

OREGON RIFLEMEN MOVING TO FRONT

Team at Camp Perry
Among Leaders.

HONORS FOR ROSEBURG MEN

Regimental Team Gets Sixth
Place and Prize.

MAJOR HAMLIN AMONG BEST

Eleventh in Individual Skirmish
Run, Excelling 319 Marksman.
Tournament Gives Nation 100,-
000 Sure Shots With Rifle.

CAMP PERRY, Port Clinton, O., Aug. 30.—(Staff Correspondence.)—The National rifle tournament will draw to an end late tomorrow after three days of spirited struggling for supremacy among 48 teams of sharpshooters representing nearly every state in the Union and the various branches of the regular service.

The Oregon team, which crossed the continent to take part, has finished well up towards the front. The official returns are not complete, but in the team competition for the National trophy it is known that Oregon has scored ahead of 30 teams and will be assigned high standing. The advance estimate places the team in fourteenth place and the position will not vary greatly from that figure. Last year Oregon finished ahead of 23 teams, taking twenty-first place.

Roseburg in Sixth Place.

Other high military honors have been won by the Oregon riflemen during the tournament of the National Rifle Association, which has occupied the past week preliminary to the National tournament, which is conducted by the United States Government. In the regimental team competition, the Roseburg, Or., team took sixth place, beating the regular service teams. This record put the team inside the prize money and caused much favorable comment. The Third Infantry representatives on the Oregon team took tenth place in the regimental contest. In all 21 teams were entered, four of them from the regular service.

This victory was supplemented this afternoon, when Major Hamlin, of Roseburg, finished ahead of 319 marksmen from all over America, who were entered in the individual skirmish run. Major Hamlin scored 30 out of a possible 105. The winning score was 41. Major Hamlin was assigned to eleventh place. General Finzer, team captain of the Oregon marksmen, is being widely congratulated on the showing made by his men.

Ohio Will Get Trophy.

The National tournament has proved one of the hardest fought rifle competitions ever held in the world, military experts are declaring tonight. Every one of the 48 teams was in the game to win as high a place as possible and every point was fought for. A gusty wind in from Lake Erie added to the difficulties of marksmanship.

It appears as if the Ohio marksmen will get the bronze trophy purchased by Congress at a cost of several thousand dollars for the best team. It is a close finish between Ohio and the United States Infantry team. Illinois, New York and New Jersey also appear to be in the running, while the Washington state team may finish well up towards the lead. The following teams will participate in the National match: Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Washington, Wyoming, Wisconsin, West Virginia, United States Infantry, United States Cavalry, United States Navy, Naval Academy and Hawaii.

National Team Match.

The National team match opened on Wednesday, preceded by two days of practice and a week of preliminary rifle events, held under the auspices of the National Rifle Association. Every team in camp went on the firing line, and all competitors remained to finish in the national match.

The firing was done over all ranges. Two shots were fired by each man in a skirmish run, ten shots at rapid fire at 200 yards, and ten shots at 200, 600, 800 and 1000 yards, slow fire. Although the regular Army was in charge of the competition, there was considerable delay in making the necessary change of ranges. The trumpet signal to commence firing sounded at 7 A. M. over the 200-yard range, and recall was not ordered until the falling light made it necessary. Regulation targets were used, with a marker for each marksmen and a range officer assigned from the regular service for every three targets. A full force of men handled the targets from the pits, marking the hits made, and the value of each one.

At the completion of the team match the National individual match will be taken up, simultaneously with the pistol match. These will be completed as quickly as possible, as the end of the competition is already overdue. The state troops will then break camp. Several of the Oregon marksmen will leave tomorrow for the Coast, and others will start Sunday, not caring to participate in the individual competition. The team will return as individuals and over various lines, the majority of the members going by way of the Canadian Pacific.

Trains 100,000 Sure Marksman.

The interest taken by National Guardsmen and regulars in the shooting game is calculated to encourage faith in the coun-

try's future fighting ability. Range work is the sole subject of discussion, predominating in camp, at mess and into the night. It is the first topic of the morning and the last of night. This interest, of course, will be carried to home stations, and spread among others who like the shooting game. The ultimate result will be several hundred thousand men in the United States who are sure death seven shots out of ten within range. The number of men who now compete for positions on the shooting teams reaches above 100,000, and the Government is spending several million dollars per season in supplying these ambitious marksmen with ammunition.

The distribution of awards will occur at an early date following the official announcement of the relative position of each competitor in the National matches. The team showing the highest aggregate score in the team match receives a beautiful bronze creation known as the National trophy, especially provided by act of Congress. The sum of \$300 will also be divided by the members of the team. The second team gets the famous old Hilton trophy and \$200, the third team takes the equally famous "Soldier of Marathon" trophy and \$100 cash. Fourth place brings \$100, fifth \$75 and sixth \$50. In the individual competition the prizes will consist of gold, silver and bronze medals and small cash awards.

HAS NEW ELECTRIC POWER

ITALIAN INVENTOR WILL REVOLUTIONIZE WORLD.

Discovers Force Which Starts Dynamo and Multiplies Power—Useful for Any Machinery.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Confident that he is the discoverer of an electrical device that is to revolutionize the world industrially and economically, Ruffalo Bova, an electrical engineer, has come from California, Italy, for the purpose of demonstrating before America's best experts what his invention will do.

It consists of a small battery and a transforming apparatus which, he says, will run the largest dynamo without the use of steam or other energy. He says it may be applied to locomotives, steamships, lighting and heating plants or anything where electrical energy is employed. He calls his invention the "auto vibro electrica sorgente." In a statement he says:

"In building a fire one must first have a match. I have discovered the match of electricity, and with it start the fire that continues to burn in other words, with a substance that may be obtained anywhere for a few cents I originate the force that sets the dynamo in motion and continues it in action. I am not relying upon theory, but have made many tests in Italy through which I increased the ordinary force manifold without the aid of steam or any other power except what I obtained from my small battery. I am using the electricity which is stored in all of nature's elements and which has hitherto been wasted."

ASSAULTS INNOCENT MAN

Striking Operators Fined \$500 for
Knocking Reporter Down.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 30.—Leroy Dobson, a striking telegrapher, was fined \$500 in the police court for assaulting a newspaper reporter whom he took for a strike-breaker. Dobson testified that he knocked the reporter down because he would not say whether he was or not a strike-breaker. The local telegraphers' union adopted a resolution denouncing Dobson.

STRIKE STOPS NEWS OF RACES

Attempt to Send Over Leased Wire
Blocked by Union.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—All Montana poolrooms have been put out of business through the telegraphers' strike. Yesterday A. W. Martin, of San Francisco, one of the owners of the syndicate which furnished news to the poolrooms, arrived in the city accompanied by Charles E. Meyers, of California, with the intention of furnishing the news over the leased wire. The syndicate had been receiving its results over a telephone wire from Seattle, but this worked very unsatisfactorily, being either grounded or open at not infrequent intervals, and it was his intention to supplant this with a wire leased from the Western Union. Mr. Meyers was put to work receiving the news from Seattle, but the first message he received was refused transmission by one of the union operators employed in the race bureau here. Mr. Martin, who is himself a former telegrapher, then essayed to transmit the matter to the Butte and Anaconda poolrooms, but the union men in those offices promptly informed him that they would receive no news over the leased Western Union or Postal wires. Mr. Martin told them that he was paying even better than the union scale, but admitted that he had received no news over Western Union wires. This was unsatisfactory to the various receiving union operators, however, so Mr. Martin was unable to do any business.

Operators Return to Packeries.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 30.—About 40 telegraphers who have been handling leased wires in the packing-houses in East St. Louis, returned to work this morning after having been out for two weeks. It is understood the men have returned to work at the old scale pending an adjustment of the strike.

Strike Ordered in Broker's Office.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 30.—The union telegraphers employed by Fred Dorr & Co. brokers, were ordered out today because the company refused to sign the union scale. The strike was ordered by President Small.

LEADER OF MUTINY HANGED

Man Who Commanded Battleship
Potemkin Pays Penalty.

ODESSA, Aug. 30.—Matushenko, the Russian non-commissioned officer who led the mutiny on the battleship Knyaz Potemkin and commanded the vessel in the sensational cruise about the Black Sea in the summer of 1905, was hanged last night at Sevastopol. After abandoning the vessel he fled to New York, worked there two years in an iron foundry, became homesick, returned here, was detected, arrested, court-martialed and sentenced to death.

Historic Dent Farm Is Sold.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 30.—The historic Dent farm of 438 acres outside the city limits, changed hands today for \$75,000. The log cabin occupied by General Grant is still standing.

TRIED TO BRIBE GOVERNOR DUBBIN

Kentucky's Desperate Effort
to Secure Extradition
of Taylor.

PRICE WAS \$93,000 CASH

Ex-Governor of Indiana Exposes a
Scheme to Avenge Goebel's
Death—He Told Taylor All
That Happened at Meeting.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Indianapolis says: Winfield T. Durbin, Governor of Indiana from 1891 to 1895, made the sensational statement last night that soon after his inauguration as Governor attempts were made to bribe him to turn over William A. Taylor, Kentucky's refugee Governor, to the authorities of the state for trial on the charge of conspiracy to assassinate Governor Goebel.

The offer to ex-Governor Durbin, according to his own statement, was \$93,000 in cash. Mr. Durbin said that Taylor had been advised of the attempted bribery after it was made and was cognizant of all that had transpired at the meeting at which the \$93,000 was offered.

KAISER PLANS WEDDING

Only Daughter to Marry Brother of
Spanish Queen.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Emperor William, it is understood, will arrange a marriage between his only daughter, Princess Victoria, and his cousin, Prince Leopold, son of the Princess Henry of Battenberg, when he visits his uncle, King Edward, this fall. Princess Victoria is Emperor William's youngest child. She is 15 years old. Her intended husband, Prince Leopold, is 13. He is a brother to the Queen of Spain.

ST. PAUL'S NEEDS GREAT CARE

Architects Find London's Famous
Cathedral in Danger.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The committee of architects appointed to inquire into St. Paul's Cathedral has issued a report which declares that, while the cathedral is in no immediate danger, elaborate precautions are necessary to preserve it from disaster.

DISASTER BEFALLS OPORTO

Crowded Platform Collapses, Killing
Ten and Injuring 150 Persons.

OPORTO, Portugal, Aug. 30.—A platform erected by a local newspaper on the occasion of a lottery drawing collapsed today, hurling to the ground about 300 persons, of whom ten were killed and 150 injured, many seriously.

King Charles telegraphed his condolences to the Mayor. The city is in mourning.

CHOLERA IS SLAYING CHINESE

Die by Hundreds on Streets of Yang-Tse Valley Towns.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 30.—The epidemic of cholera among Chinese in lower Yang-Tse ports is spreading. About 200 persons died in the streets of Cuba, in the province of Ngan-Hwei and Klu-Kiang, Province of Kiangsi.

Yacht Races Begin at Bilbao.

BILBAO, Spain, Aug. 30.—King Alfonso arrived today to attend the regatta which opens this afternoon. The American yacht which competed for Emperor William's cup at Kiel will compete.

Pope Fears Anti-Clericals.

ROME, Aug. 30.—The Vatican has announced that the pilgrimage scheduled for September and October will be postponed on account of the anti-clerical agitation in Italy.

MOONEY IS REINSTATED

Man Whom Dinan Punished Gets
Justice From Taylor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—(Special.)—One of the first acts of the Taylor Board of Police Commissioners was to reinstate Captain of Police Mooney. This was done at yesterday's meeting. Captain Mooney was dismissed by the Schmitz board for criticizing the method of ex-Chief of Police Dinan and the then Board of Commissioners. Mr. Mooney addressed his company on the necessity for greater alertness in the suppression of vice. He warned the men that the friendship of Chief of Police and Police Commissioners could not save them from the law in any matter of duty. He said that he knew that both Chief of Police and Police Commissioners were protecting law-breakers in his district, but advised the men that neither Dinan nor the Commissioners could save the policeman who failed in his duty.

Charges were preferred against Mr. Mooney by Dinan and the Police Captain was found guilty of insubordination and dismissed. The new board yesterday reinstated Mr. Mooney, but will not assign him to duty until it has reviewed the testimony upon which the former board convicted him.

with Roosevelt in the White House for another four years.

"What man in the Republican party do you consider big enough and strong enough to carry out the Roosevelt policies?" was the next question.

Taft or Hughes First Choice.

"There are two men who would fill the bill, certainly, and possibly others who have not yet come prominently to view. Secretary Taft is one of them, and Governor Hughes, of New York, is the other. Taft is the more likely candidate, for he is better known than Hughes; he has been conspicuously identified with the Roosevelt administration, while Hughes is just being tried out in New York state. I don't believe Taft or Hughes could

be successfully approached, and I believe that either, if elected, would conscientiously carry out the reforms inaugurated by President Roosevelt. And furthermore, I believe that either Hughes or Taft could be elected, even as against Bryan. Up this way we look upon Hughes as a man with a future; we think he is going to develop gradually and work his way to the top. So far he is comparatively unknown outside of his own state, but he is properly constituted to develop into Presidential timber. Taft has the advantage in that he not only is Presidential timber, but he has fully demonstrated. We know him better than we know Hughes."

New York Needs Hughes.

These sentiments may fairly be said to represent prevailing opinion in New England and in New York as well, outside of New York city. It is somewhat strange that New Yorkers are not particularly anxious that one of their sons shall be nominated for President next year. At the end of Mr. Roosevelt's present term, a New Yorker will have been in the White House consecutively for seven and a half years, and apparently that is sufficient. Many New York Republicans who were particularly particularly with regard to Governor Hughes, held the opinion that Mr. Hughes was a big enough man for President, and they further expressed the belief that, if elected, he would faithfully follow out the policies of the present administration, continually having a regard for the rights of the whole people as against the alleged rights of special interests. However, New York state is sadly in need of reforms within its own borders, reforms long overdue, and Governor Hughes is the first man in recent years who has had the nerve to undertake to bring about these reforms. The thinking voter in New York state is delighted with the way Mr. Hughes has conducted himself in office, and is very much inclined to believe that for the present he should confine himself to New York reforms, leaving his Presidential aspirations (if he has any) to the future.

Taft Is General Favorite.

In New York, as in New England, Mr. Taft appears to be a general favorite because the voters have confidence in him, believe him honest and above the reach of corporate influence, and because they know he will be faithful to his trust. In that section there is very little interest in the Fairbanks or Knox booms, for both men are looked upon as friendly to corporations. The Cannon boom, the Foraker boom and the other boomlets are never mentioned. And with it all, the utmost confidence that some man can be nominated and elected who will be faithful to the people. Satisfied that New England is not worrying about the political outlook.

GIVING REBATES IN WEST

RAILROADS SAID TO BE VIOLATING THE ELKINS LAW.

Commissioner Lane Will Start Investigation Monday—Look Into Car Shortage, Too.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Rebates are being granted by Western railroads. This startling information has reached the Interstate Commerce Commission through the Elkins law, and Commissioner Lane will start Monday to investigate personally several cases which he is informed have been discovered.

It has been claimed by railroads that the Elkins law has not been violated for years, but the Commission is advised that it has been violated since it was amended a year ago by the Hepburn act, making it an offense sufficient to send officials engaged in the violation to a term in the penitentiary.

Commissioner Lane will start in at St. Paul in his investigation and will also look into the car shortage and fuel famine situation. Officials here are apprehensive that much suffering will be caused next winter by car shortage and the inability of the roads to haul all the fuel required. Mr. Lane will also make inquiry to ascertain whether there is any way in which the Government can act to prevent car shortage this fall, during the crop-moving period, and the movement of lumber from the Northwest, as well as in the shipment of coal.
