

FULL WHEAT CARGO  
IN FIVE DAYS

French Ship Takes Grain to  
Queenstown or Falmouth  
for Orders.

LEAD SOUND SHIPMENTS

Exports for March from Portland  
Exceed 1,000,000 Bushels—Less  
Than 400,000 Clear From  
Ports on Puget Sound.

The French ship Jules Goumes, Captain Thourme, cleared yesterday for Queenstown or Falmouth for orders, with 123,491 bushels of wheat, valued at \$305,000. The Jules Goumes will leave down today with orders to act as soon as possible. The clearance of the Jules Goumes brings the wheat shipments up to 1,023,754 bushels for the month of March. In addition to this has been the sailing of the Numanita, with 62,000 barrels of flour, destined for the Orient. Reducing this to a basis of wheat, the exports from Portland for the first 20 days of March reach a grand total of 1,257,923 bushels. This is largely in excess of any corresponding period for the same month in the history of Portland.

Figures secured from the Merchants' Exchange show the total exports of wheat from all the ports of the Puget Sound for the month of March to be only 964,040 bushels. The addition of another cargo to the Portland fleet would have put the Oregon metropolitan area in a position to export in advance of Puget Sound. These figures are accurate. Statistics compiled by the Government for the month of February show an error of about 600,000 bushels for Puget Sound. That section is given credit for that amount in excess of what was set apart. While Portland stood first for February by a small margin, the chances are good for a much larger margin for the present month.

Foreign shipments of flour have been slow for the past three months. This is largely due to the fact that Japan was making no extensive purchases and merchants of Hongkong and other Chinese ports were waiting for a better opening before placing large orders.

FRENCH CAPTAIN COMPLAINS

Master of Ship Hoche Anxious to  
Have Her Moved.

Captain Lemaire, master of the French ship Hoche, has filed a complaint with Harbormaster Spicer, on account of the failure of the O. R. & N. Company to shift the vessel from the foot of Mill street to the lower harbor. The French skipper alleges that he is being delayed on account of a few logs at the draw rest of the Madison-street bridge. He further states that these could be removed at little expense and his vessel allowed to proceed to the lower harbor.

For the past week there has been a heavy freight in the Willamette River and the handling of deep-water crafts above the timbering is exceedingly dangerous. Captain Conway, superintendent of water lines for the O. R. & N. Company, told Captain Lemaire that he would move his ship if the latter would sign a bond covering any damage that might result to the bridge. Captain Conway considered it unsafe to make the attempt with the heavy current running. The location of the draw at the Madison-street bridge is at an angle with the current and during a freshet it is a dangerous place to navigate.

LEONA TO GO IN COMMISSION

Steamer Chartered to Tow Logs on  
the Lower River.

John McCoy, president of the North Fork Logging Company, has chartered the steamer Leona, to operate on the Lewis and Columbia rivers. The boat will be placed in commission as soon as possible. It is the intention to operate her on the North Fork of the river and bring down lumber and log rafts. The Leona was built and is owned by William Marshall and Captain Newt Graham. The former is a marine engineer and the latter a pilot. She has been used at the east approach to the Madison-street bridge for the past six years.

MILDRED CAN'T BE SAVED

Schooner Gradually Breaking Up on  
Grays Harbor South Jetty.

ABERDEEN, Wash., March 20.—(Special.)—Captain Peaslee, who went to the wreck of the schooner Mildred, says the vessel cannot be saved. She has gradually worked at the east approach to the jetty, with her bow pointing shoreward and the planking on her starboard side from the main to the mizzen rigging badly broken. There are several large holes in her side, and the main mast has settled, showing that her back is broken as a result of the continued pounding.

The schooner C. R. Wilson, charged with ashore near the Mildred, is safe at her dock here. The captain of the Wilson saw the Mildred go ashore when the Wilson was about seven miles away.

CO'S EIGHT RATE

West Side Tariff Reduced by  
Southern Pacific.

LUMBER BENEFITS MOST

Reduction Will Affect All Shipments  
on West Side and Yamhill Divisions to Points South of Albany on the Main Line.

Lower freight rates that will considerably benefit manufacturing industries in South Portland and along the West Side and Yamhill divisions of the Southern Pacific have just been announced by the traffic department of the Harriman lines. The new rates will become effective April 25 and will apply to all points on the Southern Pacific south of Albany.

The new schedule will give to all shipments on the two divisions named a tariff to the southern part of the state just 25 cents a ton in excess of the rates charged from the Park street of Main freight depot. This rate will include all commodities shipped in carload lots.

Heretofore the South Portland industries and those along the West Side and Yamhill divisions have been obliged to overcome a big handicap in selling to the Southern Oregon market. It has been necessary for them to pay the distance tariff, which forms the maximum schedule from the place of shipment to destination. These tariffs run considerably higher than the local tariffs from the freight depot, and the result is that lumber is now being paid with an additional 25 cents a ton.

Lumber is the chief commodity shipped from the territory affected by this reduction into Southern Oregon. Industries in South Portland have long been working for transportation facilities that will place them on equal footing for shipment with factories in other sections of the city and the schedule just announced is regarded as a step toward this goal.

PORTLAND GENERAL NO MORE

Property All Transferred to Portland  
Railway, Light & Power Co.

Final steps were taken yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the directors of the Portland General Electric Company to transfer all properties held by that corporation to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. This is one of the last steps in the reorganization of the electric light power and traction interests of the city which was effected, as to ownership, several years ago. The transfer of title at this time is simply a formal change of ownership and will not in any way affect the management of the properties.

Title to the real estate property to the head company was filed in the office of the County Clerk yesterday afternoon. It covered almost 60 closely typewritten pages. The properties transferred are very extensive, comprising all the real property, franchises and grants held in the name of the Portland General Electric Company. The real estate holdings are those in Portland, Oregon City and Cazadero. There are enumerated franchises in several Willamette Valley cities.

YANCKWICH HAS GRIEVANCE

City Attorney, He Says, Will Not Punish Employment Agents.

Attorney Harry Yanckwich denies that he commenced an altercation with Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson, as published yesterday, and states that the trouble, if it can be called such, was precipitated by the refusal of City Attorney Kavanaugh and his deputies to do their duty and grant him the warrants he requested. In stating his side of the controversy, Mr. Yanckwich said:

"In the first place, I am not a Russian, but to get to the facts in this matter, I have acted in the capacity of attorney for a number of men who have been victimized by those so-called employment agencies, but I have been unable to secure any action on the part of the City Attorney's office toward having these men arrested and tried for their offense against the law.
