

LYNCHING FOR THE ASSAULT

Northern Indiana Is Aroused Over the Murder of Liz-zie Schroeder.

BLOODHOUNDS ON TRAIL

Murderer Evidently Had Initials on Boots, for Letters "T. M." Are Stamped on Little Girl's Arm. Green Necktie a Clue.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—Wanton brutality on the part of the fiend who terribly mutilated and murdered Lizzie Schroeder, aged 7 years, of Gary, Ind., may be the means of bringing him to justice. In overcoming the child he trampled upon her arm and today for initials "T. M." stand out plainly in the livid flesh. Apparently the murderer had the initials in double-headed tacks on the sole of his boots. The same initials can be traced through the sand for many rods.

In the struggle the girl also tore off his green necktie, or he may have snatched it off himself with the intention of strangling her. In any event, it is an important clue. The entire Northern part of Indiana is aroused and fully 600 men, with bloodhounds, are engaged in the search.

It is admitted that if the man is captured by any of the possees not accompanied by two or three officers, the wretch will be speedily lynched. Five men have been arrested, but all but two have proved satisfactory alibis. The others, one of whom is a negro, told conflicting stories and are closely guarded.

MEXICANS PUT UNDER BAIL

Will Be Tried for Resisting Officer. Say Charge Tramped Up.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 27.—The three alleged Mexican revolutionists who arrived here last week were arraigned in the Police Court today, charged with resisting an officer. The trial of Ricardo Magon and Librado Rivera was set for September 20 and 27 respectively. They were held in \$1000 bail. Attorney for Antonio Villareal, charged with being a fugitive from El Paso, made a motion to have his case transferred to the United States District Court. Arguments will be heard tomorrow. Villareal will be tried September 26 for resisting an officer. Telegrams were received from the authorities at St. Louis asking that the three men be held for trial in that city. They are accused of jumping bail there in the sum of \$2500 each, after having been indicted by the grand jury. Attorneys for the men declared this morning that "these are not the Mexican government charges to get our clients back into Mexico, where they are wanted for political offenses on which they cannot be extradited."

LIKELY RELEASE VILLAREAL

Mexico Can Only Get Him Through State Department.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—Villareal, the alleged Mexican revolutionist, is being held at Los Angeles awaiting action of the immigration authorities. He has been in the United States more than three years and cannot be returned to Mexico except for some specific reason. Villareal will probably be discharged from custody unless the Mexican government requests, through the State Department, that he be sent to Mexico.

MAGNATE PLAYS LIKE BOY

Harriman Enjoys Rollicking Good Time at Pelican Bay.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 27.—E. H. Harriman and his party concluded their stay at Pelican Bay Monday, after putting in several strenuous days hunting for bear. The party had a number of guides and a pack of bear dogs, but no bear were found. Bears are not as plentiful as they were a few years ago, and it is a rare occurrence when one is killed. Mr. Harriman enjoyed the outing and did not mind sleeping out at night in a drenching rain.

JUDGES FOR HAGUE COURT

United States Proposes Allotment Among Nations.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 27.—The United States delegation announces its willingness for all countries on the American continent, including the United States, to have four judges of the new international court appointed for the 21 countries of this continent, on the understanding that this reduces the number of judges to 15. It is understood that the Americans hope Asia will be allotted two judges and Europe nine.

POPE PROTECTS CLERGY

Forbids Pilgrimages Lest Attacks on Clergy Be Continued.

ROME, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The Pope has countermanded the Galileo pilgrimages during the month of September, and is determined to stop others throughout this year and next, unless the safety of clergymen and pilgrims is guaranteed by the police. Hotelkeepers and tradesmen fear a disastrous season, and are complaining.

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This condition, coming on top of the threatened scarcity of pickers, low market and difficulty to secure picking money, increases the burden of the hopgrower, and local dealers are inclined to view the situation with apprehension. One dealer received a report from Woodburn tonight stating that many of the yards are turning black with mould, estimating that half of the hops of that district will never be picked.

It is also reported here that the growers of the vicinity of Butteville, in the northern part of the county, held a meeting, at which it was decided that no hops would be picked at all in view of present market conditions. This report, however, lacks confirmation.

Eighty acres of the Kreh Bros. Brooks yard, operated by the China-

man, George Sun, went down as a result of the recent storm and, although a force was put to work yesterday to raise them, some doubt is expressed as to the success of this action.

There is no sign of an easing up upon the money question, and many of the growers will be unable to secure picking money at all. At least one firm of dealers is offering to take contracts with a guarantee of 7 cents, which will give the grower a 1-cent margin of profit over the cost of picking, but he stands to lose 2 cents in any event on the cost of cultivation. There is a disposition on the part of all growers to strive for a fancy quality of product, and no moldy hops will be picked.

TROLLEY TRACK IS PLACED

Eugene People Will Soon Be Riding on Their Own Streetcars.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The track of the Eugene street railway has been completed from the Southern Pacific depot to Eleventh street on Williamette and from this point east toward the University of Oregon as far as Mill street. The poles to carry the trolley wires have been up for some time, and the work of placing the wire began today.

The company has chosen a tract of land in the Gross addition for the car barns and work on them will begin this week. Three fine electric cars were shipped to Eugene from Cleveland, Ohio, on August 17, and are expected here by the middle of September, when the work necessary for running them will be completed. They cost \$3000 each and are splendid modern cars. They will be running between the depot and the university in about ten days. The contract for the construction of a temporary wooden bridge between Eugene and Springfield, near the latter place on the Williamette River, will be let next week and work will begin at once in order that the piers may be put in place before high water.

It is expected that the car line will be in operation between Eugene and Springfield by the first of the year.

DRAMATIC TO HIS FINISH

DRUNKEN ACTOR MAKES SPECTACLE OF SUICIDE.

WEBSTER CITY, Iowa, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—In sight of an astonished crowd, Carl Pressley, an actor, today made a bonfire in the street of \$2500 in paper money, three diamonds, rings and studs in the sewer and then announced to a group of his friends in the Park Hotel lobby that he was going to kill himself. He drew a revolver, walked down the street to the city park and, calling to passers-by to watch him die, fired a bullet into his brain. He fell dead instantly. Pressley, who was well known throughout this and neighboring states, had been drinking heavily for two weeks.

PRITCHARD CLAIMS POWER

Insists Federal Courts May Suspend Laws of States.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Aug. 27.—The decision of Federal Judge Pritchard in the rate case of the Southern Railway against the State Corporation Commissioners and the Attorney-General of North Carolina, announced today, upholds the jurisdiction of Pritchard's court in the issuance of the recent injunction against the state officials during the railroad rate controversy, and declares the suit is not against the state within the meaning of the 11th amendment to the Federal Constitution.
