

CALL IS ISSUED FOR CONVENTIONS

Three Republican Assemblies to Be Held in Portland May 14.

CENTRAL COMMITTEE ACTS

Summons State and District Meetings—Salem Contends Unsuccessfully for Apportionment of Delegates.

Three Republican conventions, to be held in Portland May 14, were called yesterday by the State Central Committee.

The state convention will choose four delegates-at-large to the Chicago National convention, June 16, and the district conventions will choose two delegates each.

Each county will have one delegate-at-large in the state convention and, in addition, one for every 250 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in June, 1906, for Supreme Judge in the county.

The State Central Committee recommends that the delegates to the state convention be chosen by County Central Committees but leaves the method of their selection to each county committee to decide for itself.

The vote for Supreme Judge in 1906 and the apportionment of delegates based thereon are as follows:

The apportionment for the district conventions will be the same as that for the state convention.

Salem Contends for Conventions.

The only town that bid against Portland for the conventions was Salem, for which spoke Dr. J. N. Smith, of that city.

Dr. Smith insisted that Salem has not had a Republican state convention for 25 years. The other members of the committee, however, wanted Portland. This city was selected for the first district convention on motion of A. C. Marsters, of Douglas, and for the state convention by George W. Bennett, of Clatsop.

Method of Choosing Delegates.

The longest discussion was over the method of choosing delegates to the state and district conventions. Williams, of Polk, moved that the county central committees choose the delegates, but Pullen, of Malheur, and Vinton, of Yamhill, and others objected on the ground that in some of the counties the central committees will not be representative of the party members.

Finally, in order to harmonize the conflicting opinions, the central committee resolved to allow each county committee to adopt the method of selecting delegates to the state and district conventions.

The meeting was held in the office of Chairman Westgate, in Hamilton building.

No reference was made to Statement No. 1, nor were any recommendations made for nomination in next week's primaries.
