

JAPANESE ENVOY ARRIVES IN OREGON

Greetings of Takahira and Roosevelt Are Unusually Cordial.

PLEDGE NATIONAL AMITY

Each Nation Will Labor to Maintain Peace—Roosevelt Promises Co- operation in Advancing the Interests of Japan.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The formal reception of Baron Takahira as Ambassador of the Japanese government to the United States took place at the White House at 2:45 P. M. The Ambassador was brought to the White House in President Roosevelt's private carriage, accompanied by Colonel Bromwell, the President's military aide.

The suite of the Ambassador in diplomatic, naval and military uniforms was present at the reception.

Takahira Glad to Come.

Upon being presented, Baron Takahira addressed the President as follows:

Mr. President: The Emperor, my august sovereign, sincerely desiring to maintain the historical relations of friendship and sympathy which happily unite Japan and the United States, has been graciously pleased to appoint me as his Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary near the Government of the United States, and I consider a great honor to be entrusted with such high duties.

Truly cognizant of the growing importance of our relations, I consider it an honor and a duty to assume the great responsibilities involved in this important mission. In assuming these responsibilities, I am not only largely encouraged by my vivid recollections of the pleasant experiences I had during my last tenure of office as His Majesty's Minister in this capital, which were, I dare say, entirely due to the confidence and goodwill which I was fortunate enough to receive from your Government as well as the high sense of justice that always characterized its attitude toward my country.

Roosevelt Expresses Good Will.

The President responded as follows:

In receiving from your hands the august words of credence whereby your sovereign, the Emperor of Japan, commends you to me and to the Government of the United States in the capacity of Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary as the faithful exponent of his Imperial Majesty's sentiments of friendship and esteem for this country, I have great pleasure in expressing the lively satisfaction with which I have heard your august sovereign's words, and I am happy to see that the cordial relations and purpose of Japan to maintain and, if possible, to still further strengthen the close bonds of amity that have happily and so beneficially existed between your great island of the Far East and our own Commonwealth of the West. I feel that I can do even more than reciprocate those assurances. On behalf of this Government and of my countrymen, I can most sincerely pledge to you, and through you to your nation, the earnest cooperation of the United States in your efforts to maintain and to more firmly establish the good-will which mutually binds and fosters the material advancement of the two nations in the paths of tranquil prosperity.

Extends Personal Welcome.

For yourself, Mr. Ambassador, our Government and its people present the kindest words of welcome, because we cherish very agreeable remembrances of your former honored sojourn in this country as your nation's Minister. You bring to your congenial task a knowledge of our life and ways such as few men not of our race can bring, and you will be aided in your course by the cordialness that all possess, the personal sympathy, esteem and confidence of those among whom you will be called to live.

Courts to Decide Natal Act.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 20.—The Cabinet did not consider the British Columbia natal act at its meeting today but will permit the courts to be heard on the constitutionality of the act before acting.

RICKEY TO FACE NEW JURY

Langdon Goes to Carson to Investigate State Bank.

CARSON, Nev., Feb. 20.—Judge Langdon arrived in this city today and with the Sheriff drew a new grand jury which is to consider the case of Banker Rickey. The grand jury will meet next Monday, Saturday being a legal holiday, there would be little more than organization perfected by meeting before that time. District Attorney Roberts is preparing additional evidence in the case to present to the body when it convenes.

Attorney-General Stoddard this morning stated that he would ask the Bank Commission for authority to demand the appointment of a receiver for the state bank. In speaking of the matter this morning, he said:

I believe now that the best thing to protect the interests of all concerned in the appointment of a receiver, an attachment for a large amount was made at the local branch yesterday, and I have been told that others will be filed. I also have been informed that an attachment has been filed at Blair and there are now several on the bank at Tonawanda.

Receivers for Mutual Reserve.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Temporary receivers for the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company were appointed by Justice Pitcock in the New York State Supreme Court today on the application of Attorney-General Jackson. The company is now in the hands of receivers appointed by the United States Court on an appli-

cation made by a committee of policy-holders. The receivers' appointment by Judge Pitcock are Joseph J. O'Donohue and Joseph P. Day.

Hurt by Knickerbocker Failure.

STAMFORD, Conn., Feb. 20.—Application was made in the Superior Court today for the appointment of a receiver for the American Machine Typosetting Company, the president of which is Robert Kerr. Mr. Kerr holds \$50,000 worth of the company's bonds and it is stated that owing to the failure of the Knickerbocker Trust Company, of New York, the trustee for the bonds, the company has been unable to obtain money.

Bank Closes, Employee Under Fire.

MADISON, Ill., Feb. 20.—The Tri-City State Savings Bank closed today. No reason has been given by the officers of the bank for the closing, but it is persistently rumored that the action resulted after an investigation of the accounts of a trusted employe. The bank's capital is \$25,000.

Bankrupt Pleads Guilty.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 20.—Alex E. Butt, cashier of the wrecked People's Bank of Portsmouth, Va., today pleaded guilty to three of 50 indictments and, after making restitution to the depositors to the extent of \$7,000 on the total shortage of \$23,000, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$750.

Small Bank Is Closed.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Feb. 20.—The L. E. Pratt banking house, of Hammondsport, did not open for business today. The depositors number about 500.

RUSSIA AIDS CONTESTANTS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 20.—Premier Stolypin has given orders to the Governors of Yakutsk and Primorsky to assist in every way possible the contestants in the New York to Paris automobile race as they journey through Siberia.

KENDALLVILLE, Ind., Feb. 20.—The American car in the New York to Paris automobile race left here this evening at 8:40 o'clock on the journey westward. The French car, De Dion, which was towed here by farmer's team at 1 o'clock, may not be able to leave before morning.

PORT WAINWRIGHT, Ind., Feb. 20.—The American car in the New York to Paris automobile race, driven by Montague Roberts, arrived at Kendallville this afternoon after daylight today, after having been stalled the greater part of the night in snowdrifts east of that city. St. Chaffray, with the French car, came in a short time later. Farmers along the route turned out late in the night to shovel away the blockading drifts for the American. He left Corunna at 1:20 last night, and farmers along the route practically shoveled his way for him the entire distance to this city.

ST. CHAFFRAY left Corunna shortly after Roberts, and soon was hopelessly stuck in the snow. Roberts was greatly exhausted after his night's work, and soon after reaching here retired with the intention of not resuming his journey until 4 o'clock this afternoon, unless the French car should give promise of overtaking him. The roads were badly drifted.

TOLEDO, O., Feb. 20.—Sartori, in the Italian car, reached Bryan, 60 miles west of here, at 10 o'clock, and the contest will run from Toledo. The German car, driven by Lieutenant Koepen, is struggling through the snow near Fremont.

BRLE, Pa., Feb. 20.—The second French car in the New York to Paris race arrived here at noon today and 30 minutes later left for Cleveland. The car, driven by Godard and was extricated from the snow drift at Stataline, 18 miles from here, where it spent the night.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 20.—The German car, which broke a wheel at Saybrook late yesterday, was towed into Geneva, 50 miles east of Cleveland, last night. Repairs have not yet been made.

Turkey Assures Russia of Her Friendship.

EXPLAINS MILITARY MOVE

Preparations Along Border Made Necessary by Internal Situation, Including Armenia and Kurdistan, It Is Declared.

PETERSBURG, Feb. 20.—A representative of the Foreign Office declared today that Russia's military preparations in Northwestern Turkey in the vicinity of the Russian border were not directed against Russia but were made necessary by the threatening internal situation in that nation, which includes Armenia and Kurdistan.

Lift Japanese Quarantine.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 20.—The steamer Tosa Maru, which left Seattle this morning, went to Williams Head quarantine station and took from there the quarantined passengers left by the Kaga Maru about two weeks ago. Dr. Watt, quarantine superintendent, was unwilling to release the Japanese, but on receiving intimation from Dr. Oakley, at Diamond station, allowed them to board the Tosa Maru.
