Severest Test of Horseless Vehicle Begins Next Wednesday.

GERMAN MACHINE ARRIVES

Race Will Be Across United States, by Steamer to Valdez, Then Across Alaska, Siberia and Europe to Paris.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The first of the foreign teams scheduled to start in the New York-to-Paris automobile race on Wednesday next arrived today on the steamship Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, and its members were met at the pier by a group of enthusiasts and officials connected with the contest.

Most Difficult Test of Auto. The race will be the most difficult test to which the automobile has ever been put. When it was first suggested, many persons looked upon it as an impossibility, but as the plans were worked out the feat appeared more and more feasible.

Over Alaskan and Siberian Snow. The start will be made from Times Square at 11 o'clock next, February 15—Lincoln's birthday—at 11 A. M. The route lies across the American continent to San Francisco, where the machines will be transported by steamer to Seattle and thence to Valdez, Alaska.

Route Across Continent. Leaving New York, the automobiles will pass through Albany, New York, Rochester, Buffalo, Erie, Cleveland, Toledo, Chicago, Council Bluffs, Omaha, Cheyenne, Green River, Ogden, Winnemucca, Reno, Golconda, Santa Barbara, and San Jose, the southern detour from Reno being made necessary by the impossibility of the Sierras at this time of the year.

VERDICT IN THE HALL CASE (Continued from First Page.) In the first place, charged Judge Hunt, it remains for the jury to determine if the conspiracy alleged actually existed and if it did exist, was any overt act charged done by one of the parties charged to effect its object.

Statute Read to Jury. That a defendant charged with any offense is presumed to be innocent until proved guilty and that the guilt of a defendant must be established beyond a reasonable doubt, were pointed out by the court as elementary principles of law. The jurors were also reminded that they were the exclusive judges of the credibility of the different witnesses.

Intent Must Be Shown. But, as I have said to you, mere delay or neglect, unless the delay or failure to act was done for the purpose and with the intent of enabling persons to violate the law, would not render the official guilty of conspiracy. Positive evidence entirely in proof of a conspiracy is not necessary to be shown from the nature of the evidence. The quantity is in part circumstantial. Relations of Parties. It is not necessary that each of the parties should, in person, commit the unlawful act, or that all the persons in a conspiracy should receive the benefit of it. As to the Confessions. The testimony of the defendant, too, held the court, should be weighed carefully. In judging the credibility of what he had said, the jury should consider the consistency with which he was charged and whether or not he had originated a false theory of defense should be considered.
