# THEIR HOPE TO BANISH SALOON

Anti-Liquor Forces Will Call Vote on Local Option in Many Counties.

PREPARING FOR ELECTION

Prohibition Party and Anti-Saloon League Bury Hatchet and Join Hands in Cause-Nine Counties Are Now Listed as Dry.

Although the rum demon has been driven from many of his old anunts in Oregon, his foes are not yet satisfied and are preparing to call elections in many "wet" precincis and countles next under the local option law o 1904. They would like to enact a law expelling beverage liquor from every nook and cranny of Oregon, but many of them fear public sentiment has not been "educated" to that point There has been some talk of a prohibition constitutional amendment or statutory enactment, under the initiative, but us yet no movement has been started to that end, and from the present looks of things! it will not be attempted until a more general "clean-up" shall have been effected under the local option law.

both the Anti-Saloon League and its ally, the Prohibition Party. These two organizations are now working in harony. The League politely forgets the old-goose chase of the Prohibition party three years ago, when it called a prohibition election in Mult-nomah County, and the cold-water stal-

warts are willing it should be forgot-ten. So that the two erstwhile rival bodies are dwelling together in peace. Prohibition has carried in nine of Oregon's 32 countles, under the local option law, and in many precincts in other counties. The dry counties are Tillamook, Yambill, Lincoln, Benton, Linn, Lane and Curry, in Western Oreand Sherman and Wallows in Oregon. Nine other counties Eastern Oregon, Nine other counties rejected prolibition in June, 1906—Co-lumbia, Polk and Coos in Western Ore-gon, and Wheeler, Wasco, Crook, Morrow, Gilliam and Malheur in Eastern

#### Banish Saloon From Oregon.

That the saloon some day will be driven out of the state is the belief of members of the Anti-Saloon League, the Prohibition party and temperance organizations. They say they do not aim at stopping sale of liquor so much as expelling the saloon, which repre-sents the social side of the liquor traf-fic and which produces nine-tenths of the liquor cyll and a great deal of lawlessness. They believe that the ruling sentiment of the state does not favor barring liquor from its borders, but that it does want the sulcon banished. saloon by means of precinct and county

Three high dignituries of the Prohibition party—I. H. Amos, F. Mc-kercher and B. Lee Paget, the men who conceived the local option law in this state and engaged E. C. Broin this state and engaged E. Extirpation of the saloon-perhaps by state prohibition-is their goal, but they are willing to wait a while and educate public sentiment to the vicious-ness of the saloon, and in the interim make use of the local option law, which offers abundant opportunities for successfully fighting the rumshop.

#### Vote in Prohibition Counties.

Last year's prohibition elections showed that there must be a period of "education" before the state will accept prohibition. In the counties car-ried for the dry mandate the elections were close, and there were nine other counties which rejected prohibition, The vote in the nine dry counties was

In the dry countles the ban has not

stopped consumption of liquor—only sale. It is not unlawful to drink liquor there, nor to ship it in after it has been purchased elsewhere. In consequence large quantities of liquor are consumed in the dry counties. The open saloor has been abolished, but the "blind pig" occasionally exists— a place under cover where liquor is sold in defiance of law.


