WELLSLEY ORDERED HELD

WANTED AS WITNESS AGAINST PASSERS OF BOGUS BILLS.

Federal Authorities Learn Accused Are Trying to Spirit Him Away. Warrant Is Issued.

George Wellsley, the 18-year-old lad who is the principal witness for the Government against R. H. Wells, J. H. (Peg) Saylor and Frank Caviness, will be held on a witness warrant. Wells and his partners were rounded up by the local police and the postoffice inspectors for flooding the city with confederate bills. Wellsley is at present confined at the Good Samaritan Hospital. He is without money, and yesterday the Federal officials were informed that Wells and his pals were planning to get the lad out of the city. In order to prevent this Judge Wolverson issued a witness warrant for Wellsley and he will be lodged at the County Jail by Sheriff Stevens just as soon as he is able to be removed.

Wells, Saylor and Caviness were reaping a rich harvest peddling off worthless bills issued during the Civil War by the Merchants & Planters' Bank of Atlanta, Ga. The Federal authorities could not convict the men for counterfeiting. The bills were bought from a Chicago firm and sent through the mails to Wells and others. The prisoners are held for illegally using the mails, and United States

Attorney W. C. Bristol feels confident that he can convict them on this charge.

SUES FOR BANK ACCOUNT

Mrs. Adella V. Hussey Attacks Oregon Trust & Savings Deposit.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27.—(Special.)—Mrs. Adella V. Hussey, of Portland, Or., learning that the suspended Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, with which she had a deposit of \$500, had a credit with the American National Bank of this city, has come to San Francisco in an endeavor to secure possession of her money. She brought attachment proceedings today against the American National Bank and the case was tried in Judge Graham's court.

Testimony was given by Mrs. Hussey that she deposited the \$500 with the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank on July 12, 1907, one month before the institution closed its doors. When Judge Graham asked to be shown the bank book as corroboration of her claim, Mrs. Hussey said it was with her baggage at the Fairmont Hotel. She offered to produce the book next morning, and the case was thereupon put over. The Oregon Trust & Savings Bank did not contest the suit.

Shingle Mills Will Not Close.

SEATTLE, Feb. 27.—At a mass meeting of the shingle manufacturers of the state, held here today, the effort to secure a close-down of all mills until the middle of April resulted in failure.

JACKSONVILLE WAKES UP

BOOSTING CLUB FORMED IN SOUTHERN OREGON CITY.

Cement Walks, New Hotel and Better Railroad Service Is Slogan of Organization.

JACKSONVILLE, Or., Feb. 27.—(Special.)—The big auditorium of the Jackson County Courthouse was last night filled to overflowing and standing room was at a premium. The occasion was the organization of the Jacksonville Commercial Club and the awakening of the town. The good ladies of the town were the instigators of the movement and deserve all of the credit for the big demonstration. All day carriages filled with women went to every home in Jacksonville and vicinity, distributing notices of the meeting and appealing to everyone to come out and help organize a new town out of an old one.

Over five hundred of Jacksonville's citizens attended the meeting and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed. George L. Davis called the meeting to order and speeches were made by prominent citizens asking the people to get together and work for the good of the town.

The club was then organized in a business-like shape, a constitution and by-laws adopted and the following officers elected: President, T. J. Kenney; vice-president, George L. Davis; secretary, C.

L. Roames; treasurer, Jay C. Sexton.

Practically every man and woman in town joined the club and today nothing is heard on the streets but good booster talk.

Jacksonville certainly waked up, and from present indications is going to stay awake. The improvements promised by the new organization include the building of cement sidewalks in front of every business house in town, the betterment of railroad service between Medford and Jacksonville, the acquisition of a city park and the building of a modern hotel. A fund of \$2000 is being raised by popular subscription to advertise the town.

DON'T LIKE STATEMENT NO. 1

Josephine Republican Legislative Candidates Won't Sign It.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Feb. 27.—(Special.)—With one exception, the Senatorial and Representative candidates of Josephine County are not pledging themselves to support Statement No. 1. They have done a straight party jacket. George W. Colvig, who heads the race for Senator, places himself in alignment with his party in every instance. O. S. Goodnow, his running mate, looks upon Statement No. 1 as the primary ingredient of his political profferment and he goes on record with his petition so signed.

Getting into the representative body, the two candidates, Dr. J. C. Smith, the present city Mayor, and George H. Durham, attorney for the Southern Pacific Company, have neither bound themselves to Statement No. 1.

Among the 12 other candidates of the Republican party in this county none has any particular expression to make in regard to Statement No. 1. Humming through the Democratic petitions that are

filed, there is sufficient evidence to warrant the belief that they may have a warm feeling for Statement No. 1. It appears, from what can be observed, that nearly all the candidates or political leaders in the field are beginning to weary of flirting with polygamous politics.

J. Potter on which to make the trip. The excursion party will leave Portland, Ash-street dock, Saturday night at 11 o'clock, and return the following night, leaving Astoria at 11 o'clock, reaching Portland early Monday morning, March 2. Round trip tickets, including berth, will be on sale to members only at the city ticket office of the O. R. & N. Third and Washington streets, till the close of business Saturday evening, 6 P. M.

Baker Get \$20,000 Depot.

BAKER CITY, Or., Feb. 27.—(Special.)—This city is to have a new O. R. & N. station which is to cost \$20,000. A letter has been received by W. J. Patterson, secretary of the Citizens' League, from J. P. O'Brien, head of the Harriman lines in this state, stating that the company would accept the offer of the citizens of Baker City to furnish the stone for the building. The company, he said, was willing to put \$15,000 into the building.
