SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—(Special.)—San Francisco is free from bubonic plague, but the campaign for a clean city will be continued unabated.

A citizens' health committee, composed of bankers, physicians and business men, to the number of 25, has been appointed to co-operate with the authorities in charge.

PANIC ATTACKS DANISH BANKS

Government Checks Run by Guaranteeing Deposits.

Reduce Pay on Southern Roads.

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 9.—In view of the falling off in business, the managements of the Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific Railroad, and the Alabama Great Southern Railroad have determined to put into effect on March 1 a reduction of 10 per cent in the pay of general officials and employees receiving monthly salaries of \$200 or over.

Not Involved in Failure.

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 9.—The National Bank of the Republic in this city is in no way involved in the affairs of the firm of Heath & Milligan, of Chicago, which passed into a receiver's hands yesterday.

Federal Officials Preparing to Fight Lawyer Named for District Attorneyship.

PLUM MAY BE TOWNSEND'S
