

FALLON MAY LOSE SALOON LICENSE

Council Committee's Report to Be Unfavorable to North End Liquor-Dealer.

THUGS FREQUENT RESORT

Testimony to This Effect Given by Police Officers and Citizens.

Tom Fallon's saloon, at Third and Couch streets, where it was proved in court that the Solloway Postoffice robbery was planned by a notorious gang of thieves, will have to close its doors, if the City Council adopts the recommendation of its liquor-license committee.

After hearing the charges against the several saloonkeepers, the members of the liquor-license committee—Councilmen Cotel, Vaughn, Wallace, Rushlight, Wills, Bennett and Driscoll—declared themselves of the opinion that practically all the trouble arising in saloons is caused by the presence of women. Every member of the committee expressed his conviction that the proposed ordinance prohibiting women from entering saloons will come very near to solving the numerous troubles which have been frequently brought to the attention of the city officials.

That an ordinance now being drafted by the city attorney, J. W. Mitchell, prohibiting women from entering saloons, will pass the council, is predicted by all who have been asked for an opinion. Every one of the saloonkeepers on trial yesterday expressed his desire to have this law, and declared that women are a detriment to any saloon's business.

Women Cause All Trouble. "Get rid of the women in saloons," said Councilman Driscoll, "and the trouble will be about relieved." His sentiment was echoed by all members of the committee.
