

THEIR HOPE TO BANISH SALOON

Anti-Liquor Forces Will Call Vote on Local Option in Many Counties.

PREPARING FOR ELECTION

Prohibition Party and Anti-Saloon League Bury Hatchet and Join Hands in Cause—Nine Counties Are Now Listed as Dry.

Although the rum demon has been driven from the old haunts in Oregon, his foes are not yet satisfied and are preparing to call elections in many "wet" precincts and counties next June, under the local option law of 1904.

This seems to be the sentiment of both the Anti-Saloon League and its ally, the Prohibition Party. These two organizations are now working in harmony. The League politely forgets the wild-goose chase of the Prohibition party three years ago, when it called a prohibition election in Multnomah County, and the cold-water advocates are willing it should be forgotten. So that the two erstwhile rival bodies are dwelling together in peace.

Banish Saloon From Oregon.

That the saloon some day will be driven out of the state is the belief of members of the Anti-Saloon League, the Prohibition party and temperance organizations. They say they do not aim at stopping sale of liquor so much as expelling the saloon, which represents the social side of the liquor traffic and which produces nine-tenths of the liquor evil and a great deal of lawlessness. They believe that the ruling sentiment of the state does not favor barring liquor from its borders, but that it does want the saloon banished. Consequently they are now fighting the saloon by means of precinct and county option.

Three high dignitaries of the Prohibition party—F. H. Ames, H. McCricker and B. Lee Paget, the men who conceived the local option law in this state and engaged E. C. Brown to draft it—yesterday said that while they are always ready to lead the cold-water hosts against the fire-water inns, they did not think the prohibition would be proposed in the election next June. Mr. Bronaugh held the same opinion. This sentiment is held also by leaders of the Anti-Saloon League and of one of its potential allies, the Municipal Association, of this city.

Extirpation of the saloon—perhaps by state prohibition—is their goal, but they are willing to wait a while and educate public sentiment to the viciousness of the saloon, and in the interim make use of the local option law, which offers abundant opportunities for successfully fighting the rumshop.

Vote in Prohibition Counties.

Last year's prohibition elections showed that there must be a period of "education" before the state will accept prohibition. In the counties carried for the dry mandate the elections were close, and there were nine other counties which rejected prohibition. The vote in the nine dry counties was as follows:
