EVIDENCE IS NOT BELIEVED

SUPREME COURT REVERSES DECREE IN DIVORCE SUIT. Admission of Misstatements Does Not Warrant Testimony Worthy of Credence—Other Decisions.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 11.—(Special.)—The Supreme Court today reversed a decree by Judge A. L. Frazer, granting a divorce in favor of Mrs. Gladys Morgan, and against her husband, Joseph T. Ellis, a Portland lawyer.

MULTNOMAH COUNTY HAS LOST ITS SUIT AGAINST THE STATE IN ITS ATTEMPT TO RECOVER COMPROMISE AND CANCELLATION OF TAXES GRANTED BY THE COUNTY COURT IN JULY, 1901.

Wilson, has been appointed a special policeman to preserve order in the church should a conflict threaten between the two opposing factions.
