

MILLER LEADS BY MAJORITY OF 3586

Seattle Democrats Barely Pledge Enough Votes to Keep Place on Ballot.

MOORE GLAD HE'S OUT

New Mayor Says He Will Carry Out Party's Pledges—No Announcement of Appointments—Lone Democrat in City Council.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 4.—(Special.)—Out of a total official vote of 2,931, for Mayor, in the election yesterday, John F. Miller, Republican candidate, received 1,648, a plurality over Moore, City party, of 503. Metcalf, regular Democrat, received 66, and one Republican, 285, giving Miller a 4-1 majority of 358.

Lone Democrat in Council.

Only one Democratic candidate survived the slaughter—J. M. Sparkman, elected Councilman in the Eighth by a vote of 124 against 125 for Metcalf, Republican. Metcalf's defeat was brought about by two important factors—personal popularity of his opponent and also of the veteran Councilman, who has served the service of 18 years, was defeated for re-nomination at the primaries.

Side Issues All Carry.

The new Mayor has not yet made a statement regarding appointments. Police Chief Wapenick expected to resign to forestall possible action by the new Mayor.
