

FIGHTING ATTOLL BY ROUNDS TO DRAW

Abe Attell and Battling Nelson Give Spectacular Exhibition.

BOTH COVERED WITH GORE

Attell Seems to Have Best of Battle at First, but Nelson Wakes Up in Ninth and Uses All Strength to Reach His Opponent.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 31.—With a disadvantage of at least eight pounds against him, Abe Attell, champion featherweight, and Battling Nelson, champion of Chicago, in a 15-round draw.

Turning-Point in Ninth.

The turning point came, however, in the ninth round. Nelson, who had been taking his punishment without a whimper, finally succeeded in getting past the Hebrew's heretofore impregnable guard.

Each Man Disinterested.

The consensus of opinion seemed to be that, while Attell by far landed the most blows and was much the cleverer, this was to a great extent offset by Nelson's aggressiveness and the superior power of his blows.

THE FIGHT BY ROUNDS.

Round One. Attell quickly jabbed a light left to the face and followed it with a right swinging his left high on the head.

Round Two.

Nelson bored in, opening up with left and right for the jaw, but Attell gave a warning exhibition of his slipping and smothering.

Round Three.

Nelson shot a straight left to the nose and they exchanged left hooks to the face.

Round Four.

Referee Smith ordered Nelson to break which he reluctantly did. Then Attell swung his right and left to the jaw.

Round Five.

Nelson came out swinging and waded right in, Attell backing up a bit. Attell received a straight left to the face and Nelson a right to the jaw.

Round Six.

They closed in, fighting carefully. Attell showed equal cleverness at the mixing game and most of Nelson's efforts went for naught.

Round Seven.

They fought to close quarters. Nelson putting left to the body and cutting Attell's right with his left.

After Attell and Nelson had a hard left to the jaw Nelson sent a straight left to the jaw and closing in, received a right to the face.

Round Eleven.

Attell gave a marvelous exhibition of foot stepping and ducking. Nelson hitting him with his gloves.

Round Twelve.

Nelson put three lefts to the jaw and fought Attell against the ropes. Attell stalled and the crowd yelled.

Round Thirteen.

Nelson started off with two lefts to the jaw and forced Attell around the ring. Attell broke ground and finally they went to close quarters.

Round Fourteen.

Nelson rushed in, hooking a trio of rights to the face. Nelson whipped a fearful right to the stomach and sent his left to the neck.

Round Fifteen.

Nelson's face bleeding and his eyes swollen, he was unable to continue. Referee Smith promptly called the contest a draw.
