

STANFORD WILL CHANGE COURSES

President David Starr Jordan Outlines Plan to Be Followed.

WILL ADOPT GERMAN IDEA

University and College Students Have Different Needs and These Will Be Met - Praised Rugby Football.

Favors Rugby Football.

In speaking of athletes at Stanford, he said that a recent article he had contributed to the Pacific Monthly gave his views fully on the subject of the adoption of the Rugby game at the University.

Dr. Jordan, in referring to the recently published news that a change is to be made in the University course, said:

"The reference in the Associated Press dispatch to proposed changes in the plan of instruction is a change in the plan of instruction with an aim at a conversation with an aim at Spokane. These changes are not decided on merely held in contemplation to take effect in five years. The same plan is under consideration in several of the great Eastern universities.

Follow German System.

"It is, in brief, to separate the University from the College, making the former, as in Germany, a place of general education and elementary training but of special training in technical, professional and research lines.

"The two classes demand a different type of teachers. The boys need friends and drillmasters. The university men demand professors who shall have creative force along lines of research.

Work for High Schools.

"Very soon the former lines of work must be relegated to smaller colleges, while the university will be a place for another type of work. The ordinary college cannot do this higher work, but the lower work is often done through better personal supervision, better than any university can.

"If this plan is carried out four years will be required in the university for degrees in law, five in medicine and three to four in engineering.

"Doubtless many institutions will make this change during the same time, but I hope to see Stanford among the first to lead in this direction. Arrangements are in progress whereby the Cooper Medical College trust, founded by Dr. Levi Cooper Lane, will be turned over to the trustees of Stanford University to become an integral part of that institution. This includes the Lane Hospital and the Lane Medical Library. The general scientific part of medical education, physiology, hygiene, bacteriology, chemistry, anatomy, will be given at Stanford. The clinical courses, with surgery and pathology, will be given in the hospital. The details will be made public when the arrangement is completed.
