

STEAMER EUREKA ON PORTLAND RUN

North Pacific Steamship Co. Will Operate Vessel to Coos Bay and Eureka.

FIRST SAILING APRIL 3

Intention is to maintain a ten-day schedule between California Port and Coos Bay—Open Travel Between the Ports.

The announcement of the new steamship service out of Portland was made last night by C. P. Dow, general manager of the North Pacific Steamship Company, owner of the Eureka.

Beginning April 3, the steamship Eureka will be placed on the run between Portland, Coos Bay and Eureka. The first sailing will be from Portland, and it is the intention to maintain a ten-day schedule.

The announcement of the new steamship service out of Portland was made last night by C. P. Dow, general manager of the North Pacific Steamship Company, owner of the Eureka.

The Eureka is a craft of 312 net tons register and has been operating between Portland and Eureka. She is owned by the North Pacific Steamship Company, which now operates the Roanoke and Geo. W. Elder between Portland, Eureka, San Francisco and San Pedro.

HENRIETTE FIXED FOR GRAIN

The German ship Henriette, 188 tons, has been chartered for new crop loading at 25 6d. The vessel was taken for December loading.

The Henriette is the third craft to go on the board for new crop loading during the past two days. The fixing of grain vessels is beginning earlier than usual.
