SUIT TO BE TRIED FEBRUARY 3

Action of J. H. Scott Against Marbleworkers' Union Set.

The suit of J. H. Scott against the Marble Workers' Union, Local No. 25, will be tried in the United States Court February 3. Several months ago Scott brought the suit to enjoin the members of the organization from interfering with his employment as cutter and setter by the firm of New & Kingsley.

Heavy Reserve in the Dalles.

THE DALLES, Or., Dec. 9.—(Special.)—Financial conditions in Wasco County are most favorably reflected by the report of the First National Bank of this city, to the Controller of the Currency, December 3. By this report the bank on that date had deposits aggregating \$479,626.80, with an available cash reserve of \$297,973.46, consisting of cash in its vault and due from other banks. While required to carry as a reserve only 15 per cent of its deposits, these figures show that this bank has an actual reserve amounting to 62 per cent of its total deposits.
