

# DAN KELLY IS BEATEN TWICE

## Fails to Overcome Lead of Handicap Men in Past-time Games.

# SMITHSON WINS HURDLES

## Takes 60-Yard Event in Record Time, but Knocks Over Hurdle and Time Is Not Allowed. Large Crowd Present.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—(Special.)—Harry Hillman, champion hurdler of the New York Athletic Club, conquered H. P. Ramey, the Western half-mile champion and member of the Chicago Athletic Club, tonight in the 60-yard special race at the Pastime Athletic Club games at Madison-Square Garden. Hillman won by a scant yard, his time being 1:18 3/8.

Dan Kelly, the world's champion sprinter, was beaten in two dashes. He started from scratch in the 60-yard sprint, won by S. McSweeney from the 15-yard mark, and was unable to overcome the handicap in the 200-yard dash. It was Kelly's first race on a board road and he ran finely. In the 200-yard dash the field was so large that he was unable to get past the handicap men and was again beaten.

Forrest Smithson, the National champion high hurdler, won the 60-yard high hurdle event in record time. He covered the distance in his heat and the final in eight seconds, but on each occasion he knocked down a hurdle and thereby deprived himself of the record.

Despite the fact that Merwin Sheppard was ineligible to compete in the 1000-yard special race, the event was held. Guy Haskins having an opponent, E. White, of the New York Athletic Club. White only graduated from the novice class a few weeks ago and was considered to have little chance against the collegiate champion. Haskins won, but he was compelled to run his best in order to do so.

Thirty-five hundred persons were present. The summary: 60-yard hurdles, scratch—Won by Forrest Smithson, unattached; D. Robbins, Yale University, second; S. C. Northridge, Irish-American A. C., third; time, 8 seconds. 200-yard handicap—Won by P. A. Groggin, Pastime A. C. (15 yards); S. E. Harris, Twenty-third street Y. M. C. A. (15 yards), second; R. C. Taylor, Chicago A. A., third; time, 2:11 1/8 seconds.
