Tucker and Evans Will Retire Soon After McCourt Takes Control.

LATTER SWORN IN TODAY

New District Attorney Will Proceed With Grand Jury Investigations and Will Not Name Assistant at Present.

John McCourt, United States Attorney, will have only the temporary assistance of Robert Tucker and Walter H. Evans, Assistant United States Attorneys under W. C. Bristol.

Consider Salaries Too Small.

Mr. Tucker and Mr. Evans were asked by Mr. McCourt yesterday to remain in the office for a few months until all pending criminal business had been disposed of, but the offer was declined by both.

Although the grand jury was in session only one day, the Assistant District Attorney made a record, returning six indictments involving 12 men, all of whom pleaded guilty, thereby delivering the County Jail to the Government.

Cases That Await Action.
