## EGGS WILL BE CHEAP

This Is the Opinion of the Front-Street Trade.

### LOW PRICES IN THE SPRING

Market Is on the Downward Grade Now, as Receipts Are Large and Retailers Only Buy for Immediate Needs.

The dealers who have been anticipation of n a small way in eggs in anticipation of cold weather have about given up the belief that we will have any Winter, and are rning their attention now to getting rid what they have on hand. In furthering of what they have an hand, in furthering this plan they dropped prices another cent yesterday, quoting 25 to 26 cents. Retailers, however, are willing for the jobbors to do all the speculating, and, therefore, are anly buying from hand to mouth. Some of the Front-street firms report their recaipts where as large as their sales. As stocks are incumulating all along the street it is evitent that the downward course of prices will centime unless the weather changes soon.

The opinion prevails that prices will be nusually low in the local market in the oming Spring and the Eastern trade has he same idea of very low values. The latest sue of the Chicago Packer says on this

tissue of the Chicago Packer says on this subject:

Already there is considerable gossip among the egg trade, the storage warehouses and the banks about the outlook for the coming season. To a man everybody predicts that eggs will go in at a lower price this year than for several years past. It is rumered here that a coterie of bankers have already come to a practical agreement that 33 per case will be the outside price advanced on eggs this season and only to already content of the customers at that. Some incline to believe that something like \$2.50 will perhaps be nearer the average advance. As a general proposition storage eggs appear to have go on the list of bad speculative commodities" with the hanks, and while the banks profess to never have lost any large amounts of money in financing the egg deal, the fact remains true that they have lost a great deal of sleep and have often been worried many to doubt over the loans made to certain clients.

On the other hand, it is believed that there will be considerable lide capital put on the market in the hear future, and if there is any difficulty in getting all money invested that will be on the hands of the hanks it is the idea of some few people in the trade that advances on storage eggs will probably not be so hard to get, even if a large figure is not advanced.

Altogether, prospects for the coming egg season indicate that there will be an enorm-ous production again, and reports at the present time certainly do not tend to convey the impression that there will be any scarcity of laying hous. Many new territories where eggs have not been produced in commercial quantities heretofore have been opened up, and with improved transportation facilities these atocks can all betransported from the furtherest point West to the furtherest point East or stopped off to be put in storage at intermediate points.

The harmful effect of neither of these events was as great as had been apprehended, and no appreciable liquida-tion was induced by them to help the shorts in securing stocks to fill their short contracts.

There was another kind of demand incited by the definite climination of these unfavorable factors from the market and which was encouraged by the small effect which they had on sentiment. The formulation of the rumors that have been current regarding the banking situation into the official announcement concerning the Bank of North America caused a feeting of relief and the whole situation was fell to be bettered. Another influence in strengthening confidence in the banking situation as a whole, is the prospect that by next week the condition of the trust companies and state banks in New York will be the subject of a weekly statement to the State Banking Department and thus remove once and for all the obscurity and uncertainty which have surrounded the actual financial position in New York by reason of the growing imadequacy of the Clearing-House bank statement to reflect fully the condition as a whole.

The Bood of cash which is now flowing into New York will also facilitate the establishment of the reserves of trust companies which are contemplated in bringing those institutions into line with the general banking requirements.
