

FILE PETITIONS IN LAST MINUTE

Few Candidates Too Late to Get Names on Primary Ballots.

GRAND RUSH AT SALEM

Lawyers Have Hard Time Wrestling With Intricate Provisions of Primary Law—Democratic Names Scarce—List of Candidates.

SALEM, Or., March 27.—(Special.)—This was the last day for filing state and joint district petitions for placing of names on the primary election ballots, and there was a grand rush by the late ones to get in before the last day had expired. Next Wednesday is the last day for filing county petitions.

Errors or procrastination placed a number of candidates in great danger of being left off the ballots entirely, and but for the aid of Secretary of State Benson several who got in the last day would have been too late. In a number of instances where the candidates sent in defective petitions Mr. Benson notified them by telegraph or long-distance telephone as to the nature of their error and how to remedy the trouble.

Strange as it may seem, lawyers were the applicants who had the greatest difficulty in getting their petitions prepared and certified in proper form. One lawyer of considerable prominence had as much trouble in understanding the law and forms that it was necessary to send his petition back to him the second time.

Democratic Timber Scarce. There are two important offices for which the Democrats will have no candidates on the primary ballot, United States Senator, Supreme Judge and Congressman in the First district.

Dislike the Primary System. Coos County Voters Long to Return to Oldtime Convention.

COQUILLE, Or., March 24.—(Special.)—Pursuant to a call by the Republican County Committee, a Republican convention was held here today, at which there was quite a large attendance, nearly every precinct in the county being represented.

Considerable enthusiasm was manifested and resolutions were adopted heartily commending Oregon's delegation to Congress. The principal discussion developed over the plan in the platform condemning "Statement No. 1," but after a general and somewhat heated discussion this plank of the platform was adopted by a vote of more than 2 to 1, and voters were recommended not to support anyone at the primaries who had subscribed to that statement.

TROOPS TO ARRIVE TODAY

Idle Men Are Drinking Heavily and Trouble Is Feared When Soldiers Embark—Mincowners Take a Determined Stand.

CANDIDATES SEEK COVER

Mad Rush in Clackamas to Sign Statement No. 1.

OREGON CITY, Or., March 27.—(Special.)—Clackamas County has gone mad over Statement No. 1. Linn E. Jones, Walter A. Dimick and Colonel Charles H. Dye, candidates for the Republican nomination for the Legislature, who, when their petitions were originally filed, agreed to be guided by the action of the county on the people's instruction amendment, today changed their platform to a straight Statement-No. 1 declaration. The same action was taken by George W. Dixon, of Canby, more than a week ago.

Mr. Jones and Colonel Dye were members of the last Legislature and both signed Statement No. 1 two years ago. The candidates state that, while the instruction amendment carries practically the same meaning as Statement No. 1, the great mass of voters are not familiar with the amendment and believe that candidates for the Legislature who take that pledge are dodging the issue.

Of the eight candidates for the Legislature in Clackamas, six are pledged to Statement No. 1, one has promised to support the Republican voter check, and the other has promised to obey the people's instruction, and in case the amendment falls of enactment, to support the Republican nominee for United States Senator.

The convention decided to endorse or recommend candidates, but the majority of the delegates expressed themselves as being in favor of returning to the convention system for selecting candidates.

Calk addressed a fair-sized crowd here tonight in behalf of his candidacy for the Republican nomination for United States Senator. His address was warmly received, especially that portion of it which referred to the popular election of United States Senators. Mr. Calk is a strong speaker and has a large following here. There were a few of the old-time political "bosses" at the meeting.

ANKENY FORCES WIN OUT

ELECT OFFICERS OF WALLA WALLA WALLA TAFT CLUB.

Exciting Contest in Garden City, in Which Senator's Friends Come Out Victorious.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 27.—(Special.)

In the most spectacular political meeting ever had in the city of Walla Walla, the organization of a Republican Walla Walla Club, held with over 700 members. The officers of the new club are W. H. McKeon, president, and Carl Roe, secretary. W. P. McKean was also named as the vice-president of the State Taft League for Walla Walla County.

A bitter fight was precipitated by ex-Governor Moore at the organization of the Taft League in Tacoma a few weeks ago to prevent the friends of Senator Ankeny from participating in the naming of the club. The State League sided with the issue and left it to a club to be organized here tonight.

For several days the fight for control of the Walla Walla Taft Republican Club has been waging between the friends of Senator Ankeny on one side and the friends of ex-Governor Moore on the other. The contest tonight, when, in the temporary organization, Mayor George E. Kellogg, as the candidate of the Moore faction, received the vote of approximately 100 voters present. McKean is a prominent Ankeny supporter and the secretary is managing editor of the Morning Union.

HOPMEN'S UNION A FAILURE
