ONE OTHER DEAD; 18 HURT

Wife of Former Sellwood Methodist Pastor Was on Way to Atlanta, Ga., Where Her Husband Had Accepted a Call.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Jan. 9.—South-bound train No. 19, Sunset Express on the Southern Pacific Railroad, was wrecked early this evening at Rucker, 25 miles below here.

A partial list of the injured follows: William Ferguson, Lawrence, Mass., badly crushed; may die.

News of the death of Mrs. A. P. Boyd will come to her friends in this city as a great shock.

Mrs. Boyd was about 35 years old, and her little son was 10 years old.

Rev. Mr. Boyd and his wife came to the Sellwood Church last September from Roseburg, where he was pastor of the First Church for some time.
