

# CARE COMES OUT FOR SENATORSHIP

## Portland Lawyer Declares Himself Candidate Against C. W. Fulton.

### WILL STUMP THE STATE

#### Opens Campaign Next Month on Platform Favoring River Improvement and Tariff Revision.

### Supports Statement No. 1.

H. M. Calk's expected candidacy for the United States Senatorship, to succeed C. W. Fulton, was announced yesterday by Mr. Calk. There are now two named aspirants for the Republican nomination for that office, the other being Mr. Fulton. Mr. Calk says he will support the direct primary law and Statement No. 1. Mr. Fulton is not an advocate of Statement No. 1, and while not actively fighting it is counted by its advocates as an enemy.

Mr. Calk will announce his platform later, but it is known by his friends that his chief plank will be demands for improvement of rivers and harbors and revision of the tariff. He has already declared himself opposed to Senator Fulton's plan for enlarged federal powers. Mr. Calk will make a stump campaign over the state, beginning next month, for the primary nomination, and will continue the campaign up to the general election, June 1.

The Democratic candidate is expected to be Governor Chamberlain, who will meet the Republican nominees in the June election. Mr. Calk's supporters are confident that Mr. Calk can defeat Fulton in the Republican primary and Chamberlain in the general election. They say that two years ago he made a phenomenal run for the primary nomination, for a man who had never appeared actively before the people in any other time in politics. He ran a close second in the primaries and for several days was thought to have defeated Bourne for the nomination. When the final returns came in the count showed the vote as follows: Bourne, 12,877; Calk, 12,262; Lowell, 768; E. L. Smith, 633; Watson, 424; total, 42,868. Bourne's plurality, 655.

### Will Make Clean Fight.

There will be keen rivalry between Mr. Calk and Mr. Fulton, but Mr. Calk says he will not make a campaign of assault on Mr. Fulton nor embitter their relations. Mr. Calk said last night:

"I shall enter this contest with the utmost good will toward Senator Fulton and shall maintain this attitude under all circumstances during the campaign. If Mr. Fulton shall be nominated, my friends and I will give him our hearty support in the June election. And I believe that the Senator and all his friends will do the same for me should I be successful in the primary."
