WHO PUT UP BAIL MONEY?

Many Conjectures as to Bonds Furnished by Mrs. Waymire.
Just what disposition will be made of the case against Mrs. Belle Waymire and E. E. Riddling, charged with attempting to extort property from Mayor Lane, is a matter that is still receiving considerable attention among lawyers. While the belief exists that the Mayor was the object of a blackmailing plot, one possibly inspired by blacked politicians, yet a doubt is quite as general that anything can be done at present to arrest it. It has been hired to carry out the plot. The charge of attempting to extort money is of a purely technical order and there is no direct evidence to carry it out. Whether any court can be brought to regard the facts of the defendants as preliminary to a demand for money and therefore equivalent to the demand is altogether questionable.

Just where the ball came from upon which Mrs. Waymire and Riddling were released has not yet been revealed. It is said that part of the amount was provided by A. N. Willis, president of the Council and political enemy of Mayor Lane. Willis testified at the preliminary examination of the two accused party last week that Riddling spoke to him some weeks ago about raising Mayor Lane's office, but the Councilman claimed to have assumed that proffer at once. At this time he denies, too, having put up a cent of the bail money in the case and says he hasn't any idea who advanced the amount. Captain E. W. Spencer, who said by parties who ought to know, to have furnished the bail for Mrs. Waymire.
