, but his name creates no enthusiasm, principally because it suggests to party leaders a disheartening fight to overcome the influence of the Southern Pacific Company.

Leaders of the Union Labor party like Thomas F. Egan are waiting to see what the Supreme Court does with the appeal of Eugene E. Schmitz. Recovery of the verdict in the extortion case and the release of the former Mayor from the County Jail would mean his re-nomination and a fight at the polls for "vindication." If Schmitz stays in jail he will not be a candidate for Mayor, but he will have a deal to go with naming the man who will take up the banner that he trailed in the mud.

NAMES NEW POLICE BOARD

Mayor Taylor Appoints Three Men to Fill Vacancies.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—Mayor Taylor this morning appointed as Police Commissioners Joseph A. Leggett, attorney and single tax advocate; Charles A. Swigert, actor, and Hugo D. Kell, retired merchant, to fill the vacancies created yesterday by the removal of Commissioners Thomas F. Finn, A. W. Cullen and John L. Moore on charges of misconduct in neglecting and refusing to remove Chief of Police Dinan for gross incompetency in office. The three appointments were made by the Mayor's secretary at once from the Mayor's office to the office of the County Clerk and were sworn in. A. E. Cullen, vice-president of the Metropolitan Trust Company, will be appointed to the fourth vacancy in the Board as soon as it has been created by the removal of William R. Hagerty, who thus far has evaded service of the notification of ouster. It is reported that Mr. Hagerty intends to leave San Francisco for the East today, and that his idea in evading service is to

prevent for an indefinite period the complete reorganization of the Police Board.

Mayor Awaits Developments.

Commissioners Finn, Wallen and Moore "stand pat" on their declarations that they will recognize no power of removal other than the courts, and they and Chief Dinan will resist with force any attempt to dislodge them and to take possession of the Board and records.

The Mayor was asked what course the new Commissioners would take if the old Commissioners refused to surrender their seats and the records. He replied: "I don't know what action the new Commissioners will take—ask them. They are the ones who will shape their course, not I. For that matter, the new Board has not yet qualified. Commissioner Hagerty has not been served with his notice of removal, and it may be I shall decide that a successor cannot be appointed until that has been done. On the other hand, I may decide that personal service is not necessary, since he is evading it, and the statute does not stipulate personal service. In either event, I shall appoint Colonel Cullen when the way is cleared."

Will Turn the Other Cheek.

Commissioner Leggett said: "We do not officially know that the Schmitz Commissioners will resist us with force at all. But, of course, we have no idea of meeting force with force. Personally it would suit me very well to leave them resist us formally, for then our course in law would be perfectly clear. But we won't cross the bridge till we come to it. At 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, Mr. Swigert, Mr. Kell and I with Colonel Cullen, if in the meantime he has been appointed, will go to the Board rooms on Eddy street and formally announce our intention of assuming office. What happens then will shape our future course."

Mr. Leggett did not care to discuss in advance the policies to be pursued by the new board. "We are just now getting personally acquainted, with each other," he said.

TAKE PAPER FROM FRATS

STILL READ RECORDS

Minute Book of Glass' Company Searched.

NO ENTRY FOR \$25,000

Heney and Delmas Have Usual Spat Over Testimony Offered, Defense Harassing Prosecution at Every Turn Possible.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 21.—When the Glass bribery trial was resumed this morning in Judge John's court, Secretary-Treasurer F. W. Eaton, of the Pacific Telephone Company, continued the reading of the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company, the prosecution's object being to show them that Louis Glass, as vice-president and general manager of the corporation, had authority to sign checks on which the alleged bribe money was obtained. This occupied the entire forenoon session, the only incident breaking the monotony of the proceedings being a brief passage between Assistant District Attorney Heney and Attorney D. M. Delmas.

"We will prove by these minutes," said Heney, "that Louis Glass was the ruling spirit of the telephone corporation."

"So you say," retorted Delmas, "but we do not admit that to be a fact." The reading of the minutes by Mr. Eaton was continued at the afternoon session. The record evidence that the disbursement of the \$25,000 alleged bribe money was not reported to the Board of Directors so far as the minutes of that body show, was allowed by the court over the standing objection of the defense. This evidence was offered as corroborative of the prosecution's theory that Mr. Glass possessed and exercised the power to authorize bribery.

In the afternoon the prosecution was harassed unceasingly by objections from the defense.

INFLUENCE HAS NO WEIGHT

BALLINGER DISCUSSES PRESIDENT'S CLASSMATE.

Running Land Office as He Thinks Best — Will Suspend No More Land Entries in California.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Unless the State of California can produce something more than general accusations and theories, Commissioner R. A. Ballinger will not be disposed to suspend any more land entries in that state on account of the mineralogists' contention that they contain minerals.

Commissioner Ballinger made a trip to California and listened to all that was said there and he went East again tonight convinced that the only thing California could show was a general charge that the public lands were being grabbed. In so far as officials of that state are concerned, the Commissioner of the General Land Office has tried to place them down to date and has failed. Unless his own special agents produce definite proof, Commissioner Ballinger will drop the California controversy.

ASTORIA WANTS SQUARE DEAL

Merchants Think They Are Discriminated Against by Steamers.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—For a long time the merchants of Astoria have been discriminated against by the Portland & San Francisco Steamship Company in that shipments of merchants of other cities are now being made to have the discrimination removed and today Manager Whyte of the Chamber of Commerce sent a communication to R. P. Schwerin, general manager of the company, as follows:

As per resolution passed by the Chamber of Commerce at the last regular meeting held Monday night, August 19, as follows: "Whereas, the San Francisco & Portland Steamship Company, which has been operating for a long time discriminating against Astoria shippers, in that shippers from Portland have their cargo loaded by rail steamship company, while those from Astoria are not thus cared for; therefore, be it resolved, That the general manager of this company be respectfully requested to place Astoria on the same footing with Portland; and that, if this request is not granted by said general manager, that relief be sought through the Oregon State Railroad Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission." 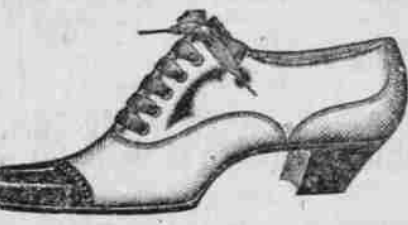

MAY WHEAT GOES TO \$1

BOARD OF TRADE IN UPROAR AND BEARS CAUGHT.

More Excitement Than Seen in Chicago Since "Green-Bug" Scare.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Reports of frost all over the Canadian Northwest set up a whirl of excitement in the wheat market today. Owing to the poor telegraphic facilities due to the strike it was impossible to learn to what extent, if any, the crop had been damaged, but many in the trade feared the worst and there was a rush to buy the cereal, which carried the May price above \$1 to the great dismay of the bears, who had taken advantage of the crippled condition of the trade the last week or ten days to pound the market.

On Monday May wheat sold as low as 96c, and September wheat, which sold on the same day at 84c, was boosted today to 89c. The advance was attended by a gratifying increase in the volume of speculation.

Buying orders poured into the pit from the outside over the private wires, especially from the Northwest. There was a wild scramble on the part of shorts to cover. The pit was thrown into an uproar such as was witnessed last Spring when the price first went up to \$1 on the "green bug" scare.

HINDOOS NOT WHITE MEN

Attorney-General Decides They Are Not Eligible as Citizens.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—United States Attorney Devlin recently received several applications for naturalization from natives of British India. Being in doubt what action to take, he asked Attorney-General Bonaparte for a ruling on the subject, and has just received a reply, in which the Attorney-General states that the people referred to cannot be classed as whites, and therefore are ineligible to become citizens of the United States.

BUTCHER AN OLD INDIAN

Refusal to Give Wine Results in Murder—Bad Feeling Exists.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 21.—Joos Capistrano, an Indian, 60 years old, belonging to the Santa Isabel Reserva-

tion, was attacked and killed near Julian last Monday by three Indians of the Anahus Reservation. According to Capistrano's wife, the assailants, who were drunk, demanded wine from her husband, and when he refused the men attacked him. He defended himself until one of the Indians seized an ax and struck him on the head. Capistrano died the next day.

The Indians who attacked him are under arrest, and there is strong probability that the tribal feeling between the two reservations may result in further trouble, as there is no love lost between the Indians.
