REPUBLICAN CLUB.—At the regular monthly smoker of the Union Republican Club, which will be held in the Sargent Hotel building tonight, addresses will be made by George W. The general topic for discussion will be the need for extending the organization of Republican clubs throughout the city and county as the best means for keeping the voters in touch with the party and its policies. SIXTH ANNIVERSARY.—The sixth anniversary of the East Side Improvement Association will fall on November 12, and at the meeting of the club tonight at the Sargent Hotel some arrangements may be made for the observance of that date.

This association was organized November 12, 1901, to expedite the rebuilding of the Morrison-street bridge and the East Side High School, both of which were demolished. Innumerable other things have been accomplished through the efforts of its committee, but perhaps next in importance to the rebuilding of the bridge and the high school building are the fills that have been made, and are to be made, in the warehouse district. The membership of the East Side Association has been about 400.

HUGO FRITZ FINED \$15.—On a warrant, sworn out by Detective Kienlen, Hugo Fritz, proprietor of Erickson's concert hall and saloon, was arrested at the police station yesterday afternoon by Patrol Driver Graves. The cause of his arrest on the city charge of selling liquor on Sunday was the seizure of a bottle of Wagner's discovery Sunday morning that the saloon was running full blast. In Justice Reid's court yesterday afternoon, Fritz pleaded guilty to the state charge, and was fined \$15. He will appear in the Municipal Court this morning to face a charge of selling liquor on Sunday.

HENDERSON AND COHEN HEARING.—The preliminary hearing of Henderson and Cohen, the men accused of complicity in the burglarizing of the Frohman Curles Store, in the Portland Hotel, takes place this morning in the Municipal Court. Subpoenas have been issued for Mr. and Mrs. Fox, proprietors of the Cascade Hotel, at whose house Henderson once lived. Mrs. L. Street, landlady of the Monarch lodging-house, West Park and Stark streets, has been summoned to tell what she knows of Cohen, who once lived at her house.

DEATH OF WILLIAM W. CURTIS.—William W. Curtis, a well-known lumberman of Western Oregon, died at his home, 731 Williams avenue, Sunday, October 27, at 29 years of age. He came to Portland 20 years ago and started the Curtis Lumber Company sawmill, on the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad, which he operated for a number of years. He retired from the management of the mill several years ago. He was a native of New York. A widow and son survive him.

DEATH OF WILLIAM VOLHEKE.—William Volheke, a pioneer, died at his home, in Sellwood, Sunday at the age of 86 years and 28 days. Old age was the cause of his death. Mr. Volheke came to Portland from Germany in 1833, and has lived here ever since. He is survived by his one son and three daughters, who live in Portland. The funeral will be held at the home from Hemlock's undertaking chapel, on Umatilla avenue, Sellwood, at 2 o'clock, and the interment will be in Lone Fir Cemetery.

LAMPBLACK LAW MAY BE INVALID.—A technical error has been found in the ordinance passed at the last meeting of the Council, requiring lampblack in cement sidewalks, which may invalidate the measure. In the text of the ordinance, the number of the section of ordinance No. 34233 to be amended was omitted. Mayor Lane has sent a copy of the ordinance to City Attorney Kavanaugh to ascertain the effect of the omission.

RETURNS TO FACE CHARGES.—F. J. McKay, arrested Saturday afternoon on instructions from the Chicago police, returned voluntarily to the Windy City yesterday. McKay was held on an embezzlement charge, which he declared was the result of business troubles. At the time of his arrest, he evinced a willingness to return and face the charges, and yesterday purchased a ticket and returned without any effort to guard him.

DROING SEWER TUNNEL.—Work has been started on the tunnel extension of the Brooklyn sewer. The big conduit will be built from East 10th street to the river. Some blasting was done yesterday morning in the tunnel. Mayor Lane inspected the work in progress on this sewer system, and said that it was about as difficult a sewer to build as had ever been undertaken in Portland.

THROUBLE IN ROACH FAMILY.—Charged by his wife with assault and battery, Thomas Roach was arrested last night by Detective Sergeant Bats and Acting Detective Pat Malone, and taken to the police station, where he was released on his recognizance by Clerk Hennessey, of the Municipal Court. Roach promises to make startling charges against his wife when the case comes up this morning.

SILVER SERVICE FOR PASTOR.—In recognition of their appreciation of the efforts of Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Hepp, former pastor of Centenary Methodist Church, the members of the congregation presented them with a silver tea service and a set of silver spoons. The presentation was made by a committee of Messrs. J. O. Daley, Mrs. T. H. Short and Mrs. W. Harlow.

RESEARCH CLUB MEETS.—The Research Club, of the First United Presbyterian Church, held its second session of the season at the home of Miss Edna Hawley, 148 Rodney avenue, last night. The club was addressed by William H. Soule, of the staff of the Oregonian, on "The Making of a Modern Newspaper."

FOUR CHINESE ARRESTED.—A Chinese gambling report, at 100% Second street, was raided about 7 o'clock last night by Detectives Kay and Kienlen, and four gamblers were caught. All were taken to the station, and later released on \$50 bail each.

BUSY, BUSY HORSETHIEVES

ANOTHER STOLEN ANIMAL IS FOUND BY SHERIFF.

Latest Raid Results in Capture of Fourth Horse in Possession of J. F. Hawkes.

A network of curious circumstances surrounds the capture yesterday, by Deputy Sheriff Leonard, of another stolen horse, in the possession of J. F. Hawkes, of right about the same time as the last.

Thursday on a charge of horse stealing, and released on \$100 cash bail. The animal taken in charge yesterday by Deputy Leonard is a bay horse, weighing about 1200 pounds, with a heavy black mane and tail, right hind foot white, a star on his forehead, and with a white spot on his nose. The animal has a brand on his right shoulder which resembles the letter O. He is a little more than 4 years old, and the Deputy Sheriff believes he was originally stolen during or before August, 1906.

The animal was in possession of Hawkes during that month, according to Leonard, and was put out to pasture on the ranch of W. C. Spence, on Columbia Slough. Spence is the proprietor of the Rosa City Dairy.

"When Hawkes put the horse in pasture," said Deputy Leonard last night, "he gave Mr. Spence the name of Charles Smith. The animal remained on the ranch until last May, when he was mysteriously stolen. Spence hunted everywhere for him, but could not find him, and in the meantime Hawkes, alias Smith, had paid nothing for the pasture bill, which was running up at the rate of \$1 a month. Neither had he called to take the animal out. At the time the horse was missed, \$48 was owing for pasture. I believe the horse was stolen from Hawkes might avoid paying Spence the pasture bill."

"I am also satisfied the colt was stolen before it was put in pasture. From whom I cannot say, as we have had no complaint yet. The horse is gentle, and it is the impression of those who saw him that he was broken to the harness before he was placed in pasture. I believe we will find his real owner in a few days."

This is the fourth horse to be found in Hawkes' possession. The other three are known to have been stolen, and have been returned to their owners. Hawkes was caught last Thursday getting out wood from the barn in the mountains west of Woodbrook, and was lodged in jail until his bail could be obtained for him.

RECEIVER WAKES AN APPEAL

MR. DEVLIN GIVES DEPOSITORS LAST CHANCE.

Defunct Bank Cannot Reopen Unless Creditors Take Telephone Bonds or Stock in the Institution.

Receiver Thomas C. Devlin, of the closed Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, will send out the following letter today to depositors in that institution who have not so far signed up for telephone bonds or bank stock.

Dear Sir: I find that you are a depositor in the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, and consider that you are therefore interested in knowing the condition of the bank and what measures are being considered as to importance in securing for depositors the best return.

The indebtedness of the bank on August 21, 1907, the time it closed its doors, was in excess of \$2,300,000, aside from its capital stock.

My report filed with the court September 17, showed assets as follows:

Loans and discounts, \$1,027,747.39
 Bonds, \$1,087,000.00
 Overdrafts, \$102,314.78
 Due from banks, \$102,314.78
 Bank stock, \$25,800.00
 Miscellaneous, \$9,224.50
 Cash, \$73,544.52

Total, \$2,300,536.11

This did not include the lease and fixtures of the bank building, nor certain stock in telephone companies which were of uncertain value.

From this statement, it must be evident to you that there will be a heavy loss on the business of the bank under a forced sale of its securities under receiver-ship. I also find that the losses in particular accounts such as the Golden Gate, the Goods Company, the Pullman Auto Car Company, and others listed in my report at full value as shown by the books, will, in some instances, be as large as 75 per cent.

There are still other debtors who, if pressed for settlement, will be crowded into bankruptcy, but, if given time, under ordinary conditions, would pay out.

A number of depositors formed an association with the view of advising as to the best methods to pursue. I have given the representatives of this association consideration, after careful study of the whole matter and investigation by a committee consisting of Senator E. W. Haines, President of the State Bankers' Association, and Hon. Jefferson Myers, concluded that the interests of the depositors would be best served by the reorganization of the bank.

This was made feasible by assurances from certain parties that new capital would be subscribed to the bank, and that the indebtedness of the bank in the following manner:

First—By having depositors take telephone bonds with a 50 per cent bonus in stock at par for their deposits to the amount of \$85,000.

Second—By having depositors subscribe for stock in the reorganized bank for \$150,000.

Third—By having depositors accept time certificates of deposit for \$350,000.

At the present time, the amount of the amount of \$875,000 have been subscribed for; stocks in the reorganized bank has been subscribed to the amount of \$90,000. There is assurance that the third condition will be complied with. It remains for depositors to subscribe for \$250,000 more of telephone bonds and \$60,000 of bank stock. Upon these conditions apparently depend the success or failure of reorganization.

I have felt that it was my duty to give the depositors every opportunity to act in an effort that promised so much for the recovery of the bank, and that you have interested. I now feel that further delay is unwarranted. If this plan is not to succeed, I must sell the assets and lease of the bank, and cheaper offers and less advantageous than this plan.

It is my purpose to do so quickly, and I believe that you have not thus far participated in the work of reorganization, by subscribing for bank stock or telephone bonds. If you have, have done, I feel that your attention should be called to the matter for your advantage and for all other depositors. Yours very truly,

Claims Are Turned Down.
 An order issued by Judge Gantehnen yesterday morning gave 25 claims for services performed by employees of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank within 90 days of the date the receiver was appointed, but the claims of W. H. Moore, president of the bank, and W. Cooper Morris, cashier, and J. H. Truby, assistant cashier, were turned down.

Moore claimed \$23,000 salary, Morris the same, and Truby \$132.33. The claims allowed amount to a little more than \$1100.

Mrs. Annie Tormoehlin has made application to withdraw \$1010 from the defunct bank, as she says that on July 31 she deposited two Lincoln Park tickets, which she had collected from the Port Department National Bank of Chicago. She asserts that the local bank wired to Chicago at her request, and found that payment had been made, but that the cash was never turned over to her by the officials of the defunct bank.

 THERE are several minutes of intense excitement when Frank Hall, the English Hontamer, steps into the cage with the lion, Wallace, at Pantages theater. It is not the cut-and-dried tame lion affair with the tamer shaking hands with his animal. The two do not get on friendly terms at all. It is only too clear that Hall is taking his life in his hands when he joins Wallace, the big beast from the Chutes at San Francisco. It is only the man's superb nerve and mastery of the situation that keeps the lion for the minute that Hall is in the cage. Yesterday it was only by firing blank cartridges in the lion's face that he could keep the beast at bay long enough to slip unharmed from the narrow opening of the steel cage. It was a thrilling act, one that drew the audience up tense with excitement. Hall, no doubt, is in a class by himself in his business. There are few performers that are likely to attempt the perilous business of shaking death with death in this manner.

The lion act, of course, is a feature, but there is another decidedly good number in the Oilphtans, European grotesque comedy. Their act, which is a mixture of European vaudeville and made the biggest kind of a hit yesterday. Mansfield and Mansfield, army sharpshooters, gave a remarkable exhibition of marksmanship with gallery rifles of small caliber. Harry Clinton Sawyer, the matinee idol of San Francisco vaudeville, is on hand with his comedy singing imitations, which are good. J. Murray Simon is a good comedy dancer, but his ability as a joke-smith is of purely a negative character. He is a shrewd for J.
