

ACCUSATIONS ARE BRAGGED

Title Trust Officials Plead to New Indictments on Tuesday.

FOURTH BILL HELD GOOD

Circuit Court Judges Overrule Demurrer to Information, Charging Receiving of Money After Insolvency—New Law Upheld.

The four indicted officials of the Title Guaranty & Trust Company, J. Thorburn Ross, J. E. Atchison, T. T. Burkhardt and George H. Hill, were arraigned before Circuit Judge Cleland at 4:35 yesterday afternoon, and given until 2 P. M. next Tuesday to plead.

New indictments were filed during the day against Ross, Atchison, Burkhardt and Hill, the alleged bank officers. The indictments were necessary because of the original information having been declared irregular. Judge Cleland sustained demurrers interposed by the defendants Tuesday, thus throwing the indictments out of court.

The new documents are drawn to avoid the technical imperfections pointed out by Judge Cleland. They are not greatly different in form from the old indictments, except that there is a judicious "whereas" here and a couple of "said defendants" there, and other stock legal phrases scattered throughout to remove them from the pale of technical imperfections.

The charges contained are precisely the same as before, viz., that Ross and the others feloniously loaned state funds out of interest; that they neglected and refused to pay over state money on demand; that they appropriated state money to their own use.

Errors Are Corrected.

Care was taken by the District Attorney's office in drawing up the information to set out more than one crime in each information, so that the crime was committed in Multnomah County; to state that the crime was committed in Multnomah County within three years prior to the filing of the information; to specify the new form each indictment fairly bulges with technical phrases.

Lawrie Willis, who ran away from his home in Seattle, February 20, was taken into custody at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday, and will be returned to his parents. As it was too late to take him to the juvenile detention home last night, he was placed in charge of a relative, Mrs. H. Scott, who did not know the boy was in town.

As to Fourth Indictment.

This fourth indictment charged the bank officials with receiving deposits when the bank was insolvent and known to them to be so at the time. The indictment is under a law passed by the last Legislature, Section 18 of this law, which is to be found in Session Laws, page 262, reads as follows:

"Whoever as officer or officer of any bank who shall receive any deposit knowing that such bank is insolvent, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof, shall be imprisoned in the state penitentiary not exceeding one year, or be fined such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court."

The decision of the three Circuit Court judges upholding the indictment is in accordance with the law and makes it apply to such cases as the crime now charged against the Title bank officials. The change in this statute on which the attorney general and the bankers based their demurrer in section 24, which, after making provision for all banks in the state to report their condition in all respects to the state at least once a month after the act goes into effect, says:

"Within 15 months after the taking effect of this act all such banks shall conform to and in all respects comply with all the provisions of this act, and be subject to examination by the examiner and the penalties therein provided."

Substance of Opinion.

In substance the opinion is as follows, excluding introductory remarks:

"It will be seen that under this statute each penalty prescribed is for a specific thing, and that in each case the statute prescribes a penalty for each thing which either does or does not affirmatively do or prohibits other things from being done. The only general provision in regard to the application of a penalty is the one referred to in Section 24, which says that the penalties shall apply to all persons and banks referred to herein."

It will be noted, therefore, that the Legislature in dealing with the banks has a common penalty for the doing or the failure to do the things commanded to be done or prohibited from being done, but on the contrary specifically fixed a penalty for each particular thing therein mentioned. It may be said that there are other prohibitions in the act, but no penalties are prescribed, and the act themselves are made unlawful and leaves the person injured to such civil liability as the general rules of law would prescribe.

Section 24 refers to and postpones the penalties as to those particular things which maybe in existence at the time of the taking effect of this act, but no such thing is done, 15 months of grace was allowed.
