Salted hides are now quoted at 6 cents and green hides at 8 cents in the local market. This is about half what hides were worth a year

The market is disturbed by financial conditions and the fact that money is very difficult to obtain on reasonable terms. About all of the intree tanners are out of the market entirely and entertain such hearish views regarding future values that at present they are not even disposed to make bids. Sales of packer hides during the week have been very moderate and have been confined chiefly to single car lots that have been purchased by scattering buyers to supply immediate wants.

Country Weathers Financial Storm Remarkably Well.

CONFIDENCE IS RETURNING

Fewer Commercial Failures Than for Two Weeks Past-Hoarded Money Is Going Back Into the Banks-Use of Credit Paper.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade will say tomorrow that there were fewer commercial failures in the United States this week than for two weeks past, reflecting the improvement of conditions as forecasted in the reports received up to last night. Searcity of money, unseasonable weather and the holiday combined to make the volume of business smaller than much this week, but the situation is more encouraging because of mess smaller than music this week, but the situation is more encouraging because of more general belief that the inancial storm is being weathered remarkably well.

About \$40,000,000 in gold was secured abroad before the Bank of England raised the official rate of discount, and returning confidence is witnessed by deposits of hearded money. It will take some time to restore all this cash to circulation, but the treasury has given further relief and the banks are issuing notes freely. Leading industries are handlenped by lack of funds and so many contemplated undertakings have been deferred that working forces are reduced, expecially at steel mills.

Prices of commodities have declined still further and exports should be increased thereby, but for the last week foreign commerce at this port showed a loss of \$2,512.681 in value of merchandise experted as compared with the same week last year, while imports gained \$185.061.

MORE OPTIMISTIC TONE PREVAILS. Country Accommodates Itself to Changed Financial Conditions.

Good progress has been made in accommodating the country to the changed financial condition; this, too, with strikingly little friction, considering the scarcity of currency and widespread substitution of credit instruments for actual cash. At the same time, wholesale and jobbing trade has quited down very perceptibly, and the disposition in industrial lines has been to curtail production wherever possible, the simbeing to avoid unnecessary or possibly burdensome accumulations of atocks.

There is, in fact, a rather more optimistic tone prevailing this week than last, the cutgrowth of the better feeling at the Basi, the large arrivals of gold from Europe, and the idea that basic conditions, both as regards the purchasing power of the people and absence of large stocks, are better than in some preceding years of stress. There are, it is true, increasing evidences that the level of commodity prices has been forced unreasonably high and the process of readjustment will compel numerous revisions. In this respect, the easing of from and other metal prices, the further decline in cereals and the sharp falling off in livestock quotations are taken as an earnest desire for revision in other lines yet to come. From two sections the Northwost and the Southwest, complaints are numerous that the absence of actual cash prevents the movement of wheat and cotton to market; but the country-wide issuance of bank and corporation checks in small denominations has eased the currency situation greatly. The domestic exchange markets are much more settled and the general acceptance of credit instruments is expected to allow or necessary business being done pending the readjustment of the volume of business to the supply of currency capital. WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Preliminary re-urns to the Department of Agriculture on turns to the Department of Agriculture on the production of corn indicate a total yield of 2,553,732,090 bushels, an average of 26 bushels per acre, as compared with the yield of 30.3 bushels per acre in 1995. The general average as to the quality is 82.8 per cent, as compared with 80.9 per cent last year. The average yield of corn in 1995 was 28.8 bushels per acre and the condition was 36.8. It is estimated that about 4.4 per cent (130,895,000 bushels) of the crop of 1996 was still in the hands of farmers November 1, 1907, as compared with 4 per cent (119,-1. 1907, as compared with 4 per cent (119,-603,000 bushels) of the crop of 1906 in farmers' hands on November 1, 1906, and 5.8 per cent the 10-year average for old corn on hand November 1.
