BOISE, Idaho, April 3.—Regardless of the absolute refusal of Harry Orchard personally to file a petition for pardon, Frank T. Wyman yesterday, as his counsel, acting by direction of Judge Freeman Wood of the state court, filed with the State Board of Pardons an application for pardon. The notice of application for publication will be made in one of the papers of the state, and the date of the hearing will be fixed. Four weeks must intervene before such an application can be considered until a regular meeting of the board, a respite will be required extending the date of execution until the next meeting of the board, which is the next meeting comes on the first Wednesday in July.

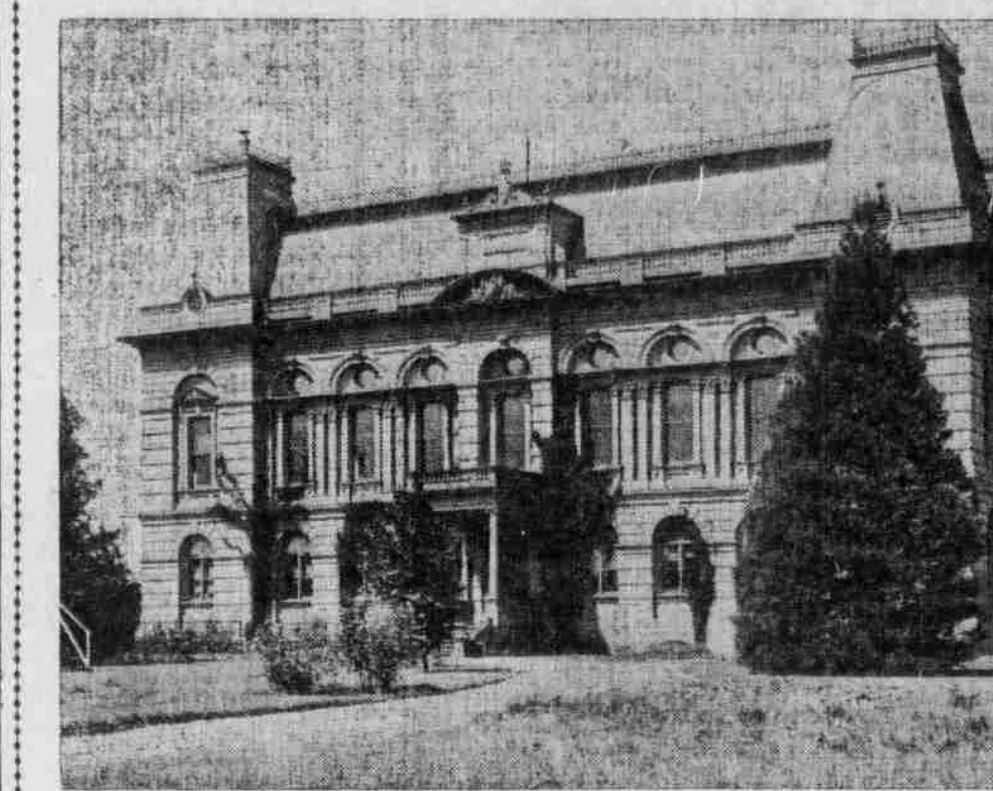

WANT COYOTE BOUNTY LAW

RAVAGES OF THESE PREDATORY PESTS SET FORTH.

Enormous Damage Done Every Year to Sheep Industry—Report of Board of Commissioners.

SALEM, Or., April 3.—(Special.)—Enactment of a coyote scalp bounty law is strongly urged in the annual report of the Board of Sheep Commissioners, which was filed today. The board asserts that last year 200,000 sheep, valued at from \$1,000,000 to \$1,400,000, were slain by coyotes. The board says that efforts have been made by means of a published pamphlet, to instruct sheepmen how to make war upon this enemy of the industry, but the opinion is expressed that losses not only of sheep but of goats, pigs, calves and colts, will be enormous if the entire state combines through the agency of a scalp bounty law.
