Three Title Bank Officials Are Arraigned.

DEMURRERS FAIL

J. Thorburn Ross, T. T. Burkhart and J. E. Aitchison Now Face. Trial for Embezzlement of School Funds.

Three of the indicted officials of the defunct Title Guarantee & Trust Company Bank pleaded not guilty before Judge Cleland, of the Circuit Court, at 2 o clock yesterday afternoon. The court had earlier in the day overruled the demurrers to the informations against the defendants. J. Therburn Boss, T. T. Burkhart and John E. Altenson. Attornov Wallace McComent appropried that Burkhart and John E. Altchison. Attor-pay Wallace McCamant announced that he would file a motion for a change of years in the case of Rass. His argument is to be heard at 2 P. M. Mondey. Harri-son Allen, attorney for the other bank officials, said he had not yet decided whether or not he would file a motion for a change of years. The ground for the motion to transfer the case to anthe motion to transfer the case to another county for trial is that there is such a prejudice in Multnomah County against the bank officials that there will against the bank officials that there will be no possibility of securing a fair jury. In overruling the demurrer, which al-leged that because November 2 was a holiday no legal demand could have been made by State Treasurer Steel for the re-turn of the state funds on that day. Judge Cleland said that the statute pro-vided for the doing of ministerial acts on holidays, but not judicial acts. The paying of state money, or the demand that it be paid, Judge Cleland said, was not a judicial act.

Regarding the contention of the indicted officials that the money was in the possession of the bank, while the informations charge the bank's officers with naving it in their possession, the court ruled that the clause in the informations stating that the money was held "for safekeeping, to be returned to the state." carried them beyond the possession. carried them beyond the possibility of being ruled out on this technical ground. Ross is to be tried separately from Burkhart, Alichison and George H. Hill District Attorney Manning wishes to try the case first in which the officials are charged with failing to repay the school

Marquam's former suit was dismissed by Presiding Judge Cleiand on the ground that his complaint did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action. Then his attorneys filed the amended tomplaint on the ground that new facts had developed. Attorneys for the defendants alleged in their motion that the new suit was the same as the old one, the new suit was the same as the old one, the new points brought out being insufficient to constitute a new suit.

DESCRIBES NEW HILL BRIDGES

Modjeski Writes of Structure Across Willamette and Columbia.

Willamette and Columbia.

The current issue of the Raliway Age contains descriptions of the bridges across the Columbia and Willamette Rivers now being erected by the Spokane. Portland & Seattle Railway. The article is written by Ralph Modjeski, M. AM., Soc. C. E., who is in charge of the milding of these two mammoth structures. The article is accompanied by a supplement to the issue of the magazine which contains drawings of the two structures as they will look when completed, as well as details of the plers and the steel superstructure.

Mr. Modjeski's article shows that the bridge across the Columbia River will be one of the longest continuous railroad structures in the country, if not in the world and, with the viaduct across Hayden Jahrd and the bridge across H den Island and the bridge over Oregon Slough, will be 6408 feet, or about a mile and a quarter, in length.

Mr. Modjeski says the reason Hayden
sland is to be crossed by a bridge inlead of an embankment is that in times

of high water in the Columbia the floods will be less liable to wash the bridge piers across the main channel than if an embankment existed across Hayden Island, which would turn the full force of the flood water against the piers.

Sterling, Justice of the Peace at Drain, four days after the arrest, it having been shown that the lawyer had committed no crime whatever.

The ordinance carries with it an appropriation of \$50.00 to be used in securing estimates of the probable cost of building the underground conduits, and whatever the commission might see fit to expend it for. City Engineer Taylor was authorized to proceed to engage an expert to lay out the plans, and it was voted to pay for this out of the appropriation.
