

EXAGGERATED AT USURPATION

Beall Accuses Roosevelt of Taking Power of Congress and Courts.

SAYS HE INSULTED HOUSE

Letter on Willey Case Should Have Been Returned—Location of New Weather Stations Raises a Storm of Protest.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—More shafts of sarcasm and invective were aimed at President Roosevelt in the House of Representatives today. In one of the most scathing arraignments of a public officer ever heard in the chamber, Beall of Texas, charged the President with having been guilty of "a disgusting usurpation of power," not only toward the National Legislature, but the judiciary as well.

Willey Letter an Insult.

He declared that in writing a letter to the judiciary committee in the Willey case saying that Judge Willey was innocent, the President had insulted Congress and he declared that the letter should have been sent back to the President. He also charged the President with attempting to direct the judiciary in this connection spoke of the appointment of three members of the Supreme Court by the President who, said he, must necessarily be influenced by the President as the source of their official position.

Storm About Weather Bureau.

Scott, however, maintained that all of them were placed in the bill on the recommendation of the Secretary of Agriculture and the Chief of the Weather Bureau.
