Kuhn and Anderson Again in Trouble.

COIN MONEY IN WOODS

Secret Service Detectives Arrest Ex-Convicts Recently Released, Who Endeavor to Relieve Present Shortage of Gold Money.

Fred. Kuhn and John Anderson, two public-spirited young men who were lately released from the state penitentiary, will doubtless return to that establishment in consequence of their efforts to relieve the present money shortage. The two were caught while absorbed in converting babbit metal into \$5 and \$10 gold pieces, yesterday forenoon.

While the two counterfeiters are partners in the business, one was arrested in the St. Lawrence rooming house on Vancouver avenue, while the other was picked up in the brush opposite Ross Island. Both men were engaged in counterfeiting gold coins when secret service men came upon them. Both surrendered without resistance and later made a full confession.

Had their plans gone through Portland's money supply would have been increased by thousands of dollars of very presentable counterfeit money. The pair had complete outfits for moulding and had been awaiting only the arrival of a plating machine from Cincinnati. This arrived yesterday, but they were arrested before having an opportunity to secure this device which would have enabled them to put the finishing touches on the coin. Each of them had several hundred dollars' worth of spurious money ready and were still hard at work.

But for the work of the secret service men there is no doubt but that the men would have made a good clean-up. Gold coin is not any too plentiful, and is accepted with great eagerness. It is probably this fact that set them to work.

The arrests were made by Secret Service Detectives Nicholson and Connell. They caught Kuhn first, shortly before noon, walking in on him while he was at work making moulds for \$5

CHARGE AGAINST LOCKWOOD

ALLEGED PUBLISHERS' AGENT LEFT \$4800 SHORTAGE.

Los Angeles Police Are Hunting for Former Portland Agent of Charles Scribner's Sons.

That John P. Lockwood, formerly resident agent for Charles Scribner's Sons, publishers, is short in his accounts \$4800 is charged in a felony information filed against him in the Municipal Court yesterday by his successor in office, J. A. Martin. The police immediately took up the case and have wired the Los Angeles authorities, where he is supposed to be in hiding. His arrest is expected at any time.

In the complaint that was filed yesterday J. A. Martin, now in charge of the Portland office of Charles Scribner's Sons, in the Buchanan building, charges that Lockwood, while acting as resident agent, collected and appropriated to his own use funds to the extent of \$4800.

Martin recently took charge of the Portland office and, after checking up the accounts, states in his complaint that he found his predecessor short in the amount named. As soon as arrangements were completed the case was laid before the District Attorney, who filed a felony-embezzlement complaint.

A warrant was issued out of the Municipal Court yesterday by Clerk Hennessey and was placed in the hands of Chief Grinnacher for service. Martin informed the Chief that Lockwood is supposed to be in Los Angeles, whether he is thought to have fled from Portland. The authorities of that city have therefore been requested to take the man into custody. If he is captured an officer will be dispatched to bring him back for trial.

While he was resident agent for Scribner's, Lockwood resided with his family at 8 East Twenty-second street North. He was a widely-known man about the city and surrounding territory. He was a fluent talker and stylish dresser. He was able to secure much business for his employers and was regarded as in every way trustworthy. His friends here express confidence in Lockwood's innocence and believe that he will be able to disprove the embezzlement charges.

As resident agent Lockwood had charge of all the business of Charles Scribner's Sons, and therefore attended to the collections. In this manner he was able, as alleged in the complaint, to secure money that he is said to have misappropriated.

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RANCHERS' AIM IS DEADLY

DEFEND LONELY MOUNTAIN CABIN WITH RIFLES.

Two Men Shot Dead by Carlisle Brothers and Third Seriously Wounded—Arrests Follow.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—What may be termed the bloodiest battle in Southern Oregon since the days of the Indian Wars occurred on Yellow Creek, 20 miles northeast of Oakland, yesterday, in which two men, Hiram Shook and Manse Kincaide, are dead, and Louis Pichette is under the care of relatives with a bullet wound in the shoulder.

Two Carlisle brothers held a claim on Yellow Creek on which others looked with covetous eyes. Hiram Shook, Manse Kincaide, and Louis Pichette desired to drive the Carlisles out of that part of the country, presumably to get their possessions, and the three aggressors yesterday went to the place. The Carlisle brothers, seeing them coming, secreted themselves and allowed the attacking party to come within 25 feet of the cabin, when they ordered them to stop. Shook, it is reported, opened fire which one of the Carlisles responded, killing Shook on first fire. Kincaide then picked up an ax and started toward the Carlisles, when a bullet from their gun killed him. In the melee Louis Pichette was wounded, but not dangerously.

The Carlisle boys went to Oakland and surrendered themselves to the authorities, and have since been brought to Roseburg and are now in jail. District Attorney Brown and Coroner Himmette are now at Oakland investigating the bloody affair.

Bad blood has existed between the parties for some time, and trouble had been feared. Kincaide was a brother of Alfred Kincaide, who was murdered by Sam Brown at Oakland 12 years ago. Shook was shot in the shoulder near Corvallis eight years ago while resisting a hold-up. His brother shot and killed two men and then committed suicide, following a domestic quarrel at Elkton in 1905.
