HEYMANS TO COME

Rumored That Immunity Bath Is Ready for Him. WILL MAKE CONFESSION? Authorities Said to Have Communicated With Fugitive Medical Institute Proprietor—Want Evidence Against Others.

That District Physician Manning has been in communication with Ernest Heymans, proprietor of the X-Radium Institute, at Third and Alder streets, where Golda W. Rowland is alleged to have met death as the result of a criminal operation, and that Heymans has agreed to return to Portland and tell all he knows in this regard, in return for immunity from prosecution.

When a warrant was issued for his arrest on the strength of an information charging forgery, based on facts secured by City Health Officer Pohl Heymans fled to Vancouver, B. C. It is reported that he did not manage to elude the authorities and leave the city for several days after he learned that he was to be arrested, remaining in hiding at the home of a friend until the opportunity to escape presented itself.

Mr. Manning appeared before the general committee of physicians, preachers and members of the Municipal Association which has in hand the investigation of places said to be similar in character to the X-Radium Institute at Friday afternoon, and informed its members that he expected to have Heymans in Portland within a short time.

It is known that negotiations with Heymans have been carried on by others than the authorities and that he has been permitted to advertise in the papers, divulging his knowledge. Before his wife left the city she informed at least two persons that her husband intended "proceeding" as a woman physician who had befriended her since her husband's flight.

The charge of forgery against Heymans was preferred at a time when the action on the part of the authorities was deemed necessary, the proper evidence to support a stronger charge, then being lacking. He is accused of forging the name of Dr. Cary Talbot to the death certificate in the case of Miss Rowland, in which document her demise is said to have been due to natural causes.

The fact that most of the Sixteenth-street and East Side cars have been damaged by the winter weather and become uncomfortable modes of entrance proves that there is no valid reason on the part of the company for running cars by which passengers are subjected to such a degree of discomfort.

I ride twice a day upon the Twenty-third-street carline, and what with the magnitude of the Belvidere, the Thrasher and the breeze that blow through the winter, made by one certain Summer car, and the damage to the stumps of my sleeves and my hair, my mind and my temper are sadly interrupted by the conductor's attitude.
