Actual Revival of Industrial Activity Before Making Commitments.

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—There was hardly enough motive power in the stock market to-day to cause any defined current in the price movement. Only about half a dozen stocks were traded in to the extent of more than a few hundred shares. Contending parties among the room traders made the varying fluctuations in these few stocks. As for any outside interest in the market, either in the way of speculative ventures, investment demand, of of marketing of holdings, the situation was one of profound nengs, the situation was one of profound ne-

The speculative attitude evidently is one of walting for developments. The change in conditions, whether in the country's trade and insustry or in the demand for expital, for investment, is expected to revive the action of the securities market. Sentiment is not wholly nessimilate in they financial district in that there is a hopefulness prevalent that the limit of actual contraction in business has been touched. The arrest of the heavy accommission of idle freight cars, resumption in some directions of work by idle factories, a better showing of bank clearings compared with last year's levels than for a time and other indoxes are regarded as evidence of check to the contraction. But of actual revival of indistry there is not yet sufficient sign to prompt any speculative commistments looking to higher values. Fear of a resumption at intervals and in special securities of the kind of forced liquidation which spotted has week's market is an additional deterrent. The covering of shorts in the market preliminary to hast week's holiday seemed to exhaust the outstanding open accounts in the market.

Efforts were made to extend the upward movement from this cause today. The effort was confined to the coppers, Reading and the Pacifics. The movement in the coppers was immuered by a renewed decline in price of copper warrants in the London market and by discouraging reports from the trade as to accumulation of stocks and continued sluggishness of demand. There were persistent reports also of instability in the iron market, although explanations were offered on behalf of the principal producers that cutting of prices was confined to smaller intoresis and to an amount of sales that made a negligible quantity. The United States Steel stocks, however, were somewhat neglected by the reports and their depression intercupted the slow advance in other stocks.
