Experts Charge Crimes to New York Banks.

BOOKS REVEAL BAD TANGLE

Report Declares Oriental Was Permeated With Irregularities and Thefts Were Charged to Profit and Loss.

NEW YORK, March 5.—Miscellaneous affairs of the Oriental Bank, which is in the hands of receivers, is charged in a report written by examiners employed by the receivers and made public today. The report says:

The bank has been conducted in a most slipshod, loose, unbusinesslike manner and has been permeated with irregularities, frauds and crime. Within the last few years the administration of its affairs had been characterized by several apparent defalcations, forgeries and other violations of the statute of this state and the attention of the city or state had not yet been called to the violation of the law by the officers or directors or attorneys of the Oriental Bank.

Bank Officials in Court.

CARSON, Nev., March 5.—President R. Carson, Cashier Davis and the directors of the defunct State Bank, appeared before Judge Langon this morning for arraignment. In the case of Carson a postponement was given for pleading and filing objections to the indictment until March 14, while in the other cases the arraignment was set for March 14.

Rio Janeiro Bank Closes.

BIO JANEIRO, March 5.—The Union Bank of Commerce of this city closed its doors today. Other banking institutions will be seriously affected. The Union Bank was the principal depositor of Komada & Co., of San Francisco, in discovering the location of the fortifications in San Francisco and San Diego harbors and Point Loma.

HAYES BILL IS DOOMED

President Advises Against Japanese Exclusion Law.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(Special.)—President Roosevelt took a shot today at the exclusion bill introduced by Congressman E. A. Hayes of California. So effectual was the President's aim that it is predicted that the bill will never get out of committee. The President had a heart-to-heart talk with Governor Gillett, of California, now in the National capital, and told him that the exclusion bill would greatly embarrass the Government in its diplomatic negotiations with Japan.

TRAINMEN FOR ROOSEVELT

Spokane Brotherhood Insists He Run for Third Term.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 5.—(Special.)—Amid scenes of great enthusiasm, a resolution was adopted tonight at a meeting of the Spokane Lodge of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, which has nearly 800 members, requesting President Roosevelt to reconsider his determination not to be a candidate for a third term. The resolution petition declares that Roosevelt is needed as chief executive to complete "his fight for the people against the great corporations and monopolies of the country."

AUTOPSY REVEALS CRIME

San Francisco Saloonkeeper Robbed and Thrown in Bay.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5.—An examination of the body of Patrick Comiskey, found yesterday in the bay on the Marin Shore, has proved beyond doubt that the former saloonkeeper, of 222 East street, met with foul play. The autopsy showed that Comiskey had been struck a blow with some blunt instrument, shattering the jaw and knocking out four teeth. The theory of the police is that this blow did not cause the man's death, but that he was rendered unconscious, robbed and thrown into the bay. Comiskey disappeared a month ago.

ILLEGAL FENCERS FINED

Montana Stockmen Must Also Serve Short Jail Sentence.

HELENA, Mont., March 5.—United States Judge Hunt today imposed rather severe penalties on four well-known Northern Montana stockmen and ranchers who pleaded guilty to illegal fencings. The fines and imprisonment follow: Joseph and Frank Laird, ten days and \$200 each; Nelson Ringham, 48 hours and \$200; James Ringham, 48 hours and \$200.

LYNCH LAW IN GEORGIA

Two Negroes Pay the Penalty for Double Murder.

HAWKINSVILLE, Ga., March 5.—Two negroes, Curry Robertson and John Henry, were lynched today near here and their bodies burned. They were charged with the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Hart.

RULERS PLAN FOR MEETING

Kaiser Will See King Emmanuel and Emperor Joseph.

BERLIN, March 5.—According to an official note issued today, Emperor William will meet King Victor Emmanuel of Italy at Venice during the course of his Mediterranean cruise. Later Emperor William will visit Emperor Francis Joseph at Vienna.

Ferry Collision Causes Panic.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5.—A collision of the city front between the Key Route ferryboat Yerba Buena and the Southern Pacific ferryboat Newark shortly after 11 o'clock this morning, throwing the passengers of both boats into a panic, damaged the Yerba Buena considerably. No one was hurt. The blame for the occurrence is placed upon the tide.
