With granaries and storehouses filled to the rafters with the products of a record-breaking harvest, the people of Oregon are prepared to dispense Christmas cheer freely among those to whom fortune has been less kind. In Portland plans are being completed for a celebration of the anniversary this year surpassing all previous efforts. The volume of the holiday trade indicates a bounteous Christmas for those who have been accustomed to a liberal interchange of gifts, but the spirit of giving is in the air, and few will be overlooked. At all the public and charitable institutions in this city, dinner with all the substantial delicacies of the season, will be served and the services of Santa Claus and his corps of assistants will be required to include a tree and an entertainment in officiate at numerous trees from which the evening.
